

## 1980 Colorado Class Championships

This year CSCA returns the popular Class Championship tournament, but in a slightly changed form. Each player rated under 2000 may choose between two rated sections. For example, "A" players (or Category 1) may play up into section 1 against the Experts and Masters or may stay in section 2 against "A" and "B" players. We allow the option to play up one class or category because many Colorado players strongly desire the chance to try against higher rated players. So even though the setup looks confusing, it really isn't. The site in Colorado Springs should be excellent- see you there.

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### 3rd Annual Boulder Open

The 1980 Boulder Open was a very surprising tournament. We had really taken some chances in guaranteeing such a large prize fund, but based on past turnouts it seemed worth the risk. Chuck Johnson found an excellent site for a very good price, and Boulder merchants donated many special prizes for the players. All seemed to be going well. In fact, we received 108 advance entries; great, since there were only 118 players in '79. But then a blizzard hit the day before the tournament, and for much of the afternoon and evening Boulder was totally isolated, all roads were closed! Then the dozens of phone calls came, asking if the tournament would be held. Then the temperature dived to near zero. We worried and hoped we would not lose too much money.

But surprisingly after all these problems there were only about six cancellations and a few other no shows. Overall 176 players did make it -- the most in many years for a Colorado event. I wonder what the turnout would have been with good weather?

So after we finally got going one would hope that all would go routinely -- but that certainly did not happen. In fact none of the favorites in any of the sections managed to win. In the Championship section it was a remarkable series of upset after upset. The casualty list included the eleven highest rated players! Early losses were suffered by Masters Agrachov, Carlson, Fishbein and Brooks (Kansas City), and Experts Fordon, Madisen, Lunna (Oklahoma) and Haskins. After three rounds only Alan Piper (Kansas), Jim Hamblin, Brian Wall and Dave Eberly remained with perfect scores. Wall and Eberly drew while Hamblin won. Agrachov's loss to Richard Aiken of Grand Junction then set up final pairings of Hamblin-Wall and Aiken-Eberly.

Eberly won quickly, then waited for hours to see if Hamblin could win. He did not and so they each won \$375! Wall, Piper and Lunna tied for third, while Aiken won a special upset prize for victories over Madsen and Agrachov. The co-winners, although not expected to win, can certainly not be considered as unknowns. Hamblin has for many years been a top Colorado player,

but Eberly has only recently come to Boulder for graduate school and had prior to this been better known in postal chess circles where he has been rated in the top 25 nationally. Certainly both can be considered as contenders for future tournament victories.

Performance prizes went to Aiken, Bruce Johnson, Jim Dacus, Harvey Blair and Steve Hendrickson. Ray Haskins took top Junior -- a pair of binoculars.

The Premier Section definitely set the record for longest games with many five hour plus contests. But finally it came down to Pat Ament vs. Jim Hammersmith. The winner could take home \$150; a draw could yield a five-way tie. Hammersmith won a truly bizarre contest. He was followed by now 1900-rated 11-year-old Alexander Fishbein, Casper's Tom McClew and Colorado newcomer Helmut Lestinsky. Performance prizes were won by Darrend Brown and Mike Landem.

Booster Section spoils went to Gentry Dunlop after he capped a perfect score with a win over Top Unrated Jack Murdoch. Gentry won \$80 and 209 rating points -- not bad after a one year layoff. Dale Ogden won clear second. Performance prize winners were Will Oberlee (rating now 1354), Gerald Grimsley, Randy Tekavec, John Shriver and Dan Hilliard. Nathan Winterfield received a trophy as Top Boulder Junior.

The Reserve Section led to a battle of unrateds as Don Ogle and Tim McKenzie met for first. Ogle won and McKenzie split second place with Harold Long, Billy Harris, Matt Barna and Mike Broderick. Long, Broderick, Mark Ericson, Ken Chrisco and Brad Shepard took performance prizes. Karen Arp was Top Woman.

Special thanks should go to the thirteen out-of-staters who attended, especially Don Oswald of the Chess House in KC. His excellent stock of books, etc., were of interest to all. Also thanks to assistants Kiyoshi Akima and Dave Bardwick, and to Chuck Johnson and the fine Hilton staff.

We hope that many future successes will follow this one. Just wait 'til 1981's Boulder Open.

#### TWO NEW OPENING BOOKS

Sicilian Dragon: Yugoslav Attack by Tony Miles and Eric Moscow (B.T. Batsford; London 1979). Algebraic Notation. 148 pages.

Colle, London and Blackmar-Diemer Systems by T.D. Harding (B.T. Batsford; London 1979). Algebraic Notation. 104 pages.

These books share the same format, but are aimed at dissimilar audiences and reflect different attitudes towards chess authorship.

Miles and Moscow's Sicilian Dragon: Yugoslav Attack is an up-to-the-minute report on the vicissitudes in international chess of a notoriously tactical variation. Game examples come from the upper echelons, and the authors' emphasis is on lengthy, critical variations. The book benefits greatly from GM Miles' personal experience with the Dragon (he is one of the few world-class players to stick with the Black side) and from a judicious discarding of obsolete material. Both authors have specialized in various ...Qc7 lines, as a result of which these sections contain much original thought and analysis. But other chapters too are considerable improvements over the Encyclopedia B and Levy's Sicilian Dragon. Players on either side of this opening will be attracted by the recentness of material (into 1979 and including games which appeared in Informant #27); while, to the best of my knowledge, the research into older games is also comprehensive.

This is not, however, a book for the amateur or club player. Positional explanation is minimal (practically nonexistent for most lines), and some tactical detail has been left out. Neither omission is disturbing, since both presumably serve to keep the size and price down; the meat of the book, i.e. examples and analysis, remains. But one should not expect to be entertained, nor to be instructed about "underlying ideas", nor to be given a summary of which lines are best. Intelligent digging is required from the reader. In short, this is an excellent book for the tournament player who includes or wishes to include the Dragon in his repertoire.

T.D. Harding has authored a number of opening works, of which I recommend The Leningrad Dutch as a good buy. His latest release, Colle, London and Blackmar-Diemer Systems, attempts to fill a long-standing gap in the literature of queen pawn openings. It has 3 chapters on the Colle System, 2 on "London Systems" (e.g. 1 d4 d5 2 Nf3 c5 3 Bf4), 1 on the "Stonewall" (for White), and one on the Blackmar-Diemer Gambit (1 d4 d5 2 e4!?).

While it is certainly commendable to tackle such neglected topics as 1 d4 d5 2 Nf3 Nf6 3 Bf4, I'm not always pleased with the approach Harding takes. Most of the double queen pawn chapters (Colle, London vs. 1...d5, and Stonewall) consist of lists of opening excerpts with an assessment appended. Too many of the "examples" go only 6 or 8 moves into the game; particularly for these fragments, the assessments tend to be quite unjustified. Also lacking are positional guidelines; when the author finally does make a statement to the effect that, say, ...Nbd7 strategies are superior to ...Nc6 strategies, he sometimes bases it solely on the results of two horribly botched games. The contrast here with Miles and Moscow's book is clear: Harding has simply a much harder task to fulfill, i.e. the careful analysis of hundreds of technical positions which don't tactically resolve themselves. Perhaps he needed to have spent an extra year or two doing this? While there are (thankfully) overall conclusions for each chapter, original analysis and ideas are sorely missed.

For other sections, however, the annotations and prose treatment perk up. I particularly enjoyed the Blackmar-Diemer analysis (based on Harding's own correspondence games and numerous Blackmar-Diemer tournaments), not only for its inherent spriteliness, but also for the systematic way in which the author shows players of both White and Black which lines are promising, obscure, or unplayable. Also, his discussion of the London System versus the King's Indian Defense is improved by an obvious personal interest. As the quantity of original suggestions and game notes rises, he begins to make some finely-tuned distinctions between available middlegame strategies.

In contrast to the Miles/Moscow effort, Colle, London and Blackmar-Diemer Systems deals with few recent IM or GM games. The bulk of Harding's material comes from either pre-1940 tournaments or correspondence chess; one must admire the research and organization that went into it. Also by contrast, his introduction explicitly appeals to the player who hasn't the time "to study the fashionable openings which the masters play and ... keen students imitate." The contents are held out to be "uncommon but sound" and "more dangerous than their reputations." It seems true that the amateur might appreciate a system which pretty much eliminates the chance for an early knockout. I simply feel that additional prose might have made it more enjoyable for the chess book lover. As it stands, then, I recommend Harding's book not to the tournament player but to the average club player who wishes to employ or defend one of the systems considered.

TOUGHER THAN EVER: Florida Wins Intercollegiate  
by Harold Winston, ICLA Historian

The Pan American Intercollegiate returned to the west coast after an absence of 15 years and drew 42 teams and 137 players, the lowest attendance since 1967. Western colleges did not turn out in force; only 15 western teams competed compared to 14 back in 1964 (but UCLA deserves credit for fielding 4 teams). Host school University of Southern California showed it cared much more about football than chess in providing a poorly lit playing hall and far less financial support than expected; but the players behaved very well despite adverse conditions. Despite its size this was the strongest Pan Am ever: 21 masters and 35 experts made up almost one third of the players (last year 15 masters entered). Fourteen teams were rated over 2000 led by Yale (2344), Colorado (2211), Toronto (2208) and Pennsylvania (2191). Defending Champions Yale, boasting IM Michael Rohde at first board, were the clear favorites; last year Yale had not only won all 8 of its matches but not lost any of its 32 games! Yale, Toronto, and Penn each had 3 masters. Four Soviet emigres were competing: Sergei Kudrin of Columbia, Leonid Bass of Purdue, Dmitry Agrachov of Colorado, and Andras Budinzky of Texas.

Yale's aura of invincibility shattered at the start when they lost a game while beating Texas at Austin 3-1. In round 3 Yale rested Michael Rohde against Florida and won the top 2 boards anyway but then lost Board 3 on time and then their Board 4 also overstepped. All Florida had to do to tie the match was call the forfeit. But, to the amazement of a horde of spectators, the Florida player made 7 more moves, looking only at his own clock, and then offered a draw which was accepted with alacrity. While other teams talked of Yale luck the Floridian explained he thought Florida had drawn on Board 3 and the match had been lost whatever he did. Meanwhile some Yale rivals had their own problems. Colorado was upset at the start by UCLA C 2½-1½, Columbia fell to UCLA B 3-1 in the next round, Penn lost to both Rhode Island College and Chicago, while Toronto lost a tough fight to Purdue 2½-1½. Yale and Purdue both emerged with 4-0 records at the halfway mark and then Purdue (2063) held Yale to a tie to keep snaring the lead.

Purdue's moment of glory was brief as it lost 2 straight matches to Florida and Chicago. Yale repulsed Toronto but then ran into a determined Minnesota team out to avenge their loss to Yale in last year's finale. Minnesota tied Yale and Peter Thompson drew Michael Rohde who was 5-0 before the match. That left Yale and Florida leading with 6-1 followed by Chicago and Minnesota at 5½. All four schools had a chance at first as Chicago challenged Yale and Minnesota met Florida. Minnesota was slightly higher rated but Florida won 2½-1½. Danish master Ove Krøll beat Rohde and the Yale match stood 1½-1½ with Chicago in a better position on the remaining board. Then time trouble hit both players, Todd Barre of Chicago offered a draw after he had moved and Steve Kaufman of Yale asked spectators if he could accept a draw after his flag fell (the answer of course is no) and he overstepped. Yale protested, claiming the draw offer was harassment, Chief TD Phil Chase ruled for Chicago and an appeals committee upheld his ruling. After Chicago's team had left Yale claimed Barre had


