



Connors-Martinez, ALEKHIN: (notes by Paul Connors): 1 e4, Nf6; 2 e5, Ne4 (Unusual, but perfectly playable. This is the Mokele Mbembe variation (truly!), named after a mysterious creature that roams the African jungle, leaving no trace of itself except its footprints. The mysterious creature is Black's KN, which tends to hop around the board even more in this variation than in the regular 2...Nd5.) 3 d3 (3 b4 looks tempting, trying to trap the creature, but analysis shows that it is too elusive to be trapped by such crude means.) Nc5; 4 d4, Nca6 (According to Stephan Buckner, the German FM who plays this line, the main line of the Mokele Mbembe is 4...Ne6; 5 Be3, d6; 6 Nf3, g6; 7 d5, Ng7, when the creature comfortably fianchettoes itself.) 5 Nf3 (ECO gives 5 f4 with advantage to White, but this assessment is questionable.) b6; 6 Bd3, d5; 7 ed, cd; 8 c3?! (Silly. An immediate 8 c4 is best.) Nc7; 9 c4, d5; 10 Nc3, e6 (The game has now transposed to something closely resembling the Panov variation of the Caro-Kann.) 11 O-O, Be7; 12 Re1, Nd7? (12...Bb7 was better. Now White can force some kind of permanent weakness in Black's position.) 13 cd, ed; 14 Bg5, Nf6 (Else 14...Ne6; 15 B:e7, Q:e7 16 N:d5 drops a pawn or 14...f6 leaves f6 unavailable for Black's pieces and e6 weakened.) 15 B:f6, g7; 16 Nh4 (Zeroing in immediately on f5. Black's king is looking a little nervous, seeing no good place to run.) Be6; 17 Nf5, h5; 18 Re1, Qd7; 19 Qf3, Kf8; 20 N:e7, Q:e7; 21 Nb5 (White still keeps tabs on f6 while infiltrating down the c-file. The only thing better than exploiting a weakness is exploiting two weaknesses.) N:b5; 22 B:b5, Rd8; 23 Qf4 Rg8; 24 Rc7, R:g2+ (Rats! Rats! Rats! After the logical 24...Qb4, White could have finished in style: 25 R:e6!, Q:b5; 26 R:f7+, K:f7; 27 Q:f6 mate) 25 K:g2, Bh3+; 26 K:h3, Q:a1 (Black hopes for a mistake.) 27 Qe3, Qb4 (If 27...Qe1, White mates one move ahead of his opponent.) 28 B:d3, Qd6; 29 Qh6+, Ke8; 30 Bb5+, Rd7; 31 Qh8+, Ke7; 32 R:d7+, 1-0. A queen down and with one minute on the clock, Black finally concedes.



 It is not at all clear what White's best plan is. I adopt the provoc-

 square in this position. E.g., 11...Nc6; 12 Nf4, Rg8; 13 d5 is good for
 White.) 12 0-0-0?!; Ba4!? (Makes way for the knight to reach d7) 13 g3
 Nbd7; 14 Nf4, Rg8; 15 d5, e5 (Black must keep the center closed.) 16 Ng2
 b5; 17 c4? (During the game I didn't like the idea of 17 Ne3, c4, when
 each side has a semi-incarnated bishop. In the cold light of day, it now
 looks just fine.) b4; 18 Re1 (Preparing counterplay) Qb6; 19 ab, cb
 20 f4, ef3; 21 B:e5, 0-0-0 (Not 21...fg?; 22 B:f6+, Kf8; 23 Qh6+. The
 game has opened up considerably, and the play has become very sharp.) 22 Nh4, f2! (This pawn
 paralyzes White's play and gives Black all kinds of combinational possibilities. You will
 notice that in the rest of the game and notes that my moves tend merely to be attempts to
 dodge the heavy objects that Canney throws at me from the other side of the board.) 23 Re2
 N:e5 (Black correctly decides to get rid of the strong bishop.) 24 R:e5, Rge8! (Black is
 threatening all kinds of nasty things. E.g., 25 R:e8, R:e8; 26 Bh3+, Kb7; 27 Rf1, Ne4; 28 Qf4
 Qd4 with an extremely strong attack.) 25 Rf5, b3!? (The straightforward 25...Ne4 is plenty
 strong enough to win. E.g., 26 Qf4, Qd4; 27 Kbl, Nc3+; 28 Kb2, Nd1+; 29 Kcl, Qb2+ and
 30...Qc2 mate.) 26 Bh3 (White doesn't have time to take the pawn because of a fiendish trap:

 objectively brilliant. It gets a question mark because the follow-up shows that Canney didn't
 quite see why it was brilliant.) 27 R:f6+, Re6; 28 Q:f2, Qb1+; 29 Kd2, Qd1+?? (29...Q:h1 wins.
 E.g., 30Qe5+ (30 B:e6+, fe; 31 Qf1, R:d5+!! Here is where B26 earns its 3 exclamation marks.
 Black wins by force. Try it out.) Kb8; 31 Rf1, Q:h2+ and White's position is hopeless.)
 30 Rd1, cdQ+; 31 Kc3, Qb3+; 32 Kd4 (This simple move is part of what Canney missed. He had

CAVE-MAN CHESS

by Jim Watson

(Ed. note: While visiting Tennessee over Christmas vacation, your Editor met former Wyoming player Jim Watson, who is now the Tennessee chess editor. Jim submitted this article from his publication.)

We all want to be great chess players. Alas, for many of us this will never happen. We are confined to weekend tournaments and ratings on the low side of 2200. Don't despair. We may never play great chess, but it is within our power to play exciting chess.

The simple plan is to know our true selves. What is it called when we prefer a wild 30 move loss to a dull 70 move draw? When we always play unclear exchange sacs? When we constantly calculate moves on the odd side of baroque. I call it Cave-man Chess. I give an example of a game that quickly reaches a suitable position.

Richard Carpenter (2100)-Doug Ralston (2000): 1 e4, c6; 2 d4, d5
 3 Nc3, de; 4 N:e4, Nd7; 5 Nf3, Ngf6; 6 N:f6+, N:f6; 7 Bc4, Nd5

 Black has taken some liberties and White has played quite well. Now, unhappily, White does not pursue the proper Cave-Man policy and the game ended drawn. I would suggest the proper move, with attendant analysis: 18 R:e7!, and Black has 3 replies: (A)...Kg8; (B)...Q:c2; and (C)...K:e7.

(A) 18...Kg8; 19 R:b7, Q:c2; 20 N:f7 and White is winning.
 (B) 18...Q:c2; 19 R:f7+, Kg8; 20 R:g7+, K:g7; 21 Be5, Rhf8; 22 Ne4
 Rae8; 23 Rd7+, Kg8; 24 N:f6+, R:f6; 25 Rg7!, Kh8; 26 Rd7 wins.

(C) 18...K:e7; 19 Nc8+ and now Black has

(I) 19...Kf8; 20 Bd6+, Kg8; 21 Ne7+, Kf8; 22 N:g6+, Kg8; 23 Ne7+, Kf8; 24 Nf5+, Kg8
 25 Qg3, Nh5; 26 Nh6 mate.


(II) 19...Ke8; 20 Qe3+, Kf8; 21 Rd8+, Ne8; 22 Q:e8 mate.

(IV) 19...Rh:c8; 20 Bd6+, Ke6! (CHARGE! A move in the Cave-Man tradition! If 20...Ke8?

White wins with 21 Qe2+ or if 20...Kd7, then 21 Ba3+, Nd5; 22 B:b2, B:b2; 23 c4 and White wins.) 21 Qh3+, Ng4; 22 Q:g4+, f5; 23 Qc4+, Kf6; 24 Bb4 (traps the queen) Rd8
 25 Bc3+, Q:c3!; 26 Q:c3+, Kf7; 27 Qb3+, Kf6.

We have now reached a position the Knoxville Chess Club's experts feel is drawn, though long-time Texas expert Bill Trim says it is an obvious win for White. Now that the position is more technical than Cave-Man, I leave it to the reader. Can anyone demonstrate a win or a draw here?
