The technical articles have, in addition to the types of analysis above, occasional speculation about when a chess computer will perform at the world championship level. They also present the development philosophies and research directions of some researcher, although the commercially available chess machines tend not to publish their industrial secrets.

I look forward to future issues of the Journal. I am intrigued by the endgame analysis. I look forward to the future developments, when we discover how to have the computer annotate and give other reasons for its moves. If these advances occur, they will appear first in the JICCA. I do caution that the primary reason for non-renewals is that subscribers expect a chess magazine and instead receive a technical journal. The Journal comes out three or four times a year. There is a total of 200 pages in the three 1988 issues. With that in mind, the 1988 issues are available for \$20 (US), 1989 issues are available for \$25, and the 1990 issues for \$25 from ICCA, c/o Dr. J. Schaeffer, Dept. of Computing Science, University of Alberta, Edmonton / Alberta T6G 2H1 / Canada.

The Journal of the International Computer Chess Association (ICCA) is an unusual publication. I am quite enthusiastic about it! It serves as a scientific journal and as a news medium to the computer chess community. Here are some of the pros and cons of the Journal from a chess player's viewpoint.

I love the endgame and endgame studies! The JICCA has printed some excellent endgame studies. Computers have determined that the general endgame of king and queen vs king and two bishops is a win for the queen. I found it fascinating reading to examine a position and see the optimum play for both sides. This kind of chess analysis can be expected in future issues.

The following example is different from the chess magazines we are used to, and therefore not for everyone. The moves are not annotated; chess computers have yet to develop the annotation skill. The reader must glean insight from the principal variation without side variations or GM commentary. There is a confidence, however, that the computer has exhaustively analyzed the position, and for many endgames has an OMNISCIENT analysis. The following position is published by L. Stiller, Boston University. When more than one move is best, the alternatives are given in parentheses.

Chess games played by computers abound in the JICCA. When an all-computer tournament is played, the unannotated games are usually published here. In addition, some of the more interesting games are annotated, usually by an IM or stronger player.

Computer chess news also appears in the Journal. Frequently the commercial and experimental commercial chess machines are published in the "Swedish Rating List", which has over 40 rated machines. Occasionally there are interviews with GMs about chess computers, their play, and the influence the computer has upon modern chess.
