Dr. LEE HYDER (above), Secretary of the United States Chess Federation, was the guest of honor at a July 14th Dinner held at the Quorum Restaurant in Denver. The Dinner was sponsored by CSCA and was hosted by Board Member John Harris. Others at the event included CSCA President Royal Franklin, Vice President John Stine, Board Member Tom Barber and past National Vice President George Bailey. Dr. Hyder discussed current national projects and noted CSCA suggestions and recommendations. (CSCA has already received a copy of our suggestions which Dr. Hyder has forwarded to the National Policy Board). The Dinner was followed by late evening discussions and chess at the Denver Chess Club.

Children's Hospital Chess Program "Going Well"

The CSCA Children's Hospital Program, under the direction of David Stubbs, is doing "very well" according to Fern Pender, Director of Volunteers for Children's Hospital. Ms. Pender, shown in the center of the top photo, said that chess is not only being played under direction of David in the Play Room of the Hospital, but in-patients are having their own games in the privacy of their own rooms. David, shown in the center of the bottom photo in a simul with in-patients, assists students and patients on Tuesday afternoons of every week. "Many of the patients have never played the game before" exclaimed Ms. Pender, "but they take to it well". IRS Application Still Pending

As of August 1, 1976 (the date of the printing of this Bulletin) word has still not been received from the Internal Revenue Service concerning application of the Colorado State Chess Ass'n for tax exemption as an educational organization under section 501 (c) (3) of the IRS Code. Following our recent special meeting to amend both our Articles of Incorporation and our By-Laws, the Articles of Amendment were filled at the offices of the Colorado Secretary of State and a certified copy was mailed to the Internal Revenue Service. Since that time, the IRS has requested and has been mailed a certified copy of the minutes of the special membership meeting. It is hoped that word will be received by the time of our annual meeting.

HAMBLIN wins DENVER OPEN

The 1976 Denver Open, held over the Bicentennial (yawn...) weekend attracted 103 players who competed in two sections which were evenly balanced; 52 in the Open section, and 51 in the Reserve.

The Open section had almost all the fireworks expected of it, though one could hardly tell from the corstables (next page) due to the preponderance of draws (zzzz...). Six of the top nine finishers did not lose a game, though many of the half-points were hard fought down to the last pawn. (Mutual exhaustion?) Anyway, in the open section, James Hamblin, back from the Navy, made his presence in Colorado well advertised in winning the Open (his second time, by the way) on tiebreak over surprise finisher Joe Eversole of Pueblo. Each scored 5-1. Jim ("Humble") Hamblin got the Champion's trophy, but Joe got the "B" trophy.

Practically everybody else was tied at 4½ points. Many killed each other's chances for 5 points by drawing with each other in the 5th and 6th rounds. In order, on tiebreak, were: Curtis Carlson, Rod Malpert (Nebraska), Charles Johnson, who won the "A" trophy, Mike McDonald, who was the best "B" player after Joe Eversole, Steve Henderson, Milovan Bosnjak, and Randy Canney.

Haynes Hendee was the top "C" player with 4 points and John Kossett was top unrated in this section.

In the Reserve section Arman Goplen and Shaun MacMillan tied for 1st at 5½ points, drawing with each other. Donald Wilson was clear third with 5 points. The Class "D" prize was won by Dennis Wionell (4½) who was a strong contender for first place all the way.. Top Class "E" was tied for by William Pearson and Joseph Johnson who scored 3 points. John Stine directed.

C S C A Articles of Incorporation

Following is a re-typed copy of the Articles of Incorporation of the Colorado State Chess Association, Inc as they were originally filed at the Colorado Secretary of State Offices on December 20, 1972 under provisions of the Colorado Nonprofit Corporation Act, and, as they were Amended by vote of the membership on July 4, 1976, in order to conform to the United States Internal Revenue Service requirements for tax exemption under section 501 (c) (3) of the IRS Code. The Articles of Amendment to the Articles of Incorporation were filed at the Offices of the Colorado Secretary of State on July 6, 1976. Our original copies of these documents are held by the Secretary of the Colorado State Chess Association, Inc.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

The undersigned persons, all of whom are citizens of the United States, acting as incorporators of a corporation under the Colorado Nonprofit Corporation Act, sign, and, acknowledge the following Articles of Incorporation for such corporation.

FIRST: The name of the corporation is Colorado State Chess Association, Inc., hereinafter known as the Association.

SECOND: The period of duration is perpetual.

THIRD: The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is organized are as follows:

1. To broaden and develop chess as art and recreation, as a significant element of culture in Colorado.

The Association will work toward this end by instruction of the public on a subject useful to the individual for the purpose of improving or developing his capabilities in the game of chess. The Association will conduct public discussion groups, forums, panels, lectures and other forms of public education in schools and in other public places. The Association will cooperate with chess clubs, schools, and other groups and institutions throughout Colorado in teaching chess and conducting tournaments. The Association will be affiliated with the United States Chess Federation. (As amended July 4, 1976)

2. To receive donations from the general public to enable the Association to conduct chess matches and tournaments and to award trophies and prizes to successful contestants.

3. To purchase, lease or otherwise acquire real and personal property and to sell, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of or encumber such property of whatever kind or description as may be necessary and proper in the pursuit of the objectives of the Association.

4. To borrow or raise money to any amount allowed by the Colorado Nonprofit Corporation Act, as amended, and other regulatory laws of the State of Colorado, by the sale or issue of bonds, notes, debentures, or other obligations of any nature, and to secure the same by mortgage or other liens upon any and all of the property, real and personal, of every kind or description, or any portion thereof, of this corporation, whether at the time owned or thereafter acquired.

5. To levy dues and other assessments against the members in order to finance the operations of the Association.

6. (Omitted) (As amended July 4, 1976)

FOURTH: Said corporation is organized exclusively for educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law). (As amended July 4, 1976)

FIFTH: The address of the initial registered office of the corporation in Colorado is 1395 S. Navajo, Denver, Colorado 80223, and the name of its initial registered agent at such address is Robert Shean.

SIXTH: The address of the initial principal office is 1395 S. Navajo, Denver, Colorado 80223.

SEVENTH: The numbers of directors constituting the initial board of directors is six, and the names and addresses of the persons who are to serve as the initial directors are: Robert Shean, 1395 S. Navajo, Denver, Colorado 80223; Joseph Mirsky, 717 S. Fillmore, Denver, Colorado 80209; William Reynolds, 6057 Routt Ct., Arvada, Colorado 80002; Pat Mahoney, 4228 Grove, Denver, Colorado 80211; Steve Henderson, 4801 W. 38th Ave., Denver, Colorado 80212; John A. Harris, 2350 S. Holly Place, Denver, Colorado 80222. The above named directors are to serve until the first membership meeting. The bylaws may provide for the number of directors and their terms to serve in the future.

EIGHTH: No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its members, directors, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article Third hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the cor-

poration shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provisions of these articles, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal income tax under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Law) or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law).

NINTH: Upon the dissolution of the corporation, the Board of Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the corporation exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law), as the Board of Directors shall determine. Any of such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the District Court of the county in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such pursuits or to such organization or organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes.

TENTH: These Articles of Incorporation may be amended in the following manner. The board of directors shall first adopt a resolution setting forth the proposed amendment and directing that it be submitted to a vote at a meeting of members entitled to vote thereon, which may be either an annual or a special meeting.

Written notice setting forth the proposed amendment or a summary of the changes to be effected thereby shall be given to each member entitled to vote at such meeting within the time and in the manner provided in the bylaws for the giving of notice of meetings of members. The proposed amendment shall be adopted upon receiving at least two thirds (2/3) of the votes which the members present at such meeting are entitled to cast. Any number of amendments may be submitted and voted upon at any one meeting.

Following is a re-typed copy of the Bylaws of the Colorado State Chess Association, Inc., as they were originally written and including Amendments voted in by the membership on September 1st, 1974 and July 4, 1976.

BY-LAWS OF THE COLORADO STATE CHESS ASSOCIATION, INC.

Article 1. NAME

The name of the organization is the Colorado State Chess Association, Inc., hereinafter referred to as the Association.

Article 11. PURPOSE

The purpose of the Association shall be to broaden and develop chess as a significant element of cultural art in Colorado. The Association shall cooperate with chess clubs, schools, and other groups and institutions throughout Colorado in teaching chess and conducting tournaments. The Association shall be affiliated with the United States Chess Federation and shall select the official Colorado representatives in all affairs of the United States Chess Federation. The Association is pledged to (A) operate exclusively for educational purposes; (B) that no part of its contributions, dues or net income shall inure to the benefit of any individual, except the trophies or prizes awarded in the course of its educational and promotional program shall not be so construed; and (C) that the Association is not operated for profit, and that neither principal nor income of any of its funds may be used in any attempt to influence legislation. (As amended July 4, 1976)

Article 111. MEMBERSHIP

Any person or corporation may become a Member on application to the Board of Directors, which is empowered to accept member application by majority vote. Persons or corporations desiring to become a Member must demonstrate a sincere interest in chess and in furthering the aims of the Association. All Members must agree to abide by the Articles of Incorporation, By-Laws and other rules and regulations adopted by the Association.

BY-LAWS OF COLORADO STATE CHESS ASSOCIATION, INC. (continued)

1. Membership dues: Association Dues shall be \$5.00 for one year. Juniors (under 21 years of age at date of expiration of membership) need pay only half of the amount. Any commission retained by the Association on any Membership in the United States Chess Federation shall be regarded as dues paid to the Association by the person to whom the Membership is issued. (As amended September 1st, 1974)
2. Rights and Privileges: Each Member shall be entitled to participate and vote in all meetings of the Membership. Voting may be in person or by mail, but not by proxy. Also, Members are entitled to participate in Association sponsored tournaments except as otherwise provided in these By-Laws. Participation in United States Chess Federation rated tournaments, which are sponsored by the Association, shall require Membership in good standing in both the United States Chess Federation and the Association. In addition, participation in any tournament or event sponsored by the Association shall require Membership in good standing in the Association.
3. Suspension and Expulsion: The Board of Directors has the power to suspend or expel any Member for cause after conducting a hearing. The Member has the right to attend the hearing and to call witnesses in his behalf. If the Member is aggrieved by the decision of the Board, the Member has the right to submit a written appeal to the Board of Directors within ten (10) days of the decision. The appeal will be considered at the next regular meeting or special meeting called for that purpose, by the assembled Membership.

Article IV. MEETINGS

1. Annual Meetings: The President shall call an annual meeting of the Membership, held in conjunction with the Colorado Open Tournament, for the purposes of hearing reports, electing and installing Officers, and considering other Association business.
2. Special Meetings: The President shall call special meetings of the Membership at such times as may be expedient for the purpose of considering any Association business. Upon petition of twenty (20) Members of the Association, the President shall call a special meeting of the Membership for the reason stated on the petition, and the meeting shall be only for discussion of the petitioned reasons.
3. Quorum: Ten Members present in person shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Membership.
4. Notice: The Secretary shall mail to each Member advance notice of each special meeting. The notice shall include an agenda. Business transacted at special meetings will be limited to only those items noted on the notice for that meeting.

Article V.

1. Officers: At each annual meeting the Members shall elect a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Junior Member (under 21 years of age at date of election). All officers other than the Junior Member must be 21 years of age at date of election.
2. Terms: The term of each Officer shall begin with the annual meeting at which elected, and continue until the next annual meeting, and thereafter until a successor is elected.
3. Election: The election shall be by secret ballot.
4. Books: The Association shall keep correct and complete books and records of account, and shall keep minutes of the proceedings of its Members, Board of Directors, and Committees having any of the authority of the Board of Directors, and shall keep at its registered office or principal office in this state a record of the names and addresses of the Members entitled to vote. All books and records of the Association may be inspected by any Member or his agent or attorney, for any proper purpose at any reasonable time.

Article VI. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

1. President: The President shall call and preside at all meetings of the Membership, represent the Association officially on occasion, report annually to the Membership, and carry out all requirements of these By-Laws. He shall appoint such additional Officers and Committees as may advance Association purposes, including the representatives of the Association in all affairs of the United States Chess Federation.
2. Vice President: The Vice President shall assist the President and carry out assignments received from him. He shall execute the duties of the President when the President is unable to serve.
3. Secretary: The Secretary shall keep minutes of all meetings of the Membership, act as custodian of the By-Laws and such documents as the President may entrust to him, and carry out all duties as prescribed by these By-Laws and such other duties as the President may assign. He shall preside at any meetings of the Membership if the President and Vice President are unable to attend.

BY-LAWS OF COLORADO STATE CHESS ASSOCIATION, INC. (continued)

4. Treasurer: The Treasurer shall keep records of all funds collected and disbursed by the Association, make a financial report at the annual meeting, and carry out all duties prescribed by these By-Laws and any duties assigned by the President. He shall preside at any meeting of the Membership if the President, Vice President, and Secretary are unable to attend.

Article VII. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Junior Member, Immediate Past President, Immediate Past Secretary and two members, to be appointed for a one year term by a majority vote of the Board of Directors immediately before the annual meeting, shall constitute the Board of Directors, which shall as Officers and Board Members, between meetings of the Membership, execute all Association business and affairs, including contracts. The President of the Association shall be the chairman of the Board of Directors. A decision of the Board of Directors shall require the affirmative vote in person, by mail, or by telephone, of a majority of the Board of Directors. Proxy votes are not allowed. Any Officers elected or appointed may be removed by the persons authorized to elect or appoint said Officers, whenever, in their judgment, the best interests of the Association are served. If a vacancy should occur on the Board of Directors, the remaining Members of the Board are empowered to appoint a Member to fill the vacancy for the balance of the term. (As amended September 1st, 1974)

Article VIII. PROCEDURE

Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be used at all meetings of the Membership.


Article IX. AMENDMENT

These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Members voting at any meeting of the Membership, provided that advance notice, including the purport of the amendment has been sent to each Member.

Article X. COMPENSATION

No Officer, Director, or Member shall receive any compensation or other benefits from the Association except for reimbursement of reasonable expenses.



PATZERS' CHESS CLINIC

by Dr. Fyodor Radulnikov, D.C.S.
(Doctor of Chessic Surgery)



Hello again, dear patients, admirers, detractors, autograph seekers, etc. Ready for another lesson in the wiles of minor piece endings? The one in the diagram is especially tricky. Counting the plusses and minuses, we see that White's extra pawn is firmly blocked by a Black Knight on Q85. In order to win White must first prove the rule that the Bishop is better than the Knight in positions where there is play ON BOTH SIDES OF THE BOARD. So this suggests to White a plan of opening some lines on the K-side and possibly fixing Black's pawns on dark squares so they can be attacked by the Bishop.



White begins with 1.P-N4, K-B4 (waiting. 1...P-N4 will not help since White plays B-K3-R7-N8-Q6-K8 gaining entrance from behind. There are many variations but all Roads lead to Rome. (Ancient Roman-Transylvanian saying) The reader is invited to work out some of these lines for himself. Remember to use zugzwang and the threat of advancing the QBP.) 2.P-B4, (Now Black is at a crossroads. If he continues waiting with 2...K-N4, then 3.P-B5, K-B4 4.P-R4, K-N4 5.P-N5! Then Black must exchange on K5 since to allow 6.P-N6 is disastrous. White would then threaten BxRP and P-N7 so 5...RPxP 6.PxP, PxP (else P-N6 and B-R6 is the quietus) 7.BxP and Black's KNP at KN2 is fatally weak. White maneuvers his Bishop to K88, tying down the Knight to K1 and advances his QBP or brings his King to KN6. Or if 2...P-N3 3.P-R4 (threatening to play 4.P-R5 making a target of Black's KRP), 3...P-R4 4.P-K3ch! with the following variations: a) 4...NxB 5.KxN, PxNP 6.P-B5! (winning or b) 4...NxB 5.KxN, PxPch 6.KxP, PxP 7.KxP, K-R5 8.K-B4! (9.P-R5 draws), KxP 9.P-K5, PxP 10.KxP, K-Q6 11.K-B6 and wins; finally c) 4...K-N4 5.P-R5, NPxP 6.PxRP, PxPch 7.KxP, N-Q3ch 8.K-Q5! (Now the reason for 4.P-K3ch is clear), N-R2 9.K-K6 wins. So Black tries...) 2...PxP 3.PxP (Now Q4 is available to White's King so all White need to is play B-K3ch and K-Q4 at a suitable moment which is not long in coming), 3...N-N7ch 4.K-B2, N-B5 (4...N-R5 5.K-N3 is no help) 5.P-R3 (waiting), K-N4 6.K-Q3 (mak-

ing his move), K-B4 7.B-K3ch, K-N4 8.K-Q4, NxB (Of course White has calculated the consequences of this beforehand. When you reduce to a simpler ending, make sure it brings you closer to winning. King and pawn endings are usually the easiest to win, but often, as here, exact calculation is needed.) 9.KxN, K-B5 10.K-Q2! (At first it seems that White can break at once with 10.K-B4, KxP 11.P-K5 (Not 11.K-R5, K-Q5 12.K-N6, KxP 13.KxP, P-B4! 14.PxP, KxP 15.KxP, K-B3! draw), 11...PxPch 12.KxP, K-Q6 13.K-R5, K-K6 14.K-N6, K-B6 15.KxP, K-N6 16.KxP, KxP 17.P-N5 winning, but look again! Black has 14...K-R5! 15.KxP, K-N4! followed by 16...P-R4! with a draw. Remain alert to the end!!! So White will make something of his QBP first.) 10...P-N3 11.K-B2, P-B4!? (But waiting will also lose, as Black will run out of K-side moves and will have to move his King, allowing the QBP through until White has a good enough King position to move towards the K-side) 12.KPxP, PxP 13.PxP, K-Q4 14.K-Q3, K-K4 15.P-B6, KxP 16.K-K4 with an easy win.
