

EXECUTIVE ORDER
PROCLAMATION
CHESS WEEK
October 8-14, 1984

WHEREAS, the number of Colorado chess players in the United States Chess Federation has grown almost 30% in the last four years; and

BENJAMIN GERASH MEMORIAL

The Brown Palace was an excellent site for the Second Benjamin Gerash Memorial Tournament held September 15-16. It was a pleasure to hold a tournament in such a Class hotel. To add to the class were 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place trophies for each section donated by Walter Gerash in memory of his father.

Ray Haskins swept to a 4-0 win in the Open section. The surprise of the tourney was Chris Hendrickson, whose $3\frac{1}{2}$ points earned her 2nd place. She defeated experts Barnett, Hursch, and Siddeek before drawing with Scott Lett. Alex Fishbein won the 3rd place trophy on tiebreaks with 3 points. Also with 3 points were John Siddeek and Buck Buchanan.

The Premier section was won by Ron Leonard with $3\frac{1}{2}$ points. With 3 points John Regar placed second on tie-breaks over Lynn Crewse.

Four players scored $3\frac{1}{2}$ in the Reserve section. On tie-breaks Traver Sutton took home the first place trophy. Gene Strandberg, Robert Shearer, and Alexander Shoffner finished in 2nd-4th places.

The 1984 Colorado Open will be remembered for a long time to come, but it is likely that those memories will not be for the chess played! A variety of problems plagued the tournament, but in the end most participants seemed to feel that the event had been a success.

The first indication of difficulties came the day before the event began when CSCA learned that the site would not be available beyond 6:00 PM! Fast work by CSCA board members secured an alternative site for the third day, but none could be found for rounds 1-4. Tournament planners were faced between choosing between no tourney at all, large numbers of adjournments and adjudications, or faster time controls on the first two days. They chose the latter option and went into late registration not knowing how the players would react. The players were not happy (no surprise) but nearly all chose to compete even if "under protest." CSCA did lose several entrants and perhaps some credibility with the players, but in the long run will probably benefit from the experience. In the future tournament site hosts will no doubt be asked to sign a contract with CSCA which will clearly state the hours and services to be provided in addition to costs.

When competition finally got underway, it did not take long for the upsets to begin. The first round saw top ten seeds in each section suffer draws or losses. In round two defending State Champion Dave Rice was beaten by 17-year-old Stephen Towbin, while top-rated Randy Canney lost to Sean Scott. In the Open, only three players reached the final day with perfect scores. Sixth seeded James McCarty had handled four lower rated players, but 12th seed Scott Wicker (returning from retirement again) had nailed two masters, #2 Jellison and #4 Fishbein; and 24th seeded Helmut Lestinsky had beaten both #5 James Hamblin and #9 John Siddeek! The final day opened with McCarty drawing Wicker while Canney got back into contention by beating Lestinsky. That set up pairings of McCarty-Canney and Hamblin-Wicker with Lestinsky, Jellison, and Siddeek also having chances to finish 5-1. Lestinsky's best ever tourney ended with a loss to Fishbein and Wicker's try for the title was stopped by Hamblin. Canney battled long and hard to win but was held to a draw by McCarty. The final game of the tourney saw Siddeek edge Jellison in a difficult ending leaving John tied with Hamblin and McCarty for first. CSCA's new President Mark Ludwig awarded the State Champion trophy to McCarty on tiebreak. My feeling is that the real story in this tournament was not who won, but how balanced and competitive the event was. I won't soon forget how Lestinsky beat two of the players who tied for first but in the end won not a dime - but certainly gained great satisfaction none the less. Other awards in the Open were as shown in the crosstable.

The Reserve section was less exciting only because there was no state title at stake. Entering the last round, seven players had a chance for a share of first! Gene Strandberg ended all speculation as to who was best when he defeated Dave Bowers to finish 6-0! The Air Force Academy Chess Club dominated the two-day Booster section. Cadets Peter Detellis and Brad Senef shared section honors while cadet Larry Brindley tied Mani Sayeedi for third.

Although this year's Colorado Open was not particularly well attended (119) and had many problems, it was still an enjoyable tourney to direct. The Open is always special, and this year it seemed that the players who competed were there because they really wanted to be part of the State Championship even though most had little chance to win a big prize. Even with the changes in time controls, rounds, sites, and a threatened police raid, it truly seemed that most players were glad they attended- even if they didn't win a cucumber.

Dear Colorado Chess Players,

A very small number of you attended the CSCA membership meeting on 9/2/84. I know that holding the meeting after the Sunday rounds was a distinct factor in not getting good participation. I wish to thank those who showed interest in where CSCA has been and where it is going.

I wish to apologize to those who were inconvenienced by the Colorado Open's many problems. The turnout was considerably less than expected after the Denver Open and the Boulder Champs did so well.

CSCA survived another shaky year. Some of the board members last year started with good intentions, but for one reason or another did not follow through on their duties. I think John Cohen did a good job as interim President and that Karen Arp has shown commitment as interim secretary.

Partly to blame for CSCA's problems is that the membership perceives Randy Siebert as "CSCA." Randy has done much for CSCA and he was CSCA for four years. That is why he was given appreciation of service award at the membership meeting. Freddy Sotillo nominated Randy to the President's office, which Randy graciously declined. Freddy was perplexed as to why Randy declined. The reason is, I believe, that Randy is burned out. Did you see him at 7PM on Labor Day? He has accomplished much and wants to accomplish more, but the responsibility was his and his alone for too long. The responsibility is now with me and the other members of the board.

I want this to be clear to all because the transfer of responsibility was not accomplished last year. Randy tried to drop the ball, but people were not seeing that. Poor Mark Wood was left holding a hot potato. This year let's not make the mistake of expecting Randy to be CSCA, even though he is still on the board as treasurer. He is just the treasurer. His responsibility is to collect and disperse funds. Karen Arp is Secretary with responsibility to maintain the membership list. With the computer this can be done routinely at tournaments or at her home.

Richard "Buck" Buchanan is Vice-President and has taken over the INFORMANT publication. As its editor, he is to manage, not do the publication. He needs help with sorting games, annotations, and getting interesting articles. I hope he publishes deadlines and that we all pay attention to them.

There are at least a few souls who would like the INFORMANT to be discontinued and dues lowered. Let me say that CSCA's charter is education and promotion of chess. A newsletter can promote chess by advertising and reporting events. But only through a magazine do we have a clear way of executing the education aspect by providing articles covering various chess aspects and annotated games. So good luck to Buck and thanks to Bruce Grimes who worked as hard as he could the last year or so.

Mike Zak is Junior Representative. I have given him responsibility for the scholastic program. Last year Mark Wood and company ran several scholastic events. We still do not have good success in publicizing and reporting these events. If you have an interest in the scholastic program, talk to Mike.

Mani Sayeedi, Joe Chandler, and Alex Fishbein were voted in by the board to fill the other board positions. These three are strong players. Be warned that with them, Buck, and myself, a majority of the board is over 1900, and there is the small possibility that the weaker players' interest could get short shrift. Alex hopefully will help with the scholastic program. Mani, as regional vice-president, should be working on regional chess activities. I hope Joe will work on getting some 1-day events in Denver.

That is what we, the board, are doing. What are you, the chess players, going to do to see that we, the organizers, are still around next year to run the tournaments and publish INFORMANTS and newsletters? Please advance enter so we don't have to scramble to finish registration, make hurried pairings, and neglect announcements in order to start tournaments on time. Please play more so events are successful. Please notify the Secretary of address changes. Please send CSCA renewal to the Treasurer-not to me, nor the Secretary. Please volunteer to make up pairing cards, number tables, and sort games.

Independent organizers must consult with the USCF Tournament Clearinghouse (still Randy) immediately before and after a tournament date is established. This reduces conflicts. Please set the date 3 months or more in advance. Do the typing and copying of publicity yourself, because we might forget about your event or not have time to do the work. If we have the flyers we will get them out.

Finally, please comment to the person identified as responsible for something, or, failing to contact him/her or getting an unsatisfactory response, talk to me. I do not want to hear rumors that Such-and-such is mad because So-and-so did or did not do something. Talking about your concerns and taking on responsibility to check on things will enhance the enjoyment of everybody's chess.

1984 COLORADO STATE CHESS ASSOCIATION MEMBERSHIP MEETING, SEPT. 2, 1984

The meeting was called to order by Vice-President Mani Sayeedi. Minutes of last year's meeting were read and accepted. The board members gave their reports.

Junior member Matt Roller reported on Scholastic chess in the state. There were six events held in the last year, five more than the year before. The turnout for the events was impressive, and it is hoped that this trend will continue.

Mani Sayeedi gave the Delegate's report, giving the results of the recent USCF elections. Mani also reported that he has been elected Regional Vice-President... USCF membership has increased 10% in the past year... There have been some changes in the editorial staff of CHESS LIFE, including the resignation of the editor... USCF dues will be increasing to \$25 for regular memberships, \$12 for youth, and \$500 for life... A revenue sharing proposal was passed which will give some of the money USCF collects back to the states... One minor rule change was made, standardizing the allowance of three incomplete move-pairs when claiming a time forfeit (Rule 17.1, Sec. 6)... The 1985 US Open will be held in Hollywood, Florida. The high school champion from each state will receive a \$200 subsidy from USCF to attend the Open... The World Championship will be televised by KBDI Channel 12 (11). The station has agreed to do three shows, and will do more if they get a good response. The first show will be Wednesday, Sept. 19 at 9PM and will last for one hour. Everyone is encouraged to watch and call or write to the station voicing their support.

The Treasurer's report was presented by Mark Ludwig. CSCA has assets of \$3604.19 and liabilities of \$1374.85, mainly from Scholastic chess and the futurity. This leaves a net worth of \$2056.56, down from last year's net worth of \$2879.48. The reasons for the decline included the money spent in the production of four INFORMANTS and four Newsletters, along with a decline in dues collected. The Treasurer's report was accepted with the notation that there are still outstanding payments owed to CSCA by Dale Fleming for the Low Country and the Scholastic Team Tournaments.

Committee reports were then made.

Chris Hendrickson reported on prison chess. Shadow Mountain has its first chess club and they are organizing a simul. CSCA was asked to help reimburse expenses for the simul. No action was taken. Donations of sets, boards, clocks, and books would be gratefully accepted. It was also noted that three Canon City inmates are playing in CSCA's postal chess tournament.

Mike Zak gave the Scholastic report. There are 110 new junior members in Scholastic chess. It was noted that Castle Rock has a Scholastic chess club with 80 members. A number of simul and tournaments were held in this year, benefitting the growth of Scholastic chess.

After this came the nomination and election of board officers.

Mark Ludwig, Buck Buchanan, Karen Arp, and Randy Siebert were nominated and accepted by acclamation for the offices of President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer respectively. Mike Zak and Alex Fishbein were nominated for the office of Junior Representative, with Mike receiving the majority of the votes cast. The outgoing board elected Mani Sayeedi and Joe Chandler to fill two at-large positions. At the board meeting the next day Alex Fishbein was chosen to fill the remaining vacancy.

The Chair then passed to the incoming President Mark Ludwig. His first act as President was to give an Appreciation Award to Randy Siebert for his past and hopefully future contributions to Colorado chess.

The meeting was then opened to the discussion of old and new business. Members commented on the site chosen for this year's Colorado Open, and some expressed a desire for more one day events. It was mentioned that the Cleveland Chess Foundation, in conjunction with the Denver Hilton, is considering holding a tournament at the Hilton sometime in December. Mike Zak mentioned that TD's are needed to direct scholastic events.

Several methods of helping Colorado players who will play in the US Masters Open were discussed, including the use of seconds and/or monetary support. The issue was tabled and no action was taken at that time. Governor Lamm has declared Oct. 8-14 to be CHESS WEEK IN COLORADO in honor of the event.

With the resignation of Bruce Grimes, Buck Buchanan has become editor of the INFORMANT. He stated, among other things, that he would like to see regular features from the scholastic committee and the different clubs. Help in selecting and annotating games would be greatly appreciated.

The meeting was adjourned.

I have recently been given the position of Scholastic Director. I have great plans for the scholastic program this year, but we will be able to accomplish much more with your help. If you need to get in touch with me after 5pm., you can call me at 526-0706 or during the day you can contact Mark Wood at 871-9060.

We have already scheduled the two state championship events for this year. The individual will be held at Wheat Ridge High School on November tenth and the Team Championships will be on April 13, 1985 in Pueblo. We are willing to give any needed aid to those who are willing to help improve scholastic chess in Colorado. Thank You.




