

CSCA BOARD MTG 4/26/84

Meeting called to order by Vice-President John Cohen at 7:30PM. Attending were Board members Cohen, Siebert, Sayeedi, Wood, Ludwig. Also present were CSCA members Karen Arp and Sherwin Towbin.

Ludwig gave the Treasurer's report. \$977.26 in checking, \$3308.17 in savings, and \$85 cash. This is about an \$80 net loss for the year.

Cohen reported on the Informant. Not mailed since Grimes was unable to get labels from Akima. Bruce is moving to C. Springs and wants an assistant.

Some discussion about a computer for CSCA to use for the roster, Informant, treasurer, secretary, and maybe even TD/registration. Ludwig has considered buying an HP150 PC and donating it to CSCA. It would have 1/4Mbyte, dual mini-floppy drive, and a dot matrix printer. Retail value is about \$4000 but he can get it for about \$2250.

Vacancies on the board have been caused by the verbal resignation of Richard Klabunde and treasurer Dale Fleming. Mark Wood has resigned the office of President, but has retained his position on the Board for now. Cohen will assume the office of President, Sayeedi will assume the office of Vice-President, and Ludwig will take over the position of Treasurer. Ludwig nominated Karen Arp as Secretary and Sherwin Towbin as a Board member, Sayeedi seconded and was passed 5-0.

Cohen reported that Coors might support tournaments or the Tour to the tune of \$2-5K. He and David Helt are working on it.

Tournaments have been scheduled for Lamar in July and LaJunta in June. Ken Case is willing to be liason for tournaments in the southern part of the state. DCC didn't hold the St. Patrick's Day event because of the short notice. But more tournaments in Denver, particularly away from holiday weekends, have been requested by members. The Metro State site is free Sat. and costs \$150-200 on Sun. and Holidays. Howard Johnson South is currently booked for poker nights, but the law change should make it available for smaller events--cost last year was \$100 per day.

The Scholastic event in April had 16 teams (63 students) with Boulder first, and Wheatridge second on tiebreak. Rice might give a simul at Castle Rock soon. Fleming is still teaching at Evergreen. Pueblo wants to do the team tournament next year.

Ludwig moved to change the Tour such that it is funded from a \$0.50 per player charge to the event and such that the prizes will be from whatever is in the fund in the same proportion as the previous years prizes were awarded. Siebert second. Passed 6-0 with Sayeedi abstaining and Wood absent.

Siebert announced that Ray Dougherty has a Computer Bulletin Board with which he would provide announcements about chess if we were to provide announcement of the service.

We discussed having the Editor be required to be on the Board but weren't able to reach a conclusion as to its implementation. We also discussed committee reports at board meetings, getting committee heads to be at Board meetings. Siebert pointed out USCF policy of appointing for each committee a liason board member.

Siebert presented the "Make Your Best Move" poster from USCF. He also showed us the new registration forms. He told us that the US Masters has been approved by USCF.

The Colorado Open format will be set at the next meeting.

Patron memberships need to be promoted as required with Wylie, Yoshinaga, and Gerash being noted as such for their past support.

Ludwig move that the meeting be adjourned until 2PM at Greeley.

Opening Analysis:

Page one of the analysis shows all the different openings (at least to my ability to classify them) and the results by section. For example, the "2-1-0" under the French Defense in the Open means that three games were played and White won two of them. Further, "62-60-19" in the lower right corner means that 141 games were played, of which White won 62, Black 60 and 19 were draws. The readers of the Colorado Chess Informant may be interested in what openings they are likely to face. Page two summarizes the probabilities, e.g., almost 1/2 of the games were opened 1. P-K4. Of those, 1/2 were answered with 1. ... P-K4. I also looked at the length of the games. There was no significant pattern found here. In fact, most games last between 20 and 50 moves and it appears to be a uniform distribution within that range.

Interesting Games:

1. Crocker (1619) vs Russell (1829) - Although White got into trouble and dropped a piece, a slick sacrifice at the end won the game.
2. Daniels vs Bailey - White gets into trouble and charges brazenly to crack Black's Kingside. It doesn't work and the end game is boring, but the question is if there is another line which would work.
3. Greco (1429) vs Salem (996) - A great midgame trap proves that pinned Knights are not always pinned. I have seen this trap in the books, but never in real life - certainly not by a 996 rated player.
4. Diltz vs Swendig - Oh how a passive opening can go awry only to be topped off with mate by a pawn.
5. Redmond vs Wylie - A beautiful mid-to-end game where the coordination of Bishops and Rooks are a sight to behold. The opening is non-descript.
6. Helt vs Crockern - A odd King move by Black a surprising Knight move by White and its "Say goodnight Dick". When you can't count the threats on one hand, you've got problems.







If another Postal Class A or stronger player would express a similar interest, I will invite the best of CSCA's USCF postalites to play a USCF rated RMPC Championship, with 2 games per opponent for an \$8 entry fee. Depending on USCF's rating fee, about \$5 per player would go to the winner take all prize fund.

Another interested party is Tom Preston, an active crossboard Class C player. Anyone interested in playing Tom? With 2 players, I'll try to look for more.

Nothing new has been officially reported in 82B1 and 82RM1. 82RM2 has Leroy Nickelson beating Mark Wood, and drawing Dan Shippey. 83RM1 had Dale Fleming and Mike Milner withdraw.

Anthony Thomason said he beat Lance Gill in 82RM1 and was working on comments for the game, but he did not get it to me by the publisher's deadline. So I am forced to bore you with this brief game I just finished in the '81 Squires Semi-final.

M. Ludwig (1528) vs H. Lahman (1150)
1.c4 Nf6
2.Nc3 g6
3.e4 Bg7?!

I have used this variation for many years in order to avoid the Gruenfeld (our club has a player who specializes in it, and I prefer to fight on my own terms). I always thought that it forced 3...d6 and a King's Indian type of game. I still think it does, but my opponent thought otherwise.

4.e5 Nh5?

On 4...Ng8, Black has lost 2 tempi, but White's center could be vulnerable to counter-attack. After all, what are Black's weak points to be attacked?

5.d4 f5?

My opponent later said he meant 5...c5, owing to the confusion of not usually using the required algebraic notation. His suggested line to support this move was 5...c5 6.g4 cxd4 7.Qxd4 Nc6 8.Qd1 Nxe5 9.gxh5 Qc7 10.b3 Qc6. There are several errors in this analysis. A mistake is 10.b3 which allows Nxc4. But more crucial is that White need not allow the pressure to be so great: 8.Qe4 Bxe5 9.gxh5 f5 10.Qe2 or 9...Bxc3+ 10.bxc3 Qa5 11.Qf3 Ne5 12.Qg3. This works better because the Queen protects the vital c4 and c6 squares for awhile. The move played seems inferior to 5...Bf8 which opens g7 for retreating the Knight--positionally it stinks, but he is still got some fight in him.

6.Be2 c5
7.d5! Bxe5
8.Bxh5 Qa5

Here 8...gxh5 9.Qxh5+ Kf8 10.Qxf5+ Bf6 11.Bh6+ Kg8 12.Qg4+ Kf7 13.Qh5+ looks like suicide in the face of Ng1-f3 to either d5 or g5.

9.Be2 d6
10.Bd2 resign

PALCIAUSKAS TAKES WORLD CORRESPONDENCE TITLE

Victor Palciauskas, 41, of Fullerton, Calif., has won the tenth world correspondence championship. No U.S. player has come close to top honors since Hans Berliner of Pittsburgh won the fifth event in the series in 1968.

KAMINSKY A SURPRISE WINNER IN U.S. CLASS CHAMPIONSHIP

Oleg Kaminsky of Indianapolis upset several higher ranked masters to win the top section of the U.S. Class Championship. The six section tournament was held at the Holiday Inn South in Louisville, Kentucky's first national event, it attracted a good turnout of 298 players.

Kaminsky, 53, emigrated from the Soviet Union just last September, His first U.S. tournaments were in November. He defeated U.S. co-champion Grandmaster Roman Dzindzichashvili in the third round, drew with International Master Calvin Blocker of Shaker Heights, Ohio in round four, and downed Senior Master David Sprenkle in the finale, to win clear first and a prize of \$1,000.

ELO. HANAUER HONORED AS U.S. CHESS CELEBRATES 45TH ANNIVERSARY

The only two surviving participants of the 1939 meeting which resulted in the founding of the U.S. Chess Federation were honored recently. May 24 was declared Founders Day, with Arpad Elo, 80, of Brookfield, Wis., and Milton Hanauer, 75, of New York receiving tributes from President Tim Redman and others at the New Windsor office.

The 1939 meeting in Chicago voted to merge the American Chess Federation and the National Chess Federation, creating a 500 member organization aimed at promoting chess in general and organizing national closed and open championships. This was the genesis of today's 55,000 member organization.

ILYA GUREVICH EARNS MASTER TITLE AT AGE 12

Ilya Gurevich of Worcester, Mass. has become the second youngest player in U.S. history to earn the master title. Gurevich's performance in the West Suburban Summer Grand Prix tournament in Framingham, Mass., June 2-3, unofficially pushed his rating over the 2200 level. This result will be officially confirmed shortly when the tournament is rated.

Gurevich, with a pre-tournament rating of 2186, scored 3-1 to tie for first with Senior Masters James Rizzitano and John Curdo. He lost to Rizzitano in the first round, but then defeated Master Louis Mercuri, the unrated but strong Dutch player Renier Barendregt, and expert Alex Cherniack. As a master, Gurevich is now in the top 1 1/2% of rated players.

Gurevich's feat, at the age of 12 years and three months, has been topped by only one player. Stuart Tachels of Birmingham, Ala., now 14, achieved his master title at the age of 11 years, ten months.

SPASSKY TO PLAY UNDER FRENCH FLAG

Former world champion Boris Spassky has revealed that he will no longer compete under the Soviet flag. Spassky, 47, has lived in France with his French born wife since 1976, while retaining Soviet citizenship and competing in international events as a Soviet.

According to a Reuters dispatch, Spassky announced his decision in a June 13 interview with the Yugoslav news agency Tanjug. He stated that he has had increasing difficulties with the Soviet Sports Committee since a tournament in Linares, Spain in February 1983, when he finished first, a half point ahead of world champion Anatoly Karpov. Their individual game was drawn. Soviet officials see it as very important that Karpov finish first in international tournaments.

Further friction was reportedly caused when Spassky recently played for a German club against a Soviet club in European team play.

While making it clear that he will never again compete under the Soviet flag after the recent tournament in Bugohno, Yugoslavia, Spassky also was careful to avoid attacking the Soviet Union generally, stating that he is not a dissident. While he has long gone his own way (refusing, for instance, to sign an officially sponsored petition condemning Viktor Korchnoi after the latter's 1976 defection to the

West), Spassky has tended not to make public statements which might elicit official chastisement. He has relatives, including children by a previous marriage, in the Soviet Union.

Spassky told the interviewers that he expects to play under the French flag from now on, including this year's Olympiad in Thessaloniki, Greece, which starts November 19. France has some improving young International Masters, including Bachar Kouatly, Gilles Andruet, and Aldo Haik. The addition of Spassky would give France its strongest Olympiad team since the Thirties, when then world champion Alexander Alekhine played.

KASPAROV AGAIN TOPS WORLD RATING LIST

World championship challenger Gary Kasparov of the Soviet Union is again the top ranked player on the semi annual World Chess Federation Rating list. The list will be released soon by U.S. Chess, which processes rating data for FIDE, and will be official on July 1.

Kasparov gained five points with his victories over fellow Grandmasters Viktor Korchnoi of Switzerland and former world champion Vassily Smyslov of the Soviet Union in the final two candidates matches, and is now rated 2715. World champion Anatoly Karpov, also of the Soviet Union, is close behind at 2705.
