POSTAL CHESS

Rocky Mountain Postal Chess will offer a CSCA postal championship for 1983. Entries open when you received this and will close 12/31/83. If more than 9 entries are received, we will assign multiple sections. You will play one game per opponent, algebraic will be the notation, and the time limit will be 3days per move. Entry fee will be \$4 and \$3 of it will go into the prize fund(s).

I have received no game results in 82B1 with C. Moore, L. Gill, C. Wilson, and A. Gardner. Must be some close games. Below are the crosstables for the *82 champs as of 9/18/83.

Robert Holland submitted the following game from the 1979 Golden Squires Semifinal. His own comments are in parentheses. The major points in the game are 1) opening reference and opening principles, and 2) how soon should one resign.

TERRY LIPTAK (B) — ROBERT HOLLAND (C)

1.e4	g6
2.d4	Bg7
3.Nf3	d6
4.Bc4	c5?

Usual here is 4...Nf6. I found that MCO 11 OKs this move, but my book on the Pirc doesn't consider it. ECO gives it a cursory footnote.

5.dxc5! Qa5+
This Queen sortie is necessary to maintain material equality for awhile, but White will use the exposed Queen to develop with threats.

6.c3 Qxc5
7.Qb3 e6
8.Be3 Qc7

(Book to this point.)

9.Na3(?)!
This is where Bob's opening reference proves to have been inadequate. MCO 11 gives only 9.Nbd2 Nc6 10.Nd4 a6 = from a 1970 game. Bob's opponent follows ECO.

9... a6
ECO gives 9...Bd7 10.Bf4 Ne7 11.Rd1 Nc8 12.Nd4! from Euwe-Penrose 1958. It is a wonder that MCO overlooks this game and should be a warning to those who blindly follow their book. Chess opening theory is constantly evolving, and even ECO is outdated as soon as it hits the presses, so spending \$150 on it is still no guarantee to accuracy. Opening principles warn against early Queen development. If Bob would have headed that principle and used a different line he would not have bought so much of the trouble he sees shortly.

10.Bb6 Qc6
11.O-O-O Nf6
(White has a vicious attack.) Bob's 9th proves no better than Penrose's.

12.Nb5 O-O
Of course, 12...Qxb6 loses to 13.Nxd6+, while 12... Nxe4 13.Nc7+ wins the QR and strands the Black King in the center. How about 12...axb5? Why, 13.Bxb5!

13.Nc7 Nxe4(!)
I don't see the greatness here, Bob.

14.Nxa8 d5
15.Bxd5(!?)
It often is advantageous to relinquish some excess material, when winning, to deflect an opponent's counterattack. It can gain valuable tempi for consolidating a position while the red herring is gathered in. But this is not the time or manner for that in this game. The Rook is not fully won until the QN is extricated from a8. Here White gives back a different piece and the QN still needs to be rescued. Good is 15.Bd3 threatening Black's advanced Knight.

15... exi5
16.Qxd5?
White should play 16.Bd4 Bxd4 17.Rxd4 Nxf2 18.Rf1 Ne4 19.Ne5. He will win the Pd5 to remain up an exchange.

16... Bf4(!)
It's about time Black moves a Q-side piece. He's developing a good attack, threatening 17...Bh6+ 18.Kb1 Nxf2+ 19.Ka1 Nxb1 regaining his lost material.

17.Be3(?)??
Simply 17.Qxc6 Nxc6 18.Nc7 Bh6+ 19.Be3 Bxe3 20.fxe3 Nf2 21.Rhf1 22.Nxd1 Rxd1 leaves White still up a pawn.

17... Nxc3+(1)!!
18.Qxc6 Nxa2+(1)
19.Kd2 Nxc6
20.Nb6 Bxb2
21.Na4?

In endings, as in other phases of the game, pieces belong in the center. So White should play 21.Nc4. It looks like he wishes to play Ke2 and tries to defend against Nc3+

21... Ba3
22.Ke2?

Better is 22.Nd4 trying to exchange pieces.
22... Bc2
23.Rd2 Bxa4

24.Ra1
Not 24.Rxa2 Bb5+ 25.Kd2 Rd8+ 26.Kc2 Nb4+.

24... Bb5+
25.RESIGN(11)

Bob wonders if White resigned too soon.

In theory, no. On 25.Kd1 Nc3+ Black extracts the piece. While 25.Kd2 Ncb4 26.Raxa2 Nxa2 27.Rxa2 Bb4 leaves Black with two connected Q-side passed pawns plus the Bishop pair to help them along. Practically, White resigned too early. A Class C postalite usually doesn't play endings well. However, I think White found himself psychologically defeated. He royally blew the middle game and Black found the one startling resource in Bf5 and Nxc3.

I still welcome scores on postal games you feel are interesting. Even non-masterpieces such as this one can offer you and the readers insight into this game we all love so much.


Time Pressure





Ft. Collins Spring Tourney Rating

Mark Ludwig garnered together the results of this tourney which it seems TD Tom Smythe did not submit for rating. Hopefully, he got it right since he had to reconstruct some of the tournament from his memory and conjecture. He submitted it to USCF for rating. If they will still rate it, those who did well in it will see their rating gains. If Mark got the results wrong, those who failed to send theirs to him had better get the corrections (i.e., their results) to him so he can correct the crosstable he'll get as soon as it arrives.

KORCHNOI, CHRISTIANSEN TIE FOR U.S. OPEN

Getting a chance to play some chess despite the Soviet boycott of the scheduled world championship championship candidates match in Pasadena, California, Swiss Grandmaster Viktor Korchnoi has tied for first place in the annual U.S. Open Championship. Equalling Korchnoi's score of 10½ points out of 12 games, GM Larry Christiansen of Los Angeles (who had tied for the U.S. Closed Championship just a week before) was declared co-champion. The tournament at the Huntington Sheraton Hotel, with a record-breaking 836 participants (including 102 masters), ended August 19.

Korchnoi's score included draws with International Master Joel Benjamin (Brooklyn), Canadian champion (and fellow Soviet defector) Igor Ivanov, and Christiansen. His victims included IM John Fedorowicz (Clearwater, Fla.), who had led with a perfect score for the first seven rounds; IM Dmitry Gurevich (Brooklyn); and, in the final round, GM Yasser Seirawan (Seattle). Seirawan, who was Korchnoi's second in the 1981 world championship match, had been scheduled to be chief commentator for the aborted match.

Christiansen, after taking a first-round bye and drawing with Brazilian Master Marcos Paolozzi in round 6, moved into a tie for first by downing Ivanov in the tenth round, made Korchnoi work for the draw in round 11, and then decisively beat Benjamin. The two winners each received a trophy and \$3,250.

Tied for third were Gurevich and World Chess Federation Master Jay Whitehead of San Francisco. Gurevich was upset along the way by National Master David Glueck (Cincinnati), but won key games against IM Jorge Szmetan (Argentina) and GM Arthur Bisguier in the last two rounds. Whitehead was undefeated, drawing with Benjamin, Fedorowicz, IM Dennis Verduga (Ecuador), and IM John Ready. His key wins at the end were against Larry Remlinger and Ivanov.

Mhosrow Choobak (Villa Park, Cal.) won the prize for masters rated under 2400. Tied for second with nine points were Glueck, Paolozzi, FM Tibor Weinberger, Andrei Hencu, David Herman, James Naki, and Harry Radtke. Nine candidate masters scored 8½ points, with Henry Terrie winning the trophy on tie-breaks over Conrad Batchelder, Don Bicknell, Stephen Dykstra, Moshe Khatena, John Jarecki, Bill McGeary, Paul Zeigler, and BRILLE, the world champion computer from Bell Labs. It beat four masters and drew with Senior Master Craig Mar. This marks the best showing yet by a computer in a national event, but only the humans were eligible for prize money, and they split \$1,500.

The excitement of a record-breaking U.S. Open, with participation of Korchnoi and Seirawan, has gone a long way to ease the disappointment of chess fans who were eagerly anticipating the candidates match. (Note: The Stephen Dykstra mentioned above is from Aurora, Col.)

THREE WAY TIE IN U.S. CHAMPIONSHIP

The U.S. Championship tournament at Thiel College, Greenville, Penn. ended July 31 in a three-way tie. Grandmasters Walter Browne of Berkeley, Cal., Larry Christiansen of Los Angeles, and Roman Dzindzichashvili of Corona, N.Y., all scored 9-4 in the round robin and were declared co-champions. Each was undefeated, with five wins and eight draws.
