

## CSCA - FEB. BOARD MEETING

The meeting was called to order by Pres. Robert Shean at 3:05 at the site of the 1977 Loveland Open in Loveland, Colorado with the following members of the Board present: Bob Shean, John Harris, Gil Humphrey, John LeRoux, Rudy Ramsey and C. Mark Smith. Jim Roode, TD of the Loveland Open, also attended.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Bob Shean reported that the air conditioning may be improved at the Ramada Inn on East Colfax, and recommended that the CSCA tournaments return there if the prices are still good. It was agreed that no action should be taken until any improvements at the Ramada are actually completed.

Mark Smith reported no discussions with Royal Franklin concerning the prison chess program. The trip to the State Prison with Jay Francis of Colorado Springs Chess Club never came to pass due to drug problems at the prison.

Rudy Ramsey reported that the prison inmates are not interested in correspondence chess, and suggested that perhaps nursing home and hospital patients would show some interest in correspondence.

Mark Smith reported that Bob Keatinge will soon take volunteers to Children's Hospital to begin the CSCA program there. It is believed that once this program begins and is publicized, then more CSCA members will volunteer.

After some discussion, the Board decided to begin a preliminary study of making an audio/visual presentation about chess which would be suitable for middle-school students. Such a presentation could be run by the teachers and would not necessarily require the presence of any CSCA volunteers. Similarly, a "kit" could be developed for potential club organizers. It was suggested that perhaps KRMA or Denver area schools could supply some materials and facilities for making such kits and presentations. Some Federal monies may also be available for such projects. Bob Shean commented that when volunteers actually go to schools or clubs to help organize and teach chess, they should emphasize actual play (such as simul) as opposed to lengthy lectures.

Bob Shean reported on a meeting with an encyclopaedia Britannica salesman, who offered to donate books and give a \$10 commission for each set sold through ads in the CSCA Bulletin. The Board strongly disapproved of any such program.

Gil Humphrey presented some suggestion concerning time controls in CSCA tournaments. The Board showed no interest in changing the currently used controls (40/100). Humphrey also suggested changes in defining sections and class prizes in tournaments. Of these suggestions, the one concerning awarding class prizes based on Elo performance ratings was approved. Rudy Ramsey mentioned he had in fact used this system for class prizes in the

past, without any objections from players or organizers involved with CSCA tournaments.

Mark Smith suggested that the CSCA conduct a 5-minute Championship each year at the Colorado Open. This was favorably received, but no definite action was taken.

## CSCA - MARCH BOARD MEETING

The meeting was called to order by President Bob Shean at 3:15 PM between rounds 4 and 5 of the AI Wallace Memorial Tournament at Howard Johnson's South, March 6, 1977, with the following Board members in attendance: Bob Shean, John Harris, Gil Humphrey, Bob Overdorff, John LeRoux and Royal Franklin.

The Minutes of the previous meeting were approved. Bob Overdorff gave the Treasurer's report. Due to the good attendance at the AI Wallace, the prizes would be considerably increased over the guaranteed published minimums. The Board, in a brief discussion, confirmed the old policy of returning all monies above expenses at tournaments to the prize funds.

John Harris reported that John Howell had been selected by the Appreciation Award Committee as the honoree at the upcoming Appreciation Open in May. Royal Franklin was asked to include a plaque for Howell with the other trophies for that tournament. Harris also reported that the Committee recommended a plaque for retiring USCF Executive Director Ed Edmondson. However, the Board decided instead to send an appropriate letter, to the Open House for Edmondson in New Windsor, commending him for his contribution to chess.

Royal Franklin presented a letter for M. Morrison concerning bids for the US Women's Championship. The Board briefly discussed the work required to sponsor a national tournament. No action was taken to commit the CSCA to any such sponsorship, although the matter may be considered at future meetings.

Gil Humphrey reported that several former CSCA Life Members had not responded to the letter which informed them of the abolition of such memberships. The expiration date of these members has been set at May 1977. Humphrey also brought up the question of how the fees for TDs should be divided when more than one TD runs a tournament. It was mentioned that a common policy in such cases is to give all the money to the Head TD, who then decides how to pay his subordinate TDs. This policy was approved.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:55 PM.

# Nikitovich Wins Al Wallace Memorial - Riley & Pletcher Take Section Titles

Playing with a "coolness" missing in prior tournaments lately, Paul Nikitovich won the 1977 Al Wallace Memorial in convincing style with 5 straight victories. Paul's wins were over Michael A Maloney (1681), Carl A Kooztz (1798), Tim Roth (1818), Robert Shean (1948), and Mike McDonald (1939). This is Paul's first major Colorado Victory since last year's Al Wallace, which Paul also won (on tie-break). This victory should edge Paul (2139) close to his earlier-year Master rank.

Placing second in this important CSCA Contest was Brian Wall (2024) with 4 1/2 points, while Mike McDonald, David Jellison and Freddie Badger with 4 points each shared third prize money.

Curtis Carlson, CSCA's perennial tourney winner of recent months, could do no better than tie for fourth place with Marc Lynn, James Hamblin, Carl Kooztz, Robert Malone, Doug Greenwalt, Jeff Maguire and Martin Deschner.

This year's Al Wallace was an outstanding success, with 132 players participating in the two-day, three section tourney. A Vote taken at the tournament was highly in favor of the new, two-day event, instead of the previous three-day formats. Dick Lazarro, Gil Humphrey and Chris Hendricks directed the tourney held at Howard Johnson's South.

Wayne Riley (1536) was the clear winner in the Candidates Section with 4 1/2 points. Bill Snyder, Al Hulmes, Haynes Hendee and Ronald Leonard all tied for second with four points each.

George Pletcher was alone with 5 points and first place in the Reserve Section. George Van Camp, Rick Mattoon and Philip Raevsky tied for second with four points each.



## John A. Howell - Always A Leader

John A. Howell—40 years a chess player, always a leader, winner of the Fourth Annual Appreciation Award presented by the Colorado State Chess Association.

John has been a member of the Denver Chess Club for more than 25 years. Back in 1963 the Club fell on evil days; financing was non-existent, membership had dropped to 14 men. John launched a drive to save the Club and during the next 8 years he held every office on the Board of Directors from President to Playing Team Captain. These were years of solid growth for Colorado Chess during the tough "Pre-Fischer" days.

John campaigned successfully for a 3 years term as Vice President of the United States Chess Federation, representing Region VII. He arranged for the first of the visiting Grandmasters and their lectures and simultaneous exhibitions: Sam Reshevsky (Twice), Larry Evans (Twice), Bobby Fischer, William Lombardy, and most recently, Anatoly Lein.

John was President of the Colorado State Chess Association during 1964-65.

Making numerous trips to the USCF Headquarters in New York, John was laying the groundwork for our first National coup, Colorado's hosting of the US Open Championship at Snowmass in 1968. Working closely with Caswell Silver, John was a driving force behind Colorado's landing of the semi-final match for the 1971 World Championship Between Bobby Fischer and Bent Larsen. He was Co-Chairman of the Host Committee for that match.

In 1968 the Annual Junior Chess Championship of Colorado was one year old. John worked with other leaders, such as John Harris, George Pipiringos, Bob Shean, Caswell Silver and George Bailey to guarantee continuity of Junior Chess in Colorado. He arranged playing sites and the co-sponsoring from the Denver Chess Club and the Petroleum Industry. Within 5 years the Junior Tourney was drawing more than 180 young players, with no registration fees and more than \$1,000 in prizes!

By 1971 things looked healthier, the Denver Chess Club was up to 40 members and the "Fischer Boom Days" were just starting. More important, Colorado had become a known place in the National Chess scene. John turned over the reins to others, he devoted more time to his business interests in the Petroleum Industry, and watched from the background, always available as a consultant when the rest of us needed his experience.

Then, in 1975 the "Fischer Bust Days" arrived and the cycle started over: New problems had developed, the Denver Chess Club found itself riddled with debt, locked out of its own quarters, victimized by embezzlement, for all practical purposes: dead. John stepped in again. He hosted luncheons with selected men with whom he shared a common interest: save the club. He followed through with the CSCA's negotiations with the Heart 'O Denver for perman-


**EDITOR'S NOTE**

This game between Les Haynes and me is from the last round of the recent 1977 Colo Jr-Sr Championships, Top 20's Section. While it will never rank with a Curtis Carlson original, Les and I were of the opinion that moves 43 through 52 might give the game "some redeeming social significance", which is why I am submitting it. Black outplays his higher-rated opponent completely, and on move 43 he starts a pawn push that will give him a second Queen at the cost of two minor pieces. But even with two Queens he cannot save the point...he submits to perpetual check in order to prevent mate (White misses 51.P-B7!1!)...Annotations by David Dustin

Anatol whose career with chess began







## The Ideas Behind The Nursery Rhymes...

THE NURSERY RHYMES were first published in Chess Life and Review during the summer of 1968. At that time most of our players were not into chess. During the Al Wallace Memorial, I showed the rhymes to some of the players who were USCF members in 1968 and none of them remembered them....

Have you ever wondered what happens when a chess-master is called upon to read nursery rhymes to his children. It usually goes something like this:

Jack & Jill: JACK AND JILL WENT UP THE HILL?... a good schematic theme, but premature in its application. They should complete their development and shore up their weaknesses before they break in the center. TO FETCH A PAIL OF WATER... for years, the favorite line of Samuel Coleridge, the ancient mariner. Coleridge finally abandoned the line, however, exclaiming: "Water, water, everywhere but not a drop to drink." JACK FELL DOWN AND BROKE HIS CROWN... and now the folly of their ill-timed escapade becomes crystal clear AND JILL CAME TUMBLING AFTER... forced, for if Jill leaves Jack, the mating chances will never materialize.

Little Miss Muffet: LITTLE MISS MUFFET SAT ON A TUFFET... much too passive. Mobilization is the name of the game. A better try was: 'She frolicked instead, on her water-bed.' or, even: 'The little kid did what she did', which is not as committal as most of the other lines. EATING HER CURDS AND WHEY... the main line, here, is: 'Eating her cheese-dip and yogurt.' The text move, however, while not in current vogue, is nevertheless, quite playable. ALONG CAME A SPIDER AND SAT DOWN BESIDE HER... at first glimpse, a quite move. But, actually, very dangerous, posing many ominous threats. AND FRIGHTENED MISS MUFFET AWAY!!... there was no defense. Black's attack in the Widow variation is deadly. (Score: 0-1)

Hickory Dickory Dock: HICKORY DICKORY DOCK. THE MOUSE RAN UP THE CLOCK... realizing his opponent was in serious time trouble, H. Dickory, the crafty doctor of rodent surgery, deliberately threw wild complications into the position. THE CLOCK STRUCK ONE, THE MOUSE RAN DOWN... Mouse's game would have been hopeless, anyway, even if his flag had not fallen. Giving up control of the open file eliminated any chance he had for effective counter-play. HICKORY DICKORY DOCK... reminiscent of the immortal pied piper of Hamelin.

## Americans Make Three Title Norms..With Youthful Talent

Never before has the USCF gained so many title norms for so little money (about \$3400) than at the 7th USCF International (Marshall International), played at the New York Club January 11-27 and sponsored by the American Chess Foundation and the club, as well as USCF.

Our young players continue to exceed all expectations; for the first time in over 30 years it seems possible we may actually have better young talent than the Soviets. Especially noteworthy at the Marshall tournament were the performances of the following.

**ANDY SOLTIS:** Tying for first with Grandmaster Shamkovich, Soltis made his first GM norm. One of our few International Masters who is not a professional chess player, Soltis may never be able to put in the time needed to realize his full potential, but at age 29, his chances for the required second norm and the GM title look bright.

**MICHAEL ROHDE:** His second international tournament, his second IM norm. He has now qualified for the IM title at age 17, probably the youngest IM in the world (a Lebanese player who made IM in a Zonal may be younger, but he achieved no norms). Mark Diesen's record as the youngest American IM since Fischer lasted less than a month. Rohde made the norm easily with two rounds remaining and then, perhaps dizzy with success, lost his last two games. His score against GM's in the tournament: 2-4-1!

**MARK DIESEN:** At 19 an IM by virtue of his being World Junior Champion, but he had never made the IM norm. He made it convincingly here, with a point extra--only a point short of the GM norm. His USCF rating should be almost 2440, which may be just a little short of 1977 US Championship qualification.

**KENNETH REGAN:** The most original, reckless, aggressive, and unpredictable of our juniors; he never plays a dull game. His results are also wildly volatile, and his Marshall performance reads like a fairy tale. Playing in his first International at 17, he took the lead with a 4-1 score, handing Soltis his only loss. Then, suddenly, everything changed, and he scored a total of ½ point in his next five games to fall to 4-5-4. A once certain-looking IM norm now seemed hopeless--to make the norm, he needed to score 3-1 against 3 GM's and an IM. Then came a draw with Lein and another with Matera--good results, but bad for IM chances; now he needed a perfect 2-0 against two GM's.

His next opponent, Shamkovich, was a point ahead of the field with 9-3 and red hot, having scored 5½ points in his last 6 games. Regan had not won a game in seven rounds, and in his typical style, opened 1 e4 c6 2 Nc3 d5 3 Qf3! The Grandmaster soon went astray, allowing a series of combinative shots, and Regan scored a magnificent victory to keep his norm chances alive and pull Shamkovich back to a first-place tie with Soltis.

Then came the last round and the greatest hurdle of all--Black vs. Bisguier. Regan's problems with Black are notorious. In the 6th USCF Futurity (New York, September 1976), he scored 4-4 with White and 4-3-4 with Black. He won the National Congress Master Section in November, scoring 4-0 with White and two draws with Black. In this tournament he had also failed to win any games with Black, losing three. But here a win was a must, and he held on to survive his usual shaky defense and gain the upper hand. A little combination on move 36 forced the GM's resignation after the time control, and the impossible dream had become reality.



 ent meeting quarters there for the Denver Chess Club. He copyrighted the club name to insure continuity. Within two months the debts were paid and the club equipment was saved, within two years the membership has grown to 80 and the financial structure is sound. Tournaments and Grandmasters are again being hosted.  
 During any discussion with John on Chess, he keeps returning to the young people...the youth...the youth...the strength of the new young players...he can recite the ratings and national standings of the top half dozen of the young Colorado players. He enjoys their successes and avidly follows their Chess careers.  
 John's brand of leadership reminds me of Eric Hoffer's lines on "creativity": "A creative organizer creates an organization that can function well without him. When a genuine leader has done his work his followers will say, 'we have done it ourselves', and feel that they can do great things without a great leader."  
 John has again turned over the reins and "retired" to the background. But it's comforting to know he's still keeping watch, still available. Colorado Chess owes John Howell a tremendous debt: 40 years a chessplayer, always a leader.
