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
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In the previous issue I shared my chess activities during the summer. However, in the last couple of months I have found that chess is truly a year-round sport.

During the winter vacations, I played in the Hastings Challengers Tournament in Hastings, England. It is an annual international tournament, which was unusually strong this year. Two GMs (G. Flear and J. Plaskett, both of England) and about a dozen IMs participated. Despite his fifth-round loss to me, IM Tony Kosten, also of England, took clear first. He scored  $8\frac{1}{2}$  points in the 10-round Swiss of about 75 players. I was clear second with  $7\frac{1}{2}$  points. This was probably good enough for my first IM norm, although there was some question as to whether I played enough foreign opponents. My trip was financed by Walter Gerash, and I am deeply thankful to him, as well as to the American Chess Foundation, which also helped.

The following game was played in round six.



In late January and early February I played in the 1st International Tournament of the World Chess Festival in St. John, New Brunswick, Canada. This time I scored 5-4, good for an IM norm (apparently my second; I need one more in a round-robin to achieve the title.). Most of my opponents were titled: I played GMs A. Zapata, M. Suba, and P. Popovic and IMs B. Damljanovic, I. Ivanov, O. Foisor, and L. Day, as well as two masters. Here is my victory over a player whose name should be quite familiar to Coloradans.



As if these two tournaments were not enough, I received a call from New York about a week after returning from Canada, asking, "Do you want to play Kasparov?" The world champion made a brief visit to the United States, giving three exhibitions, including a 6-board clock simul against the top junior players in America: Danny Edelman, Vivek Rao, Patrick Wolff, Stuart Rachels, Ilya Gurevich, and myself.

The event took place in New York's Russian Tearoom on February 24. I had a little over a week to prepare, and spent most of the time analyzing my variations as Black. Two days before the game, I found out that I would have White. Kasparov asked each of us to send him 80 games in order to prepare for us. Therefore, he knew what openings would surprise us the most.

The time control was 50 moves in 2½ hours, and then 30/Game. Three of the juniors had Black, and the others (Edelman, Rao, and myself) had White.

a draw. On the adjacent board, Danny Edelman reached the exact same position and accepted the draw by repetition. Our game was already on move 16 by then, and perhaps Danny did not like the position I got. Kasparov was very upset when Edelman took the draw. He said, "You are making a big mistake. It is your only chance to play the world champion and you have the white pieces. You must play." This reaction illustrates Gary's approach to chess. He wants to see the best moves played and feels insulted when his opponent deliberately plays the second-best continuation. Clearly, White must have something better than agreeing to a draw on move 13. In general, it is not aesthetic to play for a draw with the white pieces. Kasparov felt that his opponent was committing a sort of crime against chess. As he put it, "Edelman and I speak two different languages." N:e4

What impressed me most about Kasparov was his enthusiasm for the game and his artistic approach. To him, it is more important to make the best moves than to win. He wants to discover as much as possible about a position and is not content with merely defeating his opponent. The current world champion's maximalist approach to chess is virtually unprecedented in the history of chess.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

(EDITOR'S NOTE: As the journal of communication for Colorado chess-players, we welcome readers' contributions. The ideas expressed below are those of the writers and do not necessarily reflect the opinions of the Editor or the CSCA. Anyone wishing to reply to these letters is encouraged to do so.)

TOURNAMENTS

After looking through Colorado chess magazines, I noticed not only a decline in attendance, but disappearances of entire sections. Entire sections from past tournaments were no longer playing. Why?

At the Boulder Open it seemed like there were a few juniors and everyone else was over 30. Why? What is responsible for the decline of Colorado chess?

Let's start with the lowest level: chess clubs. Can there be growth when the main chess club in the state's largest city frowns on beginning players or players with low ratings? At another club the president is so out of it he can't be listed as the contact person. At the present, when a new player calls me to get information on clubs in Denver, I can only recommend one other club.

Organizers: With a few exceptions, they are the chess clubs, but run the weekend tournaments. With the chokehold the previous clearinghouse person had on Colorado chess, organizers could only get a couple of weekends each year and decided to hold big tournaments to draw more people and make more money. The beginning player plays in one and decides he doesn't like waiting 2-3 hours between rounds. If he has a family, getting out for an entire weekend is near impossible. But under the present Clearinghouse policies, one-day tournaments are all but extinct.

Although there are some good organizers in the state, there are also some whose goal is to take as much money as possible. It seems to me some organizers are overinflating their based-on prizes by using ridiculous attendance expectations. The Boulder Open had prizes based on 150 players (5 sections at 30 each). Denver CC tournaments have a based-on of 90 players. A lot of times the high based-on attendance is to hide a very low entry fee/prize fund ratio. Below I give four tournaments with the based-on attendance and entry fee/prize percentage.

As you can see, the higher the based-on, the lower the entry fee/prize fund percentage. I wonder if most chessplayers know that some tournament directors make more money than the highest prize in a tournament. Unless things change, not only will there be no growth but the decline will continue.

- They say that actions speak louder than words. The action I'll take is this:
- 1) Every tournament from 5/1/88 to 4/30/89 will have all profit put into a fund to help those areas of chess that need money (prison, scholastic, etc.)
  - 2) All tournaments will have an entry fee/prize fund percentage of around 70%.
  - 3) I will keep my T D. fees to a bare minimum.
  - 4) I will hold tournaments as often as I can, so that chess players have the opportunity to avoid bad tournaments.
  - 5) I will promote chess as much as I can.

## COLORADO CHESS TOUR

The 1987-88 Colorado Chess Tour is alive. Well sort of. So far only three 'CSCA approved' Tour events have been held. The Loveland one day allegro event last September, the Boulder Open, and the Loveland Open. No other events met the criteria set forth by the CSCA Board of Directors. Please note that this was not my decision. I am not on the board and my only function concerning the CCT is to calculate the points and report the standings. Similarly it is not my role to determine the number of prizes to be awarded, their value, or when they will be distributed. Those decisions are also made by the board.

There have unfortunately been a lot of problems with the Tour this year. At last September's Colorado Open, the membership indicted very strong support for the Tour. I was asked to present a proposal to the board concerning how the CCT might be run for the future year. I based my proposal on the expressed support of the players and the statements made by Paul Cornelison in his campaign for CSCA President that there is money available from companies for sponsoring chess activities. Does it not seem reasonable that such a company might be interested in receiving publicity throughout the year for their sponsorship of an activity like the CCT?

My proposal tried to address the three goals of the CCT: to encourage players to compete more often, to give recognition to those players who did the best in their class, and to increase attendance at the Tour events. In recent years the Tour prizes have not been very significant: small trophies, plaques, and rather inconsequential amounts of cash. CCT prizes are paid for via a fee collected at each Tour event. For large events this could run close to \$100. And yet, in September there appeared to be many events which wished to be part of the CCT and most players wanted to see the CCT continue if the cost was not too great.

I came up with a proposal which I felt would be an improvement over recent years. There could be more events on the tour, events would not have to pay large fees, more prizes would be aimed at students, and the number of players who could win prizes would be greatly increased. In fact there would be a separate Colorado Scholastic Chess Tour and both the adult and scholastic tours would award THREE sets of prizes: for the first half of the year, the second half of the year, and also for the overall year. This would permit players who missed events or did poorly in events early in the year to still win awards for the second half. The plan also provided for 'bonus points' to players who won prizes. The board amended my proposal somewhat but did not delete any of the features mentioned above. They accepted the overall changes even though they realized that it could cost the more money since Tour fees were being decreased and prizes were being increased. Success would depend on good publicity of tour events to the players, good promotion of the tour to organizers and fulfillment of Mr Cornelison's claims that sponsorship would be available.

Here is the bad news. I know of no attempts to find sponsorship or solicit private donations. Publicity has been poor. No one, including myself, knows what prizes will be awarded. The split season tour concept was scrapped because it was never publicized. I am not certain if any of the organizers, except for board members, have been told what the tour rules are. No organizer has included in their results to me the prize money won, and as a result none of those winners have received appropriate bonus points.

Is anyone to blame? Probably someone should have been more diligent to see to it that publicity, tour rules, etc went out in the fall to the organizers and players. Apparently each of the board members assumed that someone else was responsible. There has also been a lot of bickering and finger pointing. But ultimately, doesn't the responsibility fall to the president? It is not his job to make sure that things get done. Doesn't he have the duty to propose replacing someone who does not do their job? Shouldn't he do all he can to see that the job is getting done?



The CCT is a nice idea. It is fun to see one's name in print. It is a boost to the ego to see yourself ahead of a friend (or rival). The prizes themselves are probably not so important as the recognition and self esteem. But if no one ever sees their name, if people go to events which they think are tour events and then later discover that they were not, if people do not get the points they deserve, if people have to wait for months to get their prizes... Dreams of grandmasters, sponsors, scholastic chess leagues, lots of events, lots of prizes... These are all nice. But how does the work get done? Who puts out the news letters and information to the clubs? Some people dream. Some people promise. Some people work. Others just get everyone mad at them. Good luck chess players!

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For clarification, we reproduce the Tour rules for this year. The split season format was cancelled by the Board for this year because so few Tour events took place in the Fall/Winter season.

1987-88 Colorado Chess Tour Rules

- Format Two tours:  
           Colorado Chess Tour (CCT)  
           Colorado Scholastic Tour (CST)
- Seasons Two half year seasons:  
           Fall/Winter : After Colorado Open - Feb  
           Spring/Summer : Mar - Colo Open  
           Plus special prizes for yearlong cumulative totals.
- Which Events Any Colorado event qualifies if:
- 1 \$A 25 fee must be received by the Clearinghouse when the event is registered as a Tour event. All Tour events must be registered at least 2 months prior to event. \$15 of the fee will be refunded if all forms are received by the Clearinghouse within 2 weeks of event.
  - 2 Event requires CSCA membership (scholastic memberships OK for scholastic events).
  - 3 Event must be properly registered as a 'non-conflicting Tour event' with Clearinghouse.
  - 4 Event must be publicized as a Tour event in at least 1 CSCA publication.
  - 5 Event must offer competition for all ratings classes. (No closed, invitational, A+ or C- events).
  - 6 All CCT events must offer at least a 25% discount on entry fees for for youths, seniors, and unrateds. Discounts are not required on late fees.
  - 7 An organizer may not charge any fees other than entry fee, late fee, USCF, and CSCA dues.
  - 8 Only single weekend events may qualify for the Tour. Events cannot be held exclusively on weekdays and may events may not extend over more than one weekend. One day events do qualify.
  - 9 All events must honor discount coupons which are awarded as Tour prizes. CSCA will reimburse the organizer for half of the value of the coupons.
- Classes CCT: M/E, A, B, C, D, E, Most Active (games played). Qualification for classes is based on rating at end of season.
- CST: HS, JH, EL, PR. Students may continue to play in the same category for the entire tour year regardless of graduation.

- Prizes For each season in each class:
- Top 10 - season plaques
  - Top 5 - qualify for Tournament of Champions
  - Top 2 - trophy
  - 1st - free entry to Colorado Open. (CST winners get free entry to Colorado Junior)
- Annual prizes in each class:
- Top 10 - yearlong plaques
  - Top 5 - Tournament of Champions
  - Top 2 - Trophy and free entry to Colorado Open or Junior.
  - 1st - Five coupons good for \$5 off entry fee to any Tour event in upcoming year.
- Note: no one can get more than one free entry in a given year. A player may get more than one plaque or trophy.
- Formula Continue current formula with the following changes:
- Award bonus points for prize money won (1 pt /\$5).
  - Trophies/medals won in scholastic also give bonus. The factor will be decided by the Scholastic Chess Coordinator.
- Certain events will give more points by virtue of a multiplicative factor:
- 1.50x for 'Championship' events
  - 1.25x for 'Traditional' events
- These factors are intended to help make these special events more prestigious and thereby further enhance attendance.
- Publicity Updated standings (Top 12 in each class) should appear in all 4 CCI's and all 4 (6? 8?) CCN's. Updates should also be mailed with CSCA rosters to all tour organizers for posting at event.
- Promotion Claims have been made that sponsors for chess events are 'waiting for us to ask them'. Let's do it. And also seek donations toward the Tour. Since so many of the players like it, why not ask them to help keep it going and growing! It should be easy to raise \$500 or more to really add some meaning to the prizes! And don't forget that donations to CSCA for promotional activities are TAX DEDUCTIBLE!
- Logistics All Tour information should be processed through the Tournament Clearinghouse (TC). All Tour events must be registered with the TC at least two months prior to the event. Registration fees should be sent to the TC and made payable to CSCA. Crosstables, with all prize winners and amounts indicated, also go to the TC who will then forward them to the Tour statistician and the CCI. Tour standings updates are then returned to the TC in and forwarded accordingly to the CCI, CCN, and upcoming events.

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## COLORADO SPRINGS OPEN


The Colorado Springs Open was held March 5-6 with the unusual (for Colorado) format of a one-section, five-round tournament. 72 players attended, a fine turnout. Top-rated Randy Canney won all his games, but took a half-point bye in one round to let Robert Karnisky win the tournament with 5-0. All the rounds featured hard fighting chess, with many upsets. Among the lower-rated players finishing at the top were Class B players Daoud Zupa (4½-1!), Garth Courtois, Virgil McGuire, and Earl Carr, and C player Inalegwu Odeh (all 4-1).


