If White doesn't have a good grip on some of the subtleties of the Marshall, then practical chances will definitely favor Black. (White hastens to counter-act the threat of 17...Bf3, but this is not the way to do it, since now White's Q-side development is fatally delayed. 
Cornelison-Gaudiano, BASMANIA (notes by Paul Connors): 1 e4, g5 (The Basman (AKA Basmania or Basmaniac), so named after the British IM who plays this line frequently - and wins with it. The move is not as bad as it really is - though lately Basman, perhaps on the grounds that 1...g5 commits Black too early in the centre, has played 1...h5.) 2 d4, h6 (A real Basmaniac would play 2...Bg7.) 3 Bc4 (3 h4 is very playable.) Nf6? (3...Bg7 or 3...Nc6) 4 e5, d5 (Knight retreats are just horrible.) 5 Bb5?! (5 Bd3 is better. Why exchange a developed piece when Black is in so much trouble?) Bd7? (5...c6 is necessary.) 6 B:d7+, Nf:d7; 7 e6!, Nf6 (7...fe; 8 Qh5 mate would be embarrassing.) 8 ef+, K:f7; 9 Nf3 (White has an excellent position.) Rg8 (White threatened 10 h4, g4; 11 Ne5+.) 10 Ne5+, Ke8; 11 Nc3, e6; 12 0-0, c5; 13 Re1, Qd6; 14 Qf3 (The better 14 Ng4 would exchange the defender of the white squares.) For those of you who missed the membership meeting during the Colorado Open, I made a pledge to keep the membership informed of the actions taken by the Board.

Among the issues discussed at the election was the reorganization of the Tournament Clearinghouse. The function of the Clearinghouse is to prevent direct conflicts in tournament dates. The new Clearinghouse Director is Richard DeLong; it is my feeling that it is better not to have a major tournament organizer in this position in order to avoid possible conflicts of interest. Guidelines have been established so that tournament organizers will have to work through the Clearinghouse in scheduling events:

1. All tournaments, other than scholastic and beginners' events, that wish to receive advertising in the COLORADO CHESS INFORMANT must submit their listings through the Clearinghouse and require GSCA membership of all players.

2. Tournament organizers may reserve dates by following these procedures:

(a) Tentatively reserve a date by contacting the Clearinghouse Director. The date will be reserved for five days.

(b) Confirm the date by mailing the tournament announcement for the COLORADO CHESS INFORMANT to the Clearinghouse. If it is not received within five days of the tentative reservation, the date will be re-opened.


(c) No direct conflict (on the same weekend) will be permitted for Grand Prix and/or Colorado Tour events. The Clearinghouse may deny advertising to a tournament that is scheduled in conflict with a confirmed event.

(d) Traditional tournaments (events held on the same weekend two or more years in a row) will be given first option on that date.

(e) No tournament will be scheduled more than six months in advance.

Other action taken by the Board: The revision of the format of the Colorado Tour has been tabled until the next meeting, as was discussion of scholastic chess. It was decided that any tournament wishing to receive advertising in the COLORADO CHESS INFORMANT must require GSCA membership of all players. The GSCA has agreed to pledge \$25 towards the prize fund of the 1988 Rocky Mountain Postal Chess organization, provided that five other states also agree to do the same. We will be writing to the USCF proposing that, in return for our assistance in the 1988 U.S. Closed Championships, we would like the USCF to pay for a GM simul in Colorado. The Team Championship tournament has been postponed until after the Christmas holidays.

Thanks again to all my supporters at the election. I hope this year will be successful and that the issues I brought up during the campaign will be satisfactorily addressed.

MEMBERSHIP MEETING

The GSCA's annual membership meeting was held September 6, with about 60 members attending. Karen Arp gave the Treasurer's report. Our income for the last fiscal year was \$4665 and our expenses \$5933. To a great extent, the excessive losses were due to our expenses involving the U.S. Class tournament. We now have \$7596 in assets. The scholastic expenses for the year came to \$537.

Sean Scott reported on the U.S. Open and the elections and annual business meeting. Of great interest to Coloradans, of course, was the fine score Alex Fishbein made in the tournament. Sean described some decisions at the Delegates' meeting: returning the participating junior membership as a one-year-only introduction to chess, and creating a scholastic membership involving a different magazine; recognizing Gary Kasparov (not Bobby Fischer!) as world champion; and passing on to the policy board a plan to change ratings by eliminating bonus and feedback points but declaring that a person's rating can not sink more than 100 points below his highest rating.

GSCA elections were held. The only contested race was for President, and Paul Cornelison defeated Richard DeLong after a hard-fought campaign. The following ran without opposition and were elected by acclamation: Richard Buchanan, Vice-President; Steve Anderson, Secretary/Treasurer; Daoud Zupa, Junior Representative; and Richard DeLong, Member at Large.

Chris Hendrickson gave the Prison Chess report, which appears elsewhere in this issue.

A straw vote indicated member support for the Tour, with a small majority favoring retaining case prizes. A request for funds for Rocky Mountain Postal Chess was referred to the Board.

INTRODUCTION

The National High School Chess Championship is open to all United States students in grades K-12. No special qualifications are needed. Only an interest in playing chess and in meeting some fine young people from all corners of the nation.

The winning school and the winning player will be recognized as the National High School Chess Champions.

FORMAT OF THE COMPETITION

Students may choose to participate in either of two independent sections

- Open Section
(For advanced players)
- Junior Varsity Section
(For less experienced players)

All students will play seven games. And players from the same school will never be paired against one another.

BUT ARE WE GOOD ENOUGH?

Students need not worry that they are "not good enough" to participate in the National High School Chess Championship. Almost everyone shares that concern. Students who lack tournament experience can always play in the less rigorous Junior Varsity Section.

ENTRY FEES

The entry fee to the 1988 National High School Chess Championship will be approximately \$15 per player. It may be lower depending upon the success of local fund raising efforts.

NON-ELIMINATION PAIRINGS

Students will not have to pack their bags for home if they lose a game. The pairing system will be non-elimination. Players will be paired for all seven rounds regardless of the number of defeats.

OVER 150 AWARDS

Every student will have a reasonable chance to bring home an award. The top finishing players and schools will receive handsome trophies. But in addition, there will be awards for the highest scoring elementary and junior high players, and even for the top finishing players who have never before competed in a USCF-rated chess tourney.

TEAM SCORE

A school's team score will be computed by adding the total game points accumulated by its four top-scoring students. (A win counts as one point, a draw as half a point.) There will be no limit to the number of students a school may enter.

THE TOURNAMENT SITE

The 1988 National High School Chess Championship will be held in the luxurious ballroom of the Albuquerque Marriott Hotel.

The hotel has guaranteed a flat rate of \$52 per room for the participants. This special price will allow coaches and students to be housed at the same location, a great convenience.

Prison Chess

Chess Clubs are operating in more prisons than ever before. There have also been quite a few internal tournaments going on in these clubs. The first tournament at the Canyon Territorial Correctional Facility was won by Mr. Martin, followed by Mr. Archuleta and Mr. Newman.

Currently we're trying to encourage members of the Colorado Springs and Pueblo Chess Clubs to visit these Chess Clubs in Cañon City, in order to play matches or just informal games. As an official volunteer at the Dept. of Corrections, I myself am prohibited from visiting inmates just to play Chess.

Grandmaster Dmitri Gurevich has consented to play a simul at a prison Chess Club, the first attempt at which fell through. We'll have to try again on it.

The first meeting of the new Chess Club at Ordway (Arkansas Valley Correctional Facility) will take place on October 16th. The Chess Trust, some kind of foundation connected to USCF, kindly donated some Chess sets and books which were donated to start up the AVCF Club. Mr. Robinette of AVCF Programs has been quite helpful and encouraging toward the idea of a Chess Club. The AVCF library already had some very fine Chess books when I visited it.

Right now the Committee has plenty of Chess books circulating in the prison system. We've donated all the sets to prison Chess Clubs and could use perhaps a few more (sets

Thanks to Mr. Vidmar and Mr. Barnhill for visiting prison players, and thanks to Mr. Siddeek, Mr. Wood, Mr. Chandler, & the great people who have helped out the Committee this past year. Remember, the US imprisons more people per capita than any country except the USSR and South Africa. We may be helping YOU next.

ARE BISHOPS BETTER THAN KNIGHTS?

by Andy Rea

In July 1977 I lost a game in my native Pittsburgh in which I used a B:f7 sac to win a pawn. However I was (1?) a fish then (1300) and lost. I blamed it on his remaining pair of bishops vs. my knights - never mind that I played the rest of the game poorly. In January of this year I beat Jeff Nohrden at Boulder; I won a pawn by getting two knights vs. his two bishops. The pressure afterwards was such that he had to trade off one of his bishops, but to no avail. It remains a myth of the chessboard that, in general, a pair of bishops is better than bishop and knight, and therefore a bishop pair should prevail over two knights.

Don't bet the farm on it! I have my own evidence that knights can fend off bishops, even in non-closed positions, and sometimes win. First, let's take heart in a bishop vs. knight ending:

Yedidia (2227)-Rea (1977), Pittsburgh, 1982 (from position at left):



The knight on f5 can be ousted soon by g4, opening the game. So






The years go by; I move to Colorado but decide to play in the 1986 Ohio Chess Congress rather than in Colorado, ruining my Tour standing. But it was worth it.

So endeth this article and my stay in Colorado. We see that positional considerations dictate whether the bishop pair or knight pair proves decisive; as often as not, the bishops are defending, especially if down a pawn without attacking chances. Be very careful if you sac a pawn for the bishops; it can definitely haunt you later.
