

RMPC sent out a section of seven players who entered the 1983 tournament--see crosstables. Included was beloved past President Randy Siebert who actual can play the game if he wants to. There seems to be a smattering of interest in regional chess competition in these parts, so look for the new offering from RMPC in the next issue.

Ken Krug made short work of most of his opponents in 82RM2. Ken sent in his quick game with President Mark (a.k.a. Andrew P.) Wood. My comments are in parentheses.

(The Benko Gambit always makes for an interesting game. The last time I saw it in print was in these pages long ago and Black got hammered.)

(I haven't seen it declined this way before, but it is in a footnote in ECO which gives it the ?!.)

5...	Nxd5
6.e4	Nc7

Here 6...Nb4 7.Qxc5 e6 8.Qc3 d5 9.a3 a5 (What about 9...axb5 10.Bxb5 Bd7?) 10.Qb3 now the Knight falls, but 8...axb5 9.a3 Nc6 (which one?) 10.Bxb5 Black gets play for the pawn, e.g. 10...Ba6. (I like 10...Bb4 11.axb4 Rxa1 12.Qxg7 Rf8 13.Bd3 Nxb5 14.Qc3 Nxd3 15.Qxd3 Qa5+ 16. Bd2 Qa2, so it looks like 9.a3 is an error if the response is 9...N4c6. So 9.Bxb5 is better for it 9...Nxa2, then 10.Qc4.)

(The point of the Benko is that the c-pawn holds back the White b-pawn while the a-pawn can't go any where alone. So the semi-open files provide Black with compensation. White's variation gets the pesky c-pawn.)

I didn't think Mark would take here. I expected 8...f6 9.Qg3 puts pressure on g6 and c7, and I would have been happy just to weaken his Kingside pawns.

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Black's only choice is 21...Kc8 which White will answer with Rac1 pinning the Bishop, bringing the a-Rook into play. All of White's pieces are actively placed, Black's pieces are cramped, his King is in the middle of the board. Mark Wood also knows this and choose not to play on.

The 1984-85 Tour will be run in a similar format to past years but with even more tourneys than before! Loveland and Grand Junction join the Tour this year and more new events may be added later. Prizes for the Tour have not yet been determined - details soon. Hope to see you at the next big tour event.

1984 Loveland Open

This year's Loveland Open was quite successful. Seventy-one players attended, up from 49 last year. Several factors can probably be attributed to the increase: 3 sections instead of 2, being a Tour event, and maybe the customized time controls with more time in the Open and less time in the Reformation (under 1483). Interestingly, over half of the Open entries were eligible for the lower sections but only a few of these that played up were possible prize contenders in the Antebellum (under 1861) section. Only 5 of the potential top players in the Reformation sec. went for the longer time controls and stronger opposition in higher sections.

After an hour delay of registration because TD Mark Ludwig was given a key to the playing site which was too thick to fit into the lock, play was started only 35 minutes late. The site proved ideal for the varied time controls, with each section in its own room. Therefore, the lower sections were started while long games in the Open on Saturday were dragging on. Also the start time of the last round was moved up in the Reformation section. The weather Sunday morn caused a couple withdrawals, a couple of forfeits, and a couple of no-shows even though it was totally dry in Loveland.

Winning the Open section was Master Randy Canney with 4 wins. Clear second went to Master Dave Jellison at 3½-1½. Tied for third at 3-1 were Al Bardwick and John Siddeek. Under 1984 prize money went to Joe Chandler, Dan Joelson, Dave Landers, Franco Gaudiano, and Vance Aandahl.

Winning the Antebellum section with 4 wins was Scott Massey. Tying for second at 3-1 were Larry Brindley, Jack Newgent, James Nelson, and Waldemar Woszczak.

Splitting the point in the last round and also first place prize money in the Reformation section was Tom Preston and unrated Myron China. Splitting third place prize at 3-1 were Brad Long, Ruth Wylie, Eric Holwitt, and Cliff Bailey. Also finishing at 3-1 were the under 1300 prize winner, Greg Olender, and the best unrated prize winner, Bob Ekstam.

SEVENTH ANNUAL BOULDER OPEN

This year's Boulder Open saw International Master Igor Ivanov successfully defend his 1983 title. The two time Church's Grand Prix winner scored a perfect 5-0 with victories over Brad Lundstrom, Todd Bardwick, Leo Schirber (New Mexico), Alex Fishbein and Illinois Senior Master David Sprenkle. His games were displayed on a demo board and drew considerable attention from spectators. Finishing second was Utah's Craig Madsen. In third were Fishbein, Schirber, Sprenkle, Dave Jellison and Ray Haskins. Jeff Maguire won the upset prize, while Steve Towbin and Franco Gaudiano earned performance prizes. Sean Scott and R. Garcia split under 2100, Gaudiano, Paul Sharpe and Joe Eversole tied for under 2000.

In the Premier section CU's Rich Sweetman tied with Utah's Edwin Schreiber for first, third place went to John Bregar and Mani Sayeedi. Canadian S. Azmat Hussain and Ed Pointer split the under 1850. Chris Miller and Bill Roem garnered performance prizes.

Booster Section top money was split by Ken Krug, Tad Kelley and Rapid City's Tim Knudtson. Tim Moreland and Fred Corbalis tied for under 1650. Vic Skromny, Andy Hanson, Greg Funaro, and W. Woszczak won performance prizes. Reserve Section laurels went to Dave Bowers. At 4½ were Jim Eller, Mike Allen and unrated Mitch Herman. Charles Zawadski and Lee Pflugbeil won under 1400 prizes. Greg Hollman, Greg Olender and Mike Huffman tied for under 1250.

In the MiniSwiss Greg Vitko and Jerry Farmer both went 3-0. Dayne Nix and Dave Hecht shared under 1600. Best unrated prize for the tournament went to Tim Niebauer.

In the scholastic divisions Dan Krueger and Joe McCormick shared the High School top prizes. Derek Toomre, Tom Zak, and Stephen Sher split third. Junior High

honors went to Garrett Moss. Alex Collinsworth captured second ahead of Paul Winn and Show Bolsinger. The Elementary section was the largest of all and saw Will Kennish tie with Russell Adams at 4-0. Ian Schreiber won third. Nikki Crosby and Janelle Cloud earned Best Girl prizes.

For the third year the Boulder Open attracted over 300 players. This year directing was shared by Randy Siebert, Mark Ludwig, Kioshi Akima, and Dale Flemming. There are hopes of attracting more big name players in 1985 but we will need to wait to find out.

COLORADO CHESS INFORMANT EXCLUSIVE  
INTERVIEW: Harry Mormonson

CCI Correspondent Mani Sayeedi recently conducted an exclusive interview with Category IV world champion and 4-time U.S. D player victor Harry Mormonson, the text of which is printed below.

CCI: Mr. Mormonson, I would first like to congratulate you on your recent victory over Lamman Petdaisian in the world championship.

HM: Well thank you, it was a tough fight but the Russians can't win 'em all.

CCI: Would you go over your last game briefly for our readers?

HM: Certainly, I was white, which was almost enough for victory itself...

CCI: Excuse me, but do you really think the first move is worth that much?

HM: It isn't the first move that is so valuable, it's the fact that dark pieces absorb light while white pieces reflect light, making the white pieces seem enormous while the black pieces shrink into little black holes.

CCI: Oh, you mean playing white gives you a psychological edge?

HM: Exactly. As an added touch I sometimes conspicuously display my copy of 'Uncle Tom's Cabin' or my 'Revenge of the Jedi' poster where my opponent is most likely to have a good view of it during the game.

In any event, I opened 1.e4 in the last game, to which Lamman replied ..e5? This is clearly inferior to ..e6 as this game amply demonstrates. 2.Bc4 Nc6 3.Qf3 Nf6! (this move shows the extensive preparation which Petdaisian and his seconds had done before the game. They must have seen my recent game with Cleveland's champion B player Noeser Saralost who played the

natural 3...a6, only to lose to 4.Q:f7!!)  
4.g4 a6 5.g5 and the error of his first move becomes clear, 5...N:P (what else?)  
6.Q:f7 mate!

CCI: Truly an amazing game. I heard a rumor that you played a game with Anatoly Karpov while you were in his country for the world Cat. IV championships. Is this true?


HM: Yes. A wealthy friend of mine bet MR. Karpov \$1 million, getting 4-1 odds that I could defeat Karpov in a single game. I did quite well, actually, I was up a queen after only three moves.

CCI: Up a full queen against Anatoly Karpov?

HM: Yes indeed, for he took black as part of the bet. The game went 1.d4 (I figured Karpov probably knew a lot of the 1.e4 lines) 1...a6 (Karpov falls into my snare. While this looks like the natural reply, it is in reality a fatal error) 2.Bg5! e6(virtually forced) 3.B:d8 and I won his queen. Here Karpov's friends couldn't contain themselves from laughing, but, undaunted, the world champion came back to win the game.

CCI: Do you have any advice for our readers?

HM: Well, my game with Karpov contains a very important piece of advice: Never lose heart when others laugh at you. I learned the value of this while playing this endgame from the black side:



Now everyone knows that a Bishop is more valuable than a Knight. That, coupled with my enormous space disadvantage should give White an easy win. This was, no doubt, what was going on in the minds of the group of masters that happened upon our game and broke into laughter. Undaunted, I played on and managed to win after White made a fatal error which dropped his Bishop, forcing him to resign. So don't lose heart when others laugh.



The WYOMING KNIGHTS 'Lincoln Memorial' Swiss, held in Laramie the weekend of February 11/12, 1984 was won by Ted McMahon with a score of 3-1. McMahon was undefeated attaining 2 wins and 2 draws and became the first player within the past 4 years to win 2 consecutive WYOMING KNIGHTS Tournaments. The Lincoln Memorial was a 4-round round robin and placing 2nd was Clarence Billemez with a score of 2½-1½, and placing 3rd was Ed Smith with a score of 2-2. Five players participated and the event was directed for WYOMING KNIGHTS by Ted McMahon.

Currently WYOMING KNIGHTS has in progress the 1984 University of Wyoming Championship. Ten players are entered for a 4 round Swiss, being held on Thursday evenings on the U/Wyoming campus.

The last event before the 1984 Wyoming State Open Championship that WYOMING KNIGHTS will sponsor for the Spring, 1984, semester, will be the 2nd Laramie Spring Invitational, to be held the 2 successive weekends of April 28/29 and May 5/6, 1984. Four players have accepted invitations and they are: Al Emmons, 1820, Ted McMahon, 1754, Clarence Villemez, 1660 and R.W. Cohen, 1613.

An informal speed (5-minute) tournament was held during U/Wyoming Spring break, sponsored by WYOMING KNIGHTS in Laramie on Thursday, March 8, 1984. Seven players participated in a Double-Round Robin Colors event with colors reversed. Dan Dumbrell of Cheyenne was clear first with 9/3. Ed Smith of Cheyenne was 2nd with 8/4, and Randy Kniss of Laramie was 3rd with 6/6. This event consisted of 42 'speed/blitz' (5-minutes games) and was directed by Ted McMahon and Craig Skinner for WYOMING KNIGHTS.

A new Wyoming/USCF State Affiliate has formed in Evanston, WY under the leadership of Lance Gill. Further organizational meetings to launch the new Wyoming Chess Association have been scheduled between Round #'s 1 and 2, of the 1984 Wyoming State Open on Saturday, May 19, 1984 between 1:15 pm and 1:45 pm. All Wyoming players are encouraged and urged to attend these meetings to give as much input as possible to ensure the best possible and positive foundation to the new WCA.

Note: All area, Wyoming, Laramie, University of Wyoming and seriously interested Chess players are welcome to all of the above events except for the listed stipulated restrictions.

The Wyoming Knights Chess Club is a recognized Student Organization of the Associated Students of the University of Wyoming and meets regularly (during University Session), in the Wyoming Student Union on the U/W campus in Room#231, every Thursday evening from 7 pm until 11 pm. It is an official and recognized affiliate of the United States Chess Federation, and is duly authorized to hold rated tournaments and receives all appertaining USCF rights and privileges as such. It is also Incorporated under the Laws of the State of Wyoming as a non-profit organization which exists for 3 major purposes as follows: 1.) To educate and instruct its members and the public about Chess; 2.) To broaden and develop Chess as art and recreation; and 3.) To promote Chess as a significant element of culture in Wyoming.

KORCHNOI, BELIAVSKY TIE FOR FIRST AS  
BOYCOTT ENDS

Two-time world championship challenger Viktor Korchnoi of Switzerland has rebounded from his defeat in the candidates semi-finals match, tying for first in the annual Grandmaster tournament at Wijk aan Zee, Netherlands. This marked the first time since Korchnoi's 1976 defection from the Soviet Union that Soviet players had been allowed to participate in a tournament with him, and one of them, Alexander Beliavsky, equalled Korchnoi's 10-3 score.

#### 1985 U.S. OPEN TO FEATURE RECORD PRIZE FUND AND NEW SCHOLASTIC CHAMPIONSHIP

The annual U.S. Open Championship, a tradition dating back to 1900, will be held at the Diplomat Hotel in Hollywood, Florida, August 4-6, 1985. The prize fund will be a record \$30,000.

Grandmaster and former U.S. champ Arnold Denker, who is serving as chief organizer for the Miami Chess Club, expects that the prize fund and site, with its many recreational opportunities, will generate a large player turnout. The influx of chessplayers from all over the U.S., in addition to being an economic boon for the area, should energize local chess activity. Denker mentions the Cuban community in particular as being a likely source of increased interest in the game.

One major feature of the Open will be a new national championship held concurrently. The high school champion of each state will be invited to this championship, with \$200 expense money provided for each player. Denker hopes that this event will add to public interest in the Open, as well as stimulating more scholastic competition at the state level.

## HISTORY-MAKING VICTORY FOR RESHEVSKY

Veteran Grandmaster Samuel Reshevsky of Spring Valley, N.Y., has tied for first place in the annual open tournament in Reykjavik, Iceland. Reshevsky's victory at age 72, ahead of a number of other GMs, is unprecedented in chess history. The closest parallel which occurs is former world champion Emmanuel Lasker's win in a 1935 tournament in Moscow, at age 66.

Reshevsky scored 8-3, with five wins and six draws, tying with two young Icelandic players, International Master Helgi Olafsson and Johan Hjartarson, 21.

## SIX-WAY TIE FOR FIRST IN RECORD-BREAKING NATIONAL OPEN

With interest spurred by the participation of all three U.S. cochampions, a record 501 players converged on Las Vegas for the annual National Open last weekend. When the smoke had cleared at the MGM Grand Hotel, only one of the three was in the winner's circle.

Grandmaster Walter Browne, of Berkeley, CA, was one of six players tied for National Open honors, along with GMs Arthur Bisguier of Rock Hill, N.Y. and Lubos Kavalek of Reston, VA, International Master David Strauss of Dana Point, CA, and National Masters Luismar Brito of Brazil and James Banks of San Diego. Each scored  $5\frac{1}{2}$  points out of 6 games.

## KASPAROV TO CHALLENGE KARPOV

Soviet prodigy Gary Kasparov has won the world championship candidates final match and is set to challenge his countryman, Anatoly Karpov, for the title.

Kasparov defeated a third Soviet Grandmaster, former world champion Vassily Smyslov, by  $8\frac{1}{2}$ - $4\frac{1}{2}$  in their "best of 16" match in Vilnius, Soviet Lithuania. Kasparov won four games, with nine ending in draws. The match ended April 8. The world championship match is tentatively set to start in mid-September in Moscow.

Kasparov, who will turn 21 on April 13, showed much of the tactical flair that has dazzled the chess world since his emergence into world class play five years ago, as evidenced by his excellent assessment of endgame possibilities in several of the games.

Smyslov, who turned 63 during the match, played accurately in the first two games to draw, but fell victim to Kasparov's superior calculation in the third and fourth games. Despite valiant efforts (the eleventh game was a particularly good example of defense and counterattack), Smyslov could not develop any real winning chances, and fell further behind when he lost the ninth and 12th games. In the final game, after 14 perfunctory "book" moves, Smyslov offered the draw and congratulated the challenger.

Kasparov will be the youngest player ever to challenge for the world championship (American Paul Morphy was also 21 when he won the then-unofficial championship in 1858). Soviet GM Mikhail Tal, another tactical genius, was 23 when he won the title in 1960.
