## COLORADO OPEN, ETC.

This year's Colorado Open drew 102 players to the regular 3-day tournaments and an additional 14 to the Membership Open on Sunday. (These figures include the Sam & Dave Simul Show. Picture, if you will, Sam Quintanar voluntarily playing Mikhail Ponomarev and Jesse Kraai simultaneously in different and distant rooms.) The tournament went smoothly with relatively few earth-shattering conflicts of will-more on that some other time.

This year's tournament was designated the Don Thompson Memorial to honor our friend who died last December. Vance Aandahl gave a few words at the opening ceremonies. Spake Vance:

"You can honor Don C. Thompson today by imitating Don's style. Here's how: When the clock is ticking, play like a tiger shark coming off a diet, play like a grizzly bear on amphetamines. But as soon as the game is over, whether you've won or lost, be a good sport, be friends with your opponent, and always remember one simple truth - the two of you have just spent several hours working together to create an interesting experience for each other."

Jesse Kraai of New Mexico won the tournament with a fine  $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$  score. Randy Canney was second with 5-1 and, having chosen the right state to live in, became Colorado Champion, a well-deserved title for a fine chess-player, gentleman, and friend. Elsewhere in this issue is an interview Damian Baumgardner conducted with Randy. It looked like Gene Strandberg was going to run away with the honors in the Reserve Section, but Shawn Burnham passed him in the last round to claim the coin. Tom Homan and Erik Been both performed so well that they won prizes for ratings groups higher than their own.

On Sunday the highlight of the weekend came in the form of the annual membership meeting. This orgy of excitement featured numerous reports, a vote on By-laws amendments, the election of officers, and various other matters.

Your Prez/Ed reported at length. Among his requests were that the Colorado Team Championship be revived and that a computer appear to facilitate production of this publication.

I also attended the USCF Delegates Meeting held in August in Los Angeles. Among the more significant decisions there were these: that USCF dues will not be increased (President Dlugy had requested a raise from \$30 to \$40.); that no changes will be made in USCF elections (in my opinion, a smokescreen issue by an organization seeking political power through the creation of a less well-informed electorate); that the free Junior memberships for scholastic tournaments will be abolished (I opposed this change.); and that a Chess Development Fund will be set up, charging \$1 per player in tournaments with entry fees over \$50, to help give some financial security to professional players.

Keith Oxman reported that we are doing well financially. Keith is due many thanks for the fine job he has done getting our financial situation straightened out. Tony Wilson sought and received the ok to buy software with increased record-keeping capacity. Chris Hendrickson reported on prison chess and her need for strong players to visit prison clubs.

Debbie Johnson presented the Tour Report, and well-earned trophies were given to Jim Burden for First Place and Steve Artis for Most Active. The complete prize list is printed in this issue. The membership decided to do away with the requirement that a player must make at least a 1/3 score in a tournament in order to get Tour Points. A lively discussion ensued on the holding of several Tour events on one weekend (as with the Marathon and Last Chance events) and the (alleged) disproportionately large number of points available. This issue was passed on to the Board for contemplation, as were proposals about the state championship, the computer purchase, and accountability for CSCA equipment. Thanks a bunch, folks.

The By-laws amendments presented in the April INFORMANT were voted on; all passed except #7. Officers were elected - see the inside front cover for the new list. The only contested election was for Junior Member. Yours truly was re-elected as USCF Delegate, and the following worthies were chosen as USCF voting members: Garth Courtois, Debra Johnson, Vance Aandahl, and Eric Perlman.

Finally the meeting was reluctantly adjourned.

Games from the tournament will have to wait till next issue. This will give everybody time to send in annotations for their most interesting games.

## **Randy Canney: A Look Inside the Mind of the Colorado Champion**

Randy Canney, now only 29, is without a doubt one of Colorado's strongest native chess players. This year he is both the Colorado Closed and the Colorado Open Champion, and he has twice been rated over 2400. This interview with him took place one evening in August after analyzing a few games and drinking a couple of beers at his home near City Park in Denver. He speaks softly but confidently, and with a wide open Colorado accent, complemented often by a broad grin.

D: When did you start playing chess?

R: When I was eight a family friend and babysitter taught me the moves. I wasn't very good but I liked it right away and started studying it when I was about ten. But I didn't play my first tournament until I was twelve. That was the novice section of the 1973 Colorado Open, and I won it 5-1.

D: So have you played fairly consistently ever since?

R: No. I played a lot of tournaments for a year or two, but then gave them up for a while in favor of basketball and football. I played sporadically through high school and the first part of college, but didn't become regularly active until the last part of college (at CC in the Springs where he studied English) and law school (at CU Boulder). That was about 1982-88, after which I went to Montrose for a couple of years to work as a Public Defender. It was hard to find a chess game on the Western Slope. Then I moved back to the Denver area last summer and have been playing ever since.

D: Were you always a strong player?

R: (Chuckles.) Well, I was first rated around 1200, but within a couple of years I was an 1800 player. I was taking lessons from John Watson, a former state champion and chess author who owned the Chess House in Denver. I won the Colorado Open in 1978 and as a result topped 2000, but it wasn't until late 1982 that I became a master, and only recently have I been pushing the senior master mark (he topped it once in 1987-88 and again by winning the Colorado Closed this year).

D: What else do you do besides play chess?

R: For starters I'm a Public Defender for the State in Jefferson County. And I'm a family man. My wife, Ginny Brannon, teaches Economics at Arapahoe Community College, and we raise two dogs (Jerry-Jeff Walker and Austin) and three cats. I like to run and read (Edward Abbey, Thoreau, Hemmingway, Steinbeck, John Nichols), and I get out on the town now and then (he likes bluegrass, country, and jazz). But my other big pastime besides chess is fly fishing. I spend a lot of time backpacking, camping and fishing in the summer, so I don't play as much chess.

D: So what is the appeal chess has for you?

R: I like the competition -- I've got to admit that winning helps the ego -- and there is also the artistic aspect to the game. Chess is a perfect world, well bounded with no irregularities, in which we create beauty. It can be addictive! On the other hand, I'm a little ambivalent toward the game. There are so many things in the world, and we just sit around and concern ourselves with little finesses that really don't mean a thing. In that respect chess is kind of a stupid game.

D: Does chess relate to your legal practice?

R: Not so much. Chess is more an exercise of pattern recognition. Both of them have a fighting element to them, though. I guess I'm sort of a civilized fighter.

D: Do you have career ambitions?

R: Not really. I like my work and plan to do it for the foreseeable future. I like criminal defense, and I like the idea of helping poor people. I also like the people I work with, and most of them are contented with their work too. It can be a satisfying career when you believe in what you do.

D: Let's take a "Dewars Profile" here.

Vital Stats: Born (12/22/61) and raised in "suburban Lakewood, U.S.A."

Favorite game: A draw with GM Ron Henley of Texas, where he was on the ropes but then snuck out (published in a CSCA Informant in late 84 or early 85).

Best tournament: The Colorado Open (1978) which he won with five wins and a draw.

Favorite fishing streams: The Gunnison and the South Platte.

Favorite beer: Dos Equis.

Favorite chess books: *Modern Ideas in Chess* (Reti); *Chess Endings: Essential Knowledge* (Averbach); *Modern Chess Strategy* (Pachmann); *Think Like a Grandmaster* (Kotov); *Game collections* (Alekhine, Botvinnik, Fischer).

D: Are there any other revealing curiosities you can think of?

R: Well, I've been a vegetarian for three or four years. Ginny has influenced me here, because she's a strong animal rights activist and does animal rescue work.

D: How about a couple of tips for up and coming players?

R: I always study with a book on middlegames, a book on endgames, and a


game collection simultaneously. I play through games quickly just to get a sense of it and help build my experience in pattern recognition and my ability to visualize strategies. I wouldn't recommend spending too much time on openings; it's good to have a repertoire, but I would steer away from the most popular paths. A good opening book is *How to Open a Chess Game* by 7 GMs. Make sure to combine your study with both tournament and speed chess. And it helps to study tactical positions. It's important too to go over your games and look for recurring mistakes. (Randy has collected and organized all his tournament games since November, 1973). Also, I think it is important to play up. I started that practice right away and made it a general rule. 1700/1800 players should play in the open sections if they want to improve.

D: What are your ambitions as a chess player?

R: Eventually I would like to secure myself as a senior master. I think I have enough talent to become an IM, but that would take a big time commitment which I doubt I'll be able to make. On the one hand improvement and winning is satisfying, but I'm also becoming less and less attached to the results of my games. There is, I think, something of an unhealthy investment of ego involved in chess -- let's face it (grins), at least half of the world champions were mentally ill egomaniacs! -- but if you can keep it in perspective it can be a real healthy game. For me, something Walter Gerash (who is also a Public Defender) said sums it up: "When you lose a chess game nobody goes to prison."

Here is one of Randy's favorite games which has not yet been published.

## The Post-Mortem

*The Waiting Game*

by Eric S. Perlman

This game illustrates the maxim "different strokes for different folks" about as well as any. Its opening, a relatively rare variation of the French Winawer, cannot appeal to everyone, for Black accepts a somewhat restricted position in many lines - which, however, is very tough to crack. The game often turns into a maneuvering struggle, rich in nuances - as we shall see.

**White: J. Davies (2038)**

**Black: S. Quintanar (2198)**

*French Defense, Winawer Variation*

Pike's Peak Open 1991

**1.e4 e6 2.d4 d5 3.Nc3 Bb4 4.e5 b6**

Ever since Botvinnik first popularized the Winawer, its main line has been 4...c5, immediately striking at the center, which is (nowadays) usually answered by 5.a3. Examples of this abound; rather than giving one in particular, I will commend the reader to Nigel Short's recent book *The French Defense* (London Chess Centre, 1990). The opening notes below borrow heavily from his treatment.

The text move 4...b6 and 4...Qd7 are often said to form a "complex." By that we mean that they often transpose, and that they have common strategic goals, including the exchange of White-squared Bishops. Note, however, that transposition is not universal: 4...Qd7 5.Qg4 can be answered by 5...f5!, while 4...b6 5.Qg4 necessitates 5...Bf8 (see below).

**5.a3**

One of two direct approaches. The other is 5.Qg4 Bf8, a recent example of which went 6.Bg5 Qd7 7.f4 Nc6 8.Nf3 (or 8.O-O-O Bb7 9.Nge2 Nge7 10.Ng3 unclear - Short) 8...Nge7 9.Bxe7!? (Why not 9.Bb5?) Nxe7 10.Bb5 c6 11.Bd3 h5 12.Qh3 Rh6! 13.O-O g6 14.b4 Nf5 with a very slight edge for White, Timman-Portisch, Bugojno 1986. Murray Chandler, in particular, has made hay with 5.a3.

**5...Bf8**

Of course, Black can also play 5...Bxc3+, e.g. 6.bxc3 Qd7 7.a4 Ba6 8.Bxa6 Nxa6 9.Qg4 (9.Qd3 Nb8 10.Qg3 f5 11.Ne2 Nc6 12.Nf4 = Fedorowicz-Seirawan, US championships 1988) 9...f5 10.Qh5+ g6 11.Qe2 Nb8 = Sokolov-Vaganian, USSR championships 1988.

**6.Nf3**

Four years ago, 6.Bb5+!? was all the rage, attempting to force positions like those in note I after Black's sixth. The two can differ, however, as in Cabrilo-Bronstein, Pancevo 1987, which went 6...c6 7.Ba4 Bd7 8.Bb3 Ne7 9.Nce2 c5 10.c3 Bb5 11.Nf3 Nbc6 12.O-O a5!? with an unclear game.

**6...Ba6**

The most direct, but interestingly enough, coverage of it in openings texts is nearly non-existent! ECO C, for example, gives "7.Bxa6 Nxa6 8.b4!±" (about which see later). Wade *et al.* give instead 8.Qd3 Nb8 when "White probably retains the advantage of the first move but little more" in their notes to Chandler-Vaganian in

the 1986 Dubai Olympiad tournament book. Short doesn't even mention it in his book; Dolmatov, in his notes to Dolmatov-Gulko, USSR 1985 in *Informant* 39, mentions the move but gives no continuation. There are two alternatives which are frequently played:

I. 6...Qd7 7.Bb5! c6 9.Ba4 Ba6 9.Ne2 Bb5!? (the classic game Chandler-Vaganian, Dubai 1986, went 9...h5 10.O-O Nh6 11.Re1±) 10.Bb3 c5 11.c3 Nc6 12.O-O Nge7 13.Re1 with an unclear position, but some edge, Chandler-Timman, Amsterdam 1987.

II. 6...Ne7 7.Bb5+ Bd7 8.Bd3 c5 9.Nb5 Nf5 10.Bg5 Qc8 11.dxc5 bxc5 12.c4 unclear, Sax-Portisch, Reykjavik 1988.  
7.Bxa6 Nxa6 8.Qe2

I don't agree with ECO's proposed 8.b4, which it gives with no further analysis or credit; it seems to me Black can profitably play the immediate 8...c5, for example 9.bxc5 (9.b5 Nc7 10.Be3 c4 followed by ...Ne7 and ...a5 closes the Q-side entirely) 9...bxc5 10.O-O (10.Bg5 Qd7 11.a4 Ne7 is about equal) Ne7 seems to leave Black in decent shape. Davies' idea is to force the Knight back, but this is more flexibly done on d3, so that the Nc3 can later retreat to play c4.

8...Nb8 9.O-O Ne7 10.Bg5 Qd7 11.Rad1 h5 (Diagram 1)

Already we have a maneuvering game; White must now strive to open lines, while Black, who is behind in development, wishes to keep it closed as long as possible, or at least till he can cope with an open board. This move, a common device, secures f5 for the Knight. Another possibility, however, was 11...Nc6 followed by ...O-O-O.

12.Rfe1 Nf5 13.Nh4?!

The less pieces on the board, the less an advantage in development tells. White should play 13.Qd3 intending Ne2 and c4 here, to open the center.

13...Nxb4 14.Bxb4 Nc6

It seems to me that another idea is 14...Be7 15.Bxe7 Kxe7 16.f4 g6 17.Qd3 Rd8 intending a quick ...Kf8. Both are natural, but Sam's choice may be better, for the c6 Knight may be re-routed to f5.



15.Qa6

Less troublesome than it appears at first blush, but it does serve a purpose: White prevents the c6 Knight from achieving its preferred post at f5 for a long time - a minor victory. It is debatable whether this is worth the essential tempo loss, however - note that the Queen goes back to d3 in 2 moves anyhow.

15...Be7 16.Bxe7 Kxe7

Mark Scheidies suggested 16...Nxe7 intending ...O-O here; while the move itself is logical, I don't agree with his intent: given Black's slow development, the Kingside would be a bad place to castle. However, if it's followed up by ...Nf5 quickly, it looks OK.

17.Qd3 a5 18.Ne2 (Diagram 2) Kd8?!



Another interesting juncture. Black has many ways to go here, but since f7 soon needs to be protected again, this doesn't seem right. If the King must move, 18...Ke8 seems best (note that if 18...Kf8 19.c4 Ne7 20.Nf4 g6 21.Qf3! threatens Nxg6 after exchanges on d5, and here the f6 weakness is also especially telling), as it just saves a tempo which Black could use to position his Rooks.

19.c4 Ne7 20.Qf3 Ke8 21.Nf4 g6 22.cxd5

The maneuvering game goes on. Black has prepared for this simplification by ...Ne7 and ...Qd7, and the d-pawn here becomes weak. It is probably better therefore to attempt to cross Black up by playing 22.Re3 Rd8 23.Rc3 followed by c5.

22...Nxd5 23.Nxd5 Qxd5 24.Qf6 Rf8 25.h3 Kd7 26.Re3 c6

(Diagram 3)

Black now has a strong point at d5, which this move reinforces. This move also guards against the advance d5 for White, which would rid him of a weak pawn and open the game.

27.Qf3

Leads to a rather drab ending which should be drawn, if neither side makes weaknesses. Probably more active is 27.Rf3, intending to press the f-pawn with 28.Qg7. This forces both sides into a crouch: 27.Rf3 Kc7 28.Qg7 Qd7, or also 27...Ke8!? intending ...Rd8 and ...Rd7 followed by ...c5! I prefer the second variation, as it keeps the Queen on an excellent square, while White's is off in never-never land.

27...Qxf3 28.Rxf3 Kc7 29.Rc1 Kb7 30.Kf1 Rad8 31.Rfc3 Rc8 32.b4?

White opens a file - and then never uses it! In rook endings, activity is a necessity - so one must make openings for oneself only. He must also take into account here the weakness of the b4 pawn. Simply 32.f4 or 32.Ke2 would suffice for a draw, for lines could only be opened by eliminating the d4 pawn, White's main weakness; such moves would also let White centralize his King. This move, unfortunately, also seems typical of White's play in this ending - he seems without a plan, as all his moves have been one-move threats.

32...axb4 33.axb4 Rfd8 34.Rf3 Rc7 35.Rd1 Ka6!

The weakness of the b4 pawn becomes clear - as is the difference it makes between the two Kings' activity.

36.Ke2

Already placing a rook on the a-file makes no difference for White - his King has to get into the game.

36...Kb5 37.Rfd3 Ra7!


Excellent. Black takes the open file - showing the other problem with White's 32nd. The b4 pawn can wait.

38.Rc1 Ra4 39.Rdc3 Rc8

The White Rooks must be kept passive. No good is 39...Rxd4? 40.Rxc6 Raxb4 41.Rc7 when White has full compensation for a pawn in his active Rooks.

40.Rc4 Rxb4?!

After all his good work, Black takes the pawn one move too early - on the last move of the time control. The decision nearly costs him the win, as White can




now activate his rook (after the exchange). Most exact was the final prophylaxis 40...Rc7! to cut off the seventh.

**41.Rxb4+ Kxb4 (Diagram 4) 42.Kd3?**

Without an active Rook, White might just as well resign already. Black's 40th left the opportunity open for 42.Rb1+!, when there are two lines:

I. 42...Ka5 43.Ra1+ Kb5 44.Rb1+! (Mark Scheidies points out that taking the seventh here is bad - 44.Ra7 Kc4 45.Rxf7 b5! when Black has a near-certain victory) 44...Ka6 45.Ra1+ Kb7 46.Ra3! (this stops an immediate 46...Ra8 due to 47.Rf3) b5 47.Rf3 Rc7 48.Kd2 Kb6 49.Kc2 Ra7 50.Kb3 despite the protected nature of Black's passer here White has a tough blockade and may well draw this.



II. 42...Kc4 43.Rxb6 Kxd4 (it's too late for 43...Rc7 44.Ke3) 44.Rb7 (else ...Rc7 and all is safe) and now:

A. 44...Kxe5 (44...c5 45.Rxf7 c4 46.Kd2 should draw) 45.Rxf7 c5 46.Kd3 Rd8+ (now Black's Rook must get active - this move attempts to tie White to the Blockade of the pawn with his King and then invade the Kingside; if 46...Rc6 47.Rg7 holds) 47.Kc4 Rd5 48.Rc7 Ke4 just misses winning, but a draw does exist: 49.Rxc5 Rxc5+ 50.Kxc5 Kd3 (50...e5 leads to a pretty zugzwang if White plays 51.Kd6 g5 52.Ke6 g4 53.hxg4 hxg4 54.Kf6 Kf4!!, when White can't stop both ...e3 and ...g3, but it's all foiled by simply 51.Kc4 and draws) 51.Kd6 Ke2 52.f4! and White draws, e.g. 52...Ke3 53.Kxe6 Kxf4 54.Kf6 g5 55.Kg6 (but not 55.h4? because of the problem-like 55...gxh4 56.Kg6 h3!! 57.gxh3 h4! followed by 58...Kg3).

B. 44...Rf8 45.Rc7! (Now that the c-pawn has been abandoned, it must be attacked. If instead 45.f4 Ke4 46.g3 h4 47.Kf2 (47.gxh4 Kxf4 followed by ...Kxe5 and wins) 47...hxg3+ 48.Kxg3 Rc8! and the c-pawn will roll to victory; the pawn at f7 is immaterial now that White's King is so far from the scene.) 45...c5 46.Kd2! (White must once again ignore the loss of the e5-pawn, since 46.f4 Rb8! 47.Rxf7 c4 may well win for Black) 46...Kxe5 47.Kxe5 47.Rxc5+ Kd4 48.Rc7 and the ending is a very tough win, if indeed it is winnable for Black. Many 4 vs. 3 pawn Rook endings are drawn.

It therefore seems that 42.Rb1+ was White's best path, and may well hold the draw in all lines.

**42...Rc7! 43.Rb1+ Ka5 44.Kc4 Ka6 45.g4**

Good, but too late. White should reduce the number of pawns on the board.

**45...hxg4 46.hxg4 c5 47.dxc5 Rxc5+ 48.Kd3 Rd5 49.Ke4 b5 50.f4 Rc5 51.Rd1 Rc4+**

The Rook will serve as the King's shield as he penetrates to the third rank; this ending is now almost certainly a win for Black (BCE and other ending manuals give numerous examples of similar endings), as the White King is cut off. White should, however, make Black prove it with 52.Kf3 b4 53.Rd8 (53.Rd7 b3!) Rc7! followed by ...K-b5-a4 and pushing the b-pawn. But White should of course not play...

**52.Rd4?? Rxd4+ 53.Kxd4 Kb6 0-1**

White cannot hold the opposition.
