COLORADO OPEN by Mark Ludwig

Defending Colorado Chess Champion Alex Fishbein suffered his only loss of the 1986 Colorado Open in the last round to Expert Brian Lankey. As a result, Lankey won the 1986 Colorado Chess Champion trophy on tie-breaks over Fishbein and Expert Ron Nichols. These 3 players scored 5-1 to split the pool of 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place prize money.

Lankey had drawn 2 games in the early rounds. But he was given the chance to play Fishbein, when perennial contender and second seeded Dave Jellison of Denver suffered a loss and a draw before the final round. Directing this year's event was Mark Ludwig and Randy Siebert. The event was held in the CU Events Center over the Labor Day weekend. The Reserve section was won by Paul Cornelison. The Mini-Swiss on Saturday and Monday were won by Paul Szelegowski and Craig Gallo.

CSCA also held a chess book auction which raised over \$500 to support its activities. The annual CSCA membership meeting was held on Sunday with Sean Scott of Denver elected to the office of President. Richard Buchanan of Colorado Springs was returned to the office of Vice President, while Joe Chandler of Denver became Secretary-Treasurer and Daoud Zupa became Jr. Rep. Bylaws changes #2 and #3, creating spouse and senior memberships at half price were passed, while Bylaws change #1 was overwhelmingly defeated.

The Brown Palace is a wonderful place to play chess! The luxuriant surroundings, the abundance of wood and window, the events well-organized. My record at the Brown (14-2-2) has put money where my mouth is.

This was my first Denver Open victory. My easier-than-expected pairings helped, caused by early upsets of McCarty, Unger, and others. My first win was a gift from Mark Wood. But 2nd round Rich Garcia fought me tough and should have drawn. 3rd round, in a key game as Black vs. Randy Canney, I pulled out the draw and was in a 6-way tie for 1st at $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ (Canney, Andy Rea, Joe Abbott, Ken Case, Hans Morrow from Utah, and myself). Canney and I, the only Denver players, were eligible for the title. And my second tiebreaks over Randy were quite good (The first tie-breaker being Cumulative, wherein we were equal). Of course I had to win 4th round!

Abbott gave me a surprise 4th round! He blundered a pawn on move 7, and the extra pawn remained embedded in his position on e6 for the entire game. Canney and Rea drew on Board 1, while Case should have won but lost to Morrow.


Here are two instructive endgames of mine:



Garcia-Jellison after B34; 35 Ke4? (White can't be faulted much for giving up the pawn, since 35 Kg2, Kf4 forces his king to the edge. However, I see no way to mate.) R:h3; 36 Kd4, Kf4; 37 Bb3, Rh6; 38 Bg8 Rd6+; 39 Kc5, Ke5; 40 Bf7, Rd7; 41 Bg8, Rc7+; 42 Kb5, Rg7; 43 Bb3, Rg6 (Somewhere in here I realized my plight. The WK cuts the BK off from key Q-side squares; my R therefore is tied down to guarding my P; the WB has a nice diagonal and guards its P well. I knew this was drawn, but remembering White's 35th I played on.) 44 Kc5, Rf6 (When the draw is in hand, it's OK to play waiting moves in hopes that the defense loses patience or allows a new plan.) 45 Bg8, Ke4; 46 Kb4 (Why voluntarily give Black more space?) Kd4; 47 Bb3, Rf5! (Gradually forcing the WK South is my only hope.) 48 Bg8, a5+; 49 Ka4, Kc5! (Since 50 K:a5, Rf8 loses,

White must allow the BK to travel to the coast.) 50 Bb3, Kb6; 51 Bg8, Rf4+; 52 Ka3, Kb5; 53 Be6 Rf3+; 54 Kb2, a4; 55 Bd5? (White has long had a3!, which draws.) a3+; 56 Kc2, Rg3; 57 Be6, Kc5 58 Bf7, Kd4; 59 Be6, Rf3! (Notice how a R co-ordinates against a B. Even stationed on a long diagonal, the poor B can often be zugzwanged by the flexible R. Now if 60 Bb3, the WK is forced back with 60...Rf2+.) 60 Bg8, Rc3+; 61 Kd2, Rg3; 62 Bf7, Rg2+; 63 Kd1, Kd3 (Note that without the pawns, it is a draw. In BASIC CHESS ENDINGS, Fine gives most R vs. B positions as drawn, but the defender must have his K in a corner square which is the opposite color of his B; e.g., WK on a1, WB on h7, BK on b3, BR on g2, Draw. Nor can Black mate here. He must chase the WK far enough away and then sac on a2.) 64 Ke1, Rg1+; 65 Kf2, Rg7 (More intricate footwork to gain a tempo for ...Kd2.) 66 Be6, Re7; 67 Bg8, Re8; 68 Bd5, Kd2!; 69 Kf3, Rf8+; 70 Ke4, Rh8 71 Kd4 (Now the WK gets fatally cut off on the 5th rank. 71 Kf3 is also a try, though 71...Rh3+ 72 Kf2, Rh5; 73 Bd6, Re5, etc. proves that the WK gets cut off on the g-file, also sufficient to win.) Rh4+; 72 Kc5 (On 72 Bd4, Rg4!; 73 Kd5, Kc3 winning the P or 73 Ke5, Kc3! also, when the R and K guard access to the entire a2-g8 diagonal - e.g., 74 Bh7, Kb2 and g8 is off limits, or 74 Bd5, Rg5+; 0-1) Kc3 (Wastes time but hurts nothing.) 73 Bb3, Rh5+; 74 Kc6, Kb2; 75 Bf7, Rg5 76 Bb3, Kbl and 0-1.


Canney-Jellison after W43; This position arose from a Reverse Benoni. White's poor N is compensated for by his passed P and the locked-up position. The result would be a draw, but not without some fireworks: 43...a4!; 44 ba, Be7; 45 a5! (White couldn't allow the BK to a5.) ba 46 Nb3, Kb6; 47 Bd2!, Ba4!; 48 Nc1 (not 48 N:a5, as then the N is stuck on the edge with the B relegated to guarding it; Black may win.) Bd1 (No need to allow the N to f4) 49 Bh6, Bf6; 50 Ne2, B:e2; 51 K:e2 a4! (Without this, White may play a4 and actually win, but now the draw is secure. White can win material, but that's not good enough.) 52 Bf8, Kc6; 53 h5, Bg5; 54 h6, B:h6; $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ since the WK is trapped behind the lines.





U.S. OPEN by Mark Ludwig

Mark Ludwig was elected to the position of Regional Vice President for Region IX of the USCF at its annual Delegates meeting held in conjunction with the U.S. Open. Ludwig's term in office will last for 3 years until August 1989. Senior Master Fishbein scored 8.5 out of 12 in the U. S. Open held in Somerset, NJ. Top prize in the U. S. Open went to former U. S. Champion and Grandmaster Larry Christiansen of California with 10. Fishbein had earned free entry to the U. S. Open by placing 2nd in the U. S. Junior Invitational with 6 out of 9.

The Delegates meeting was has several lively and interesting debates. The first concerned the response to the exclusion of the Israeli team due to a state of conflict loophole in the FIDE Bylaws which enabled the host United Arab Emirates from denying the Israeli visas. The decision was to send a team and delegation to the Olympiad and the concurrent business meeting, but to walkout should proposed Bylaws revisions to close the loophole fail to pass. The second debate centered on getting GM Boris Gulko, recently emigrated from the USSR to Israel into the World Championship cycle via the U.S. Invitational Championships. The Delegates first voted for waiving residency requirements for Gulko, but then reversed themselves when most U.S. players voiced their dissent. The other major action of the meeting, was the removal of the Participating Jr. membership, effective on 7/1/87, and the addition of a Scholastic membership, for \$6, with its own scholastic chess magazine, for youths under age 13.

The tournament attendance was much less than projected, with about 500 participants. With the New York Open, World Open, and other pretigious events occurring regularly in the area, players were apparently not attracted to it. The site was isolated. Only a couple of other hotels were within walking distance. The cost to get to and from the airport was almost 1/3 the plane fare.







FOULUPS, BLEEPs, AND BLUNDERS



I attended the U.S. Open in 1984 and had the time of my life. Just seeing the likes of Dzindzichashvili, Browne, and Shirazi playing backgammon was a real thrill. It was great running into John Watson after five years (although he beat me in the tournament.) GM Roman Dzindzichashvili was very charming and a real crowd pleaser. When I asked him to give me 5-1 odds for dollars, he winced and said he'd like to, but his mother wouldn't allow him to play for such small stakes. Later he gave me 3-1 time odds for three dollars a game. When there was a good move for me on the board, he would playfully slap my hand. We came out even, so he brought out the doubling cube from backgammon. After I won the first game, he warned me that he would double me on the first move if it wasn't a good one. I saw him play the Gurgenzidze System (1 e4, c6; 2 d4, d5; 3 Nc3, g6) in Rd. 1. It was also called the "Wall" System by Steve Dillon in the CSGA BULLETIN, so after 1 e4, c6 he said, "You're lucky. This is good move."

Between rounds a crowd gathered around the strong players. Ken Smith, 1984 Texas Open and World Poker champion, invited everyone to a "low-stakes poker game after the round." He received a chorus of groans. Dzindzi offered Smith a \$20 bet claiming loudly that he had discovered a win in the position following: (White: Kg5, Be4, Ph5; Black: Kg7). After being reassured that the RP was moving in the normal direction, John Meyer (a Jerry Lewis sound-alike) accepted Dzindzi's bet that he could queen the pawn. After 1 h6+, Kh8; 2 h7, Kg7 3 h8Q+ the crowd roared with laughter and John forked over the \$20. Dzindzi gave John a chance to win his money back by claiming a White win in this position: (White: Kd2, Re3, Bd4; Black: Kg5, Rc5, Re5, Bg7, Nc3). After a little study, Mr. Meyer accepted the second bet. Dzindzi played Kb4-d6-f4-h6-f8 and removed all the Black pieces. The crowd roared again. Dzindzi wouldn't accept the second \$20.

In this game, my opponent is 14-year-old prodigy Stuart Rachels. When I told him excitedly that I had made it to the finals of the U.S. Open Speed Tournament, he topped me by informing me that he had taken third in the tournament. Then he proceeded to blow me off the board in 30 moves. In the post-mortem, he waved away my analysis in a hushed, dramatic tone: "Trust me, you're lost here." He even had the nerve to "instruct" me on the dangers of smoking cigarettes. He painfully reminded me of how unbearable I must have been at his age.
