SCHOLASTICS

The 1992 Scholastics Championship tournaments have recently concluded to the satisfaction of all (well, almost). We had excellent turnouts - the Southern Elementary Individual Qualifier had 88 players, 36 of them from one school! This school, Ivywild Elementary of Colorado Springs, also brought six teams to the Team Championship. These wonderful numbers are due to the work of Wendell Derritt of Ivywild, chess promoter extraordinaire. Kudos also go to Norbert Martinez, whose teams won the hardware in the team tournaments, and to many other folks who show their commitment to kids and chess. TOURNAMENTS

We are pleased to announce that 1992 will see the return of state class and team championship tournaments. The Denver Chess Club will be hosting the class event in July, and the team tournament will be in Colorado Springs in the fall.

Speaking of tournaments, we are now accepting bids for the 1992 Colorado Open. Held on Labor Day Weekend, this is our state championship tournament and is our major annual tournament. Clubs wishing to host the Open should send a written bid to me by MAY 1 (no later, please). Bids should include a proposed prize fund and note any problem areas regarding the site or schedule.

SUMMER ACTIVITIES

We regret to note that the Colorado State Games have been cancelled for this summer. Hopefully they will be back next year.

As usual, we will have chess booths at the Territory Days Festival in Colorado Springs (May 23-25) and the People's Fair in Denver (June 6-7). These are great things: they are much fun and they give us a wonderful chance to promote chess. We need people to work in both events. Coloradans Play in Vegas

The 1992 North American Open was held January 2-5 in Las Vegas. Among the more than 500 participants were about a dozen players from Colorado. Michael Mulyar led Coloradans in the Open section, scoring $3\frac{1}{2}$ out of 6. Jim Burden, Jim Hamblin, and Dan Joelson (a Wyoming resident but Colorado regular) each scored 3, and Chris Brunt finished with $2\frac{1}{2}$.

Nine grandmasters competed in the Open section, and Colorado players had several encounters with them. Chris started things on the eve of the tournament, beating GM Roman Dzindzichashvili in a simul. In Round 1, Dan got a draw against GM John Fedorowicz. It was the only blemish on Fedorowicz's record, as he tied Dzindzi and Joel Benjamin for first. Jim Burden got a little more than he bargained for with two pairings against GMs. Jim lost to Walter Browne in Round 2 and Larry Christiansen in Round 4, but the Christiansen game provided quite a bit of excitement. The complete account of this encounter is described by Patrick Wolff in the April 1992 issue of Chess Life.

Erik Been excelled in the Amateur (under 2000) section, scoring $4\frac{1}{2}$ and winning a share of the Under 1800 prize money. Three of his wins were against players rated more than 300 points above him. Other familiar names in this section were David Bowers ($3\frac{1}{2}$), Yuval Laor (3), and Waldemar Woszczak (1). The Reserve (under 1600) section included Salvador Mena-Amaro ($2\frac{1}{2}$), Michael Engels ($2\frac{1}{2}$), Bill Long (2), and myself ($4\frac{1}{2}$). I blew a chance for the Second Place prize by losing in the last round.

The Post-Mortem

Walking on a Wire

One of the more difficult things in chess is properly balancing attack and defense. In a recent *Chess Life* column, IM Jeremy Silman demonstrated graphically how thinking of one's ideas only can get you into serious trouble. This month's game is a classical example of just that - the struggle between passive defensive attitudes - "What does my opponent threaten" - and accomplishing one's own ideas. Both sides walk that line in this game. The advantage passes from player to player, and we get a see-saw.

White: Steve Dieckhoff

Black: Herman Chew

King's Gambit

Boulder Open 1992 (U2000 Section)

1.e4 e5 2.f4 Nc6

Black has decided to decline the gambit, a procedure which is normally undertaken by 2...Bc5, etc. This line isn't even mentioned in *ECO*. However, it's sensible, and later transposes into a side line. White, of course cannot play 3.fxe5 now because of 3...Qh4+.

3.Nf3 d6

We have now transposed into *ECO* C30, line 1, footnote 1. *ECO*'s recommendation is 4.Bb5 Bd7 5.O-O Nd4(?)! 6.Nxd4 exd4 7.Bc4 g6 8.d3 Bg7 9.f5 Nf6 10.Bg5 ΔQf3±, as in Euwe-Wieserman, Nederland 1922-23. However, one must really wonder at the efficacy of 5...Nd4. Black seems much better served by quick development, for example 5...Nf6 6.d3 (now threatening 7.Bxc6 and 8.fxe5 in earnest) 6...exf4 7.Bxf4 a6! 8.Bc4 Na5 9.Bb3 Nxb3 10.axb3 Bc6 11.Nc3 Be7, when Black has a playable game.

4.Bc4 Be7 5.O-O Nf6 6.d3 O-O 7.a3

This kind of prophylactic move in the opening is often seen, especially in games between lower-ranked players - often when there is no reason for it. Even though it is early, it is apropos to stress that the main drawback to Black's alignment is its passivity. Black's pieces lack good posts, and therefore White's responsibility is to play actively. This move seems to serve only one purpose - an attempt to preserve the Bc4 on its diagonal. However, White must also control the center squares, in particular d4. Therefore, it seems that 7.c3 would be more efficient, followed by Ruy Lopez-style development.

7...Bg4

Steve Dieckhoff gives this move "?!" on his score-sheet; suffice it to say I disagree. Black seeks to remove pressure from the e5 pawn to free his Be7; if this is his wish, he has a very hard time doing without ...Bg4. The move's one drawback is that most ensuing positions have opposite colored bishops - a state of affairs naturally favoring an attacker.

8.h3 Bxf3 9.Qxf3 exf4 10.Bxf4 Ne5 11.Bxe5

Almost forced. If the Queen moves, Black has a good game with 11.Qe2 Nxc4 12.dxc4 Re8 13.Nc3 h6 followed by ...Bf8 with strong pressure on the e-file, highlighting White's weak pawn structure.

11...dxe5 12.Nc3 c6 13.g4?! (Diagram 1)

Here's the flip side of the coin. White only thinks of his own plans here, and underestimates the strength of Black's resources. There is no need for hurry here; simply 13.Bb3 looks best.

13...Qb6+ 14.Kh1 Qxb2 15.Ne2 Qxc2 16.Ra2 Qa5 17.g5 b5!

Black already envisions the piece sacrifice at this point - and the Rubicon is crossed. First of all, it is easy to convince oneself of the necessity of the sacrifice. For example, if 17...Nd7 18.Bxf7+ Kh8 19.Qg4! (not 19.Qh5 g6 20.Bxg6 Rxf1+ 21.Kg2 Nf8! and White is repelled) 19...Rad8 20.Ng3 followed by Nh5, when White has more than enough compensation for a pawn in his attack.

18.gxf6 Bxf6 19.Qg4

This is White's only way to win the piece. 19.Nc3 fails to 19...Qa5, so White relies on the pin.

19...bxc4!

The only move, which had to be foreseen on move 17. Black cannot retreat his Bishop by 19...Be7 because of 20.Nc3 Qa5 21.Bxf7+!! Rxf7 22.Qe6 Raf8 23.Raf2 and White mops up.

20.Rxf6 Qd1+ 21.Kg2 cxd3 22.Rf1

Of course. The ending after 22.Nc3 Qxg4+ 23.hxg4 gxf6 is a loss for White. 22...Qb3 23.Nc1 Qc4 24.Rd2 Rad8 25.Rfd1 Rd4! (Diagram 2)

Black makes the right move - for the wrong reason. He believes there is no way to hold the d-pawn, and so he cedes it to White, going after the e-pawn. While Black can win it, he should not do so without first limiting White's d-file pressure.

26.Nxd3



One might think that 26.Rxd3 Rxe4 27.Qg3 is more active, as the Knight guards e2 and White can take the seventh. However, Black has very dangerous counter-chances after 27...h6 28. Rd7 Rb8!, intending ...Rb2+.

26...Rxe4?!

The move is obvious, but premature. Black can apply a pin with 26...Rfd8! when the Knight can't move. Only after it is protected should he then take the pawn, e.g. 27.Qf3 h6 (27...Rxe4 28.Nb2! and White wins material because of the mate threat) 28.Kg1 Rxe4, etc. In the game, White's rooks become too active.


27.Qg3 f6

This, unfortunately for Black, is nearly forced. The only alternative was 27...Qe6, when 28.Nc5! is very good for White, and else the e-pawn goes. 28.Nb2 Re2+!



This is the only way. Otherwise, White takes the seventh with threats galore.

29.Kf1 Re3+ (Diagram 3)



This reaches an ending which looks superficially attractive, but is very difficult for Black because of the tremendous activity of the White rooks. Instead, Black could reach a fascinating position by sacrificing his Queen with 29...Rxd2+!? 30.Nxc4 Rxd1+ 31.Ke2 Rfd8, when Black has two rooks and four pawns against queen and knight. Both sides must play very actively and carefully here; however, in my estimation the game is roughly equal. A typical line is 32.Qb3! (Threatening discovered checks) 32...Kf8! (and not 32...R1d5 33.Ne3) 33.Qb7! (the ending after 33.Qxd1 Rxd1 34.Kxd1 Ke7 is at least a draw for Black) 33...R8d4 (also probably drawing is 33...R8d7 34.Qxc6 Kf7 35.a4; either way Black needs to give up one of the two pawns, and undoubtedly the c-pawn is better to give up. Here the win would hinge on whether or not Black can advance his f and e pawns.) 34.Qxc6 Rc1 35.Qc8+! Ke7 (note 35...Kf7 36.Nd6+ winning the exchange. This theme repeats over and over) 36.Qc7+ Rd7 37.Qc5+ Kd8 (note that the King could never escape in safety to g6 because of all the forks) 38.Qb5! when Black does best to take the perpetual with 38...Rc2+, when White can't escape the checks.

30.Nxc4 Rxg3 31.Rd7!

Though it looks as if White is giving up another pawn, in truth he is taking his only chance to win. He has a slight edge here, but only due to his very active rooks, which give him the opportunity to pressure the King itself. If White exchanges a pair of rooks to protect his pawn, he loses all his edge, for example 31.Rd3 Rxd3 32.Rxd3 h6! 33.Rd7 Rf7, followed by ...Kh7, ...g5, and ...f5.

The h-pawn was a greek gift: 31...Rxh3 32.Rxa7 Rb8 33.Rdd7! followed by the a-pawn's advance. Threats against the King tie the rooks down, and Black will collapse quickly.

32.Nd6 Rxa3 33.Kg2 Rb8 34.Rd2 Rab3

After winning the a-pawn, is Black forced to give it up so quickly? It's hard to say. Notice how dangerous the threat of 35.Nf5! is, however, e.g. 34...a5 35.Nf5 g6 36.Nh6+ Kh8 37.Rc7, when Black has many things hanging by a thread. Advancing the e-pawn may just allow the draw though: 37...e4 38.Rxc6 (the other rook can't take the seventh, unfortunately, because of Black's threats!) 38...e3 39.Re2 f5!. Note further that if 34...g6 to prevent Nf5, White has 35.Ne4 Rf8 36.Rc7! with dangerous threats, including the possibility of doubling on the seventh now that the rook is off the b-file.

35.Nc4

Adequate, but with 35.Nf5 followed by 36.Ne7+ White gives Black a choice of letting White destroy either the Kingside or both Queenside pawns.

35...R3b5 36.Rxa7 Rd5

The idea is to unite the Pawns and exchange off pair of rooks - an offer White should refuse (and does). Black's chances are fading fast, and may be already gone.

37.Rda2 e4 (Diagram 4)

Black needs this move eventually if he is to safeguard his King from the front. There is the additional motivation that one would like to advance the pawns, but as we will see it's too slow, at least if carried out in this fashion. Perhaps it would be better to play 37...Rd4 38.Ne3 and only then 38...e4 followed by ...g6; the difference is that White's pieces aren't as well placed.

38.Re7 Rg5+ 39.Kf2 f5 40.Raa7 h6 41.h4 Rg4 42.Ne5 Rb2+

Note how Black's missing piece hurts him, even though he's up four pawns. This move is forced, but the mating threats are now so strong Black will have to jettison his Rook for the White Knight.

43.Ke3 Rgg2 44.Re8+ Kh7 45.Raa8

The threat is simple and deadly: 46.Rh8 mate. There is no alternative to the following.

45...f4+ 46.Kxe4

More direct is 46.Kxf4 Rbf2+ 47.Kxe4 Re2+ 48.Kf5 Rxe5+ when White has eliminated the f-pawn also, and remains with mating threats.

46...Rge2+ 47.Kf5 Rxe5+ 48.Rxe5 f3 49.Re3 f2 50.Rf3 Rb4 51.Rxf2 Rxh4

This ending is Black's last resort - and it should end fairly quickly. Once again, White's quickest road is to cooperatively use his two rooks to attack the King. 52.Rc8 c5

The c-pawn can't be saved. If 52...Rh5 53.Kg4 Rg5+ 54.Kh4 c5 55.Rc2! and it falls. Note the theme - threatening the exchange of Rooks. It will come up over and over again.

53.Rc2 Rh5+ 54.Ke6 Rg5 55.R2xc5 Rg1 56.R8c7 Rg2 57.Rf5!

The right move - but the wrong reason. White should have the idea of doubling on the seventh followed by Ke6-e7-f8 here, to win the g-pawn.

57...Re2+ 58.Kd5?!

Yes, anything wins - but why bring the King away from the scene? White could spell disaster for Black after 58.Re5! Black can't afford to exchange rooks, but he also can't afford not to, for example 58...Rf2 59.Rf7 Rg2 60.Ke7 threatening 61.Kf8.

58...Rg2 59.Ke4 Rg1 60.Rf8 Rg2 61.Rcc8 Rg1 62.Rh8+ Kg6 63.Rc6+ Kh5

The first stage has been accomplished - the King is off to the side. In the next stage, Black will be forced to advance the g-pawn in order to keep it, but he will lose the h-pawn instead.


64.Rd8 g6

Note that White threatened 65.Rd5+ Kh4 66.Kf3! and Rc4+.

65.Kf3 Rg5 66.Rd4 Rg1 67.Rc2 Rf1+ 68. Rf2 Rh1 69.Rg4!

Step two has been established, and the pawn must advance - after which it is soon lost. The game is only a matter of time now, and I give it without comment:

69...g5 70.Rb4 Rh3+ 71.Kg2 Rc3 72.Rb6 Rc4 73.Rff6 Rc2+ 74.Kf1 g4 75.Rb5+ Kh4 76.Rxh6+ Kg3 77.Rb3+ Kf4 78.Rf6+ Kg5 79.Rf2 Rc4 80.Kg2 Rd4 81.Kg3 Rc4 82.Rb5+ Kg6 83.Rf4 Rc3+ 84.Kxg4 Rc1 85.Rb6+ Kg7 86.Kg5 1-0.
