The Post-Mortem

Activity and Overextension: Inside a Champion's Mind

by Eric S. Perlman

All too often, a player seizes the initiative, and then squanders it, either through a mistake or superior play on the opponent's part. In this game, Black seizes the initiative and a slight advantage following White's rather unusual transpositional sequences in the opening. He then lets it slip by not playing actively enough at a critical instance, and goes into an equal ending, where he soon errs, allowing White to create a passed a-pawn which should suffice for a victory. White returns the favor in spades, however, and the game returns to Black.

I would like to acknowledge the tremendous help NM Randy Canney gave me in the preparation of this article. After one phone call, Randy provided me with information from the recent book *The Marshall Attack* by John Nunn and Tim Harding, as well as three games from recent *Informants* and his own thoughts on the game. His help was truly a godsend in helping me to unravel this enormously complex and difficult game.

White: James McCarty (2319)

Black: Randy Canney (2379)

Spanish Opening, Marshall Attack (by transposition)

Colorado Open 1991

1.e4 e5 2.Nf3 Nc6 3.Bb5 a6 4.Ba4

Time and fashions can often change without warning. The Exchange variation, 4.Bxc6, has periodically been in and out of fashion. In the early part of this century, Emanuel Lasker made it a weapon; many will recall his brilliant win over Capablanca in the 1914 St. Petersburg tourney. Later, Bobby Fischer revived it, scoring nice wins against Portisch and Gligoric. Today, it has resumed its secondary role, but who knows when it will again rear its head?

4...Nf6 5.d3

Steinitz's old move, securing the center before Kingside action via normal Lopez routes, e.g. Nbd2-f1-e3 (or g3) -f5, g4, etc.

5...b5 6.Bb3 Be7 7.O-O

The beginning of a rather intricate series of transpositions. This move places us back in the more common 5.O-O lines, with this position more commonly being reached via 1.e4 e5 2.Nf3 Nc6 3.Bb5 a6 4.Ba4 Nf6 5.O-O b5 6.Bb3 Be7 7.d3. A purer form of Steinitz's plan could be sought after 7.Nbd2.

7...Bb7

The alternative is 7...d6, when ECO's main line is 8.a4 (note also 8.c3 O-O 9.Nbd2 etc.) 8...Na5 9.axb5 Nxb3 10.cxb3 O-O 11.Nc3 Bb7 12.bxa6 Bxa6 with an unclear game, Pilnik-Matanovic, Beverwijk 1984.

8.c3

This move order surprised Canney, and is not in ECO, so it may well be somewhat of an innovation. ECO gives instead:

I. 8.c4 b4 9.Ba4 d6 10.d4 O-O 11.d5 Nb8 12.Bc2 a5 13.h3 c6 14.Re1 Nbd7 "+=" based on 15.Be3 Qb8 16.Nbd2 Rc8 17.Nf1 cxd5 18.cxd5 of A.Rodriguez-Dorfman, Cienfuegos 1977. However, 15...Qb8 strikes me as illogical. Black gets a fully playable game after 15...Nb6!, essentially forcing 16.b3 because of the upcoming ...Ba6. However, after 16...cxd5 17.exd5 (17.cxd5 Ba6) 17...Nfd7 18.Nbd2 h6 19.Nf1 a4, Black has active Queenside play.

II. 8.Nc3 O-O (or 8...d6 9.a4 b4 10.Ne2 Na5 11.Ba2 O-O 12.Ng3 c5 13.Nf5 Bc8 14.N3h4 Be6 and White is slightly better, Balashov-Hennings, Sochi 1973) 9.Bd2 d6 10.Nd5 Nd7 (10...Nxd5 11.Bxd5 Qd7 12.a4 Bf6 13.Bg5 was Fabisovic-Mikhalkhishin, Baku 1979; 10...Re8 11.a4 Nb8 12.axb5 axb5 13.Rxa8 Bxa8 14.Nxf6 Bxf6 15.Qa1 of Kholmov-Planinc, Kapfenburg 1970 is also given as +=, but I don't see it after 15...Nd7 16.Qa6 Qb8.) 11.a4 bxa4 12.Bxa4 Nc5 13.Bxc6 Bxc6 14.Be3 with a slight edge, Geller-Dorfman, USSR Championships 1975.

8...O-O 9.Re1 d5 (Diagram)

9...d6 would allow White to implement Steinitz's plan, but Black instead opts for a Marshall.

10.exd5 Nxd5 11.Nxe5 Nxe5 12.Rxe5

After all the transpositions, we have reached a somewhat uncommon Marshall line. If White attempts to play d4 now, Black will have an important extra tempo over standard lines. This position is more commonly reached via 1.e5 e5 2.Nf3 Nc6 3.Bb5 a6 4.Ba4 Nf6 5.O-O Be7 6.Re1 b5 7.Bb3 O-O 8.c3 d5 9.exd5 Nxd5 and now either 10.Nxe5 Nxe5 11.Rxe5 Bb7 (instead of the more common 11...c6 and 11...Nf6) 12.d3 (stronger are both 12.Qf3 and 12.d4) or 10.d3 Bb7 11.Nxe5 Nxe5 12.Rxe5.

12...Qd6!? TN

Now we are on new ground. Previous praxis, both in this line and in lines where an immediate d4 has been played, has concentrated on 12...Qd7 and 12...Bf6:

I. 12...Qd7 Zsuzsa Polgar has used this move, which is also the most usual when d4 has already been played. 13.Qf3 (13.d4 Bf6 14.Re1 Rad8 15.Na3 - 15.Be3 b4 16.Qd3 Rfe8 17.Nd2 Qc6 - 15...c5 with good play) 13...Rad8 14.Nd2 c5 15.Qf5 (15.Ne4 c4!? (The only way to win the rook or the exchange. Note 15...f6 16.Rh5!, 15...Nf6 16.Bg5!, and 15...f5 16.Rxe7! etc. all with advantage to White.) 16.dxc4 Nf6 17.Be3 Nxe4 18.Rxe4 Qd3 19.Rd4 Bxf3 20.Rxd3 Rxd3 21.gxf3 with equality, Spassky-Zs. Polgar, Cannes 1987) 15...Qxf5 16.Rxf5 Nf6 17.Bc2 Nd7 and Black has good compensation, London-Zs. Polgar, New York Open 1987.

II. 12...Bf6 can also be played. The ideas (with White's pawn on d4 instead of d3) can be illustrated by the game Servat-Adla, Buenos Aires 1990: 13.Re1 Re8 14.Na3 (! Adla; 14.Be3 Nxe3 15.fxe3 Bg5 with an edge for Black; 14.Nd2 Nf4 15.Nf3 Bxf3 16.gxf3 Bg5 with good compensation - Adla) 14...b4 15.Nc4 bxc3 16.Na5 Bd4 17.Nxb7 (17.Rxe8 Qxe8 18.Nxb7 cxb2!) Qf6 18.Rf1 cxb2 19.Bxb2 Bxb2 20.Bd5 Bxa1 21.Qxa1 and now, according to Adla, 21...Re5 is equal. With the White pawn on d3, however, there are differences. Most importantly, after 13.Re1 Re8 14.Be3, Black would be worse after 14...Nxe3 15.fxe3 Bg5, because of 16.e4. Thus Black should follow 14.Be3 with 14...Qd6, as in the game, when 15.Qf3 Rad8 16.Nd2 c5 is fine for Black.


13.d4

13.Re1 would transpose into II above after 13...Bf6 14.Be3 Re8, etc.


13...Bf6 14.Re1 Rfe8 (Diagram)

Black has a nice position, with adequate compensation for the sacrificed pawn, and even a slight edge. Canney sums up Black's prospects thus: "Normally,

Black relies on the K-side attack in the Marshall. Here, though, Black relies more on his lead in development and claim to the e-file. He still has chances on the K-side

based on the Bb7 and possible ...Nf4, but he also has central and Q-side play thanks to his quick mobilization and Bf6, including both ...c5 and minority attacks with ...b4."

The uninitiated might wonder why Canney offers an exchange of Rooks here, when down a pawn? If White exchanges, his edge in development increases further, and the first rank becomes critically weak. For the same reason, White declines the exchange, and hence we are now a tempo up on Servat-Adla.

15.Be3

Now if 15.Nd2 Nf4 16.Nf3, Black would wish his Queen were on d7, as then he'd have the crusher 16...Nxcg2! With the Queen on d6, however, Black should play 16...Bxf3 17.gxf3 Bg5, with active play against the weak K-side.

15...Re7

Even better is 15...Nxe3 16.fxe3 (16.Rxe3 Rxe3 17.fxe3 Bg5 with threats of ...R e8, ...Qd5, and ...Qh6) 16...Bg5, as in the notes to Servat-Adla, when the weak e-pawn is very hard to defend, for example 17.Qd3 (17.Rf1 Bxe3+ 18.Kh1 Bd5; 17.Kf2 Qxh2 18.Rh1 Bh4+) 17...Be4! (otherwise White plans a quick e4) 18.Qe2 Qh6 19.Na3 Bg6, etc., and White is tied up in knots.

16.Nd2 Rae8 17.Bxd5

This gives up White's best piece, the Lopez Bishop, but gets rid of an excellent Knight. Other lines, however, show difficulties for White, e.g. 17.Nf3 Nf4 18.a4 (18.Bxf4 Rxe1+ 19.Nxe1 Qxf4 with a slight edge for Black; also 18.Qd2 Bxf3 19.Bxf4 Rxe1+ etc.) 18...b4 with good play. If White doesn't eliminate this Knight, the pressure on g2 might be hard to take later.

17...Bxd5

If 17...Qxd5 White could force a draw with 18.Qf3 Qxf3 19.Nxf3 Bxf3 20.gxf3 Bg5 21.Kf1 Bxe3 22.fxe3 Rxe3 23.Rxe3 Rxe3 24.Kf2 etc., and it's unclear if Black has more earlier in this ending.

18.b3 (Diagram)

Allows Black an excellent shot, but White is worse either way. An alternative is 18.Qg4 (18.Nf1 Qc6 19.Qg4 Re4 with a huge attack) Bc6 (preventing 19.a4 and making room for the Queen) 19.Nf1 Qd5 20.f3 h5 21.Qg3 h4 22.Qg4 b4, when the weakness of the d4-pawn and the pin on the e-file really hurt White.


18...Bb7?!

Only good for equality. Black can't play 18...Qc6 because of 19.c4! Bxg2 20.d5! when White wins a piece, but the dynamic 18...c5! is much better:

I. 19.Qg4 cxd4 20.cxd4 h5 (Canney) 21.Qg3 Qb6 followed by ...Bxd4.

II. 19.Nf3 Bxf3 20.Qxf3 (20.gxf3 Bg5 etc.) 20...cxd4 21.cxd4 Qxd4 (also 21.Rad1 b4! has the same theme) 22.Rad1 Qc3 (22...Qh4 23.Rd3 seems to hold) and White is falling apart, e.g. 23.Rc1 Qa5 24.Re2 Bd4 25.Rce1 Bxe3 26.Rxe3 Qxe1+!!, or 23. Qg4 (to react to ...Bg5 with f4) 23...Re4 24. Qd7 Bg5. Finally, White can go for the ending with a Queen vs. two Rooks with 22. Red1 Qxa1 23.Rxa1 Bxa1 24.g3, with some drawing chances, but in my view Black should eventually win due to his superb coordination after 24...Bf6.

III. 19.dxc5 (19.Nf1 Qc6 20.Qg4 Re4; 20.f3 Bg5) Qc6 20.Qg4 Bxc3 21.Rac1 b4. Canney gives Black only a slight edge, but I disagree; given the upcoming rook-lift ...Re6-g6, as well as the thematic stroke ...h5 I think White's in trouble, e.g. 22.Re2 h5 23.Qg3 h4 24.Qh3 Re6 25.Rd1 Rg6 26.f4 Qb5. 22. h4 h5 23.Qg3 Re6 24.Qh3 Rg6 25.g3 does stop the immediate threats, and may be best, but Black has many ideas left, like ...f5, and ...Be5 with sacs on g3. Note too that in these lines if the f-pawn ever moves



there are threats of ...Rxe3!, so perhaps 21.Rad1 is better. However, after 21...Re6 22.Qh3 Rg6 23.f3 f5 24.f4 Bd4 25.Nf1 Bxc5, White is again collapsing.
 19.Qg4 Qc6 20.Rec1!

This excellent move breaks the pin on the e-file, which has been plaguing White, and turns the game around.

20...h5 21.Qf3 Qxf3 22.Nxf3 h4 23.h3 a5?

The moment is at hand. Canney writes: "Black no longer has an edge and yet continues to play as if he has the initiative. This move leaves me with a weakened Q-side and White gets a passed a-pawn. Yet playing objectively is one of the hardest things in chess, and when one has lost the initiative, it is difficult to believe it's gone. Here, Black should realize that his two Bishops and activity give him adequate chances to draw versus White's extra Pawn."

All well and good - but how does Black do this? The first thing he should realize is that the Bishop pair, while powerful in this position, should not be held against reason. A good idea is 23...Rd8, when if 24.a4, Black could give up the pair with 24...Bxf3 25.gxf3 b4! 25.cxb4 Bxd4 27.Bxd4 Rxd4 28.Rc4 Rd3 29.Rxh4 Rxb3, when the double-rook ending, though complex, should be drawn for Black. Another line is 24.Kf1 Be4 25.Ke2 Kf8, biding time; it is difficult to see how White can make progress.

24.a4 b4 25.cxb4 axb4 26.Rc5 Rxe3?!

In the same vein, Canney believes that this sacrifice, while ultimately not sound, allows for a more interesting game than slow defense, for example 26...Ba6 27.Rc6 Be2 28.a5 Ra8 29.a6 followed by Nf3-e1-c2xb4.
 27.fxe3 Rxe3 28.Ne5? (Diagram)



Superficially, White's pawns look weak, e.g. 28.Rxc7 Bxf3 29.gxf3 Bxd4 30.Rac1 Rxb3+ 32.Kg2 Ra3 with at least a draw for Black, or 28.Kf2 Rxb3 followed by ...Bxf3. However, since the pawn on c7 is already a goner, the test is 28.Rd1!, as Canney points out. Then after 28...Bxf3 29.gxf3, Black has to choose which Pawn to take. If 29...Rxb3 30.Rxc7 Ra3 31.Rb7 Rxa4 32.d5! he's losing, but he still has chance to hope after 29...Rxf3 30.Rxc7 Rg3+ 31.Kh2 Rxb3 32.Rb7 (Note 32.d5? Be5+, but important is 32.a5 Ra3 33.Rb7 b3 when Black is a tempo up on the losing line above plus has an extra Pawn on the Kingside. The win is tough here, e.g. 34.d5 Be5+ 35.Kg2 Ra2+ 36.Kf1 b2 etc.) 32...Bg5 33.d5 Bf4+ 34.Kg2 Rg3+ 35.Kf2 Bd6 36.a5 Rxh3 37.a6 Rh2+ 38.Kf1 Ra2, based on the strength of his K-side pawns. Now the weakness of g2 allows Black to draw with best play.
 28...Re2 29.Rxc7 Bxg2 30.a5 Bg5! 31.Rc8+?

This seems to combat ...Be3+, but ends up losing a piece. White's only move is 31.Nc4, when Black forces a draw with 31...Bxh3 32.a6 Rg2+ 33.Kh1 Bf4 34.a7 Rh2+ 35.Kg1 Rg2+. The key is that after the forced exchanges, the Ng5 will be trapped due to the tremendous power of Black's light-squared Bishop.
 31...Kh7 32.Rh8+

The proper move was still 32.Nc4.

32...Kxh8 33.Nxf7+ Kg8 34.Nxg5 Bd5!

Domination. The poor knight has nowhere to go.


35.Kf1 Rg2 36.a6

If 36.Ne6 Rh2! threatens ...Rh1+ and wins the Knight anyway. The game is history, as Black can get back in time:

36...Rxg5 37.a7 Rf5+ 38.Ke2 Rf8 39.Ke3 Ba8 40.Rc1 Kh7 41.Rc7 Bd5 42.Rc4 Ba8 43.Rc7 Kg6 44.Kd3 Rf7 0-1.
