Annual Membership Meeting - September 5, 1993

Approximately 48 CSCA members attended the annual membership meeting held during the 1993 Colorado Open at the Ramada Inn. President Buck Buchanan presided.

The President read the minutes of the previous annual meeting. Keith Oxman reported a treasury of \$3168.29, compared to \$224.20 last year.

Buck reported on the summer's activities, which he thought went very well, including Territory days and the People's fair, both of which made a small profit for CSCA. A new Informant editor is needed.

Buck described this summer's USCF Delegate's Meeting, held in Philadelphia this year. A new rule passed saying that USCF tournament players cannot refuse to be paired with a computer. Buck does not feel that this is likely in Colorado. An experimental clock has been proposed and the time limit for Quick Chess has been raised to G-29, with no need to keep score. One-member, one-vote was defeated again.

Buck also reported that CSCA expects a SASP refund from USCF of 529.20 this year (more than last year because of increased membership from Colorado (504 regular, 63 youth members). On being asked, Buck mentioned that for the first time, some of his expenses were reimbursed for this year's trip (\$400).

Debbie Johnson reported on this year's Colorado Tour. We took in about the same amount of money as last year and the prizes were the same (see elsewhere in this Informant).

There was a comment about having more variety in tournaments (different splits). It was pointed out that there has been more variety than previously. On being asked about the number of four-round tournaments, several people explained the drawbacks of other arrangements.

Tony Wilson reported that there were 253 fully paid members as of September 1 (compared with 272 last year and 289 the year before that).

Todd Bardwick reported on his new monthly chess column in the Rocky Mountain News. Members are asked to write to RAN expressing their interest - that will help keep the column in.

Eric Perlman reported on Scholastic Chess. Participation was down a bit, especially at the high school level, but the program did not lose money. The January *Post-Mortem* column in the January issue will be Eric's last. We need someone to continue the column.

Lou Polcari raised the question of some general dissatisfaction over the way tournaments are run. Two specifics were mentioned: short draws and not posting prize lists at tournaments. It was pointed out that USCF has a procedure for the former and that there is no requirement for the latter, unless the prize fund is changed from that advertized. No action was taken.

The meeting concluded with the election of officers (see the inside of the front cover). In addition, Buck will continue as USCF Delegate, and Garth Courtois, Vance Aandahl, and Mike Presutti were elected voting members to USCF.

A Trip to the World Under 16 Championship

This year, the World Under-16 Championship was held concurrently with the Under-10, 12, 14, and 18 Championships in Bratislava, Slovakia, from July 17th through the 29th. Competition was also divided into Boys' and Girls' Sections.

I was invited to represent the United States in the Under-16 Championship by virtue of my February '93 rating. I was very lucky to be invited since my February rating had dipped 16 points. Interestingly enough, my closest competitors' ratings dropped even more.

The tournament was very strong. It contained three IMs and many FMs. About a third of the participants had FIDE ratings. In fact, I probably underestimated the strength of the players before the tournament began. I felt that I would have good chances to fight for the top spots.

The beginning of the tournament was terrible. I lost my first two games. In the first one, both my opponent and I were in time trouble. Neither of us kept track of the number of moves made. As we nervously blitzed past the time control, I missed a mate in one on move 42. Such a terrible start can knock anyone out! In the next game, the story repeated itself. In a playable position, I blundered and lost.

The third game (Maros-Mulyar) appears below. In a dramatic fight, I was able to outplay my opponent. After two disappointing losses, a win did wonders to my self confidence. After winning two more games in a row, I pulled back to +1. The fifth round game (Nataf-Mulyar) is a very interesting example of an endgame combination (60...Nd6.)

After three draws, I won another game (Doroshenko-Mulyar.) Even though the Moldovan made several mistakes, the game was still an instructive one. Now, I was at +2, and poised to at least take a spot in the top 10. However, a disappointing finish (.5 out of 2) left me with 6 points out of 11. I was tied for 24-36 place out of 75 participants.

The result could have been better, but I still enjoyed the trip and the tournament, as I played a number of good games. I hope that this experience can help me improve in the future.




1.e4 e6 2.d4 d5 3.Nc3 Nf6 4.Bg5 This older move has gone out of favor in the last decade. The preferred choice is 4.e5, which should give White his usual opening advantage. 4...Bb4 The MacCutcheon is an interesting way of meeting 4.Bg5. It leads to sharp, original positions that require independent thinking. However, also good is the simple 4...Be7, which should give Black equality. 5.e5 h6 6.Bd2 Bxc3 7.bxc3 Ne4 8.Qg4 Kf8!? Lately, this move has become the main line. The largely discredited line with 8...g6 has been out of favor for as long as anyone can remember. 9.Nf3?! This move is GM Anand's idea. He played it against Ivanchuk in their match.

Even though Anand managed to win the game, Ivanchuk stood better out of the opening. Better is the older move, 9.h4. 9...c5 10.Bd3 Nxd2 11.Kxd2 Qa5?! This over-the-board novelty is objectively weaker than the setup Ivanchuk chose, ...Nc6 and ...Qe7. 12.Rhb1 Nd7?! 13.Qf4? Now, Black is at least equal. This move does threaten Bg6, however, Black's calm reply simply develops the h8 rook. 13...Ke7 14.Rb5?! After this pseudo-active move, Black should be slightly better. 14...Qc7 15.Rab1 b6 Threatening ...Ba6 with the exchange of Black's weakest piece for White's strongest. 16.R5b2 Bb7? Too passive, but even this should not throw away the advantage. The troubles with White's position are the horribly placed rooks and the lack of a concrete plan. [16...a5! idea of Ba6 with an advantage.] 17.Ke1 c4! An excellent move that took me about 20 minutes. Now, Black will close up the queenside and make the two white rooks unemployed. Then, Black will relocate his king to the queenside and try to break the center with f6. 18.Be2?! [18.Bf1 with the plan, g3 and Bh3.] 18...Raf8! 19.Kf1 Kd8 20.Qe3 Kc8 21.h4 White stops ...g5, but not ...f6. 21...Re8 22.Nh2 Better is Nd2. White tries to reinforce his center with f4. 22...f6 23.f4 g5 24.g3 fxe5 25.fxe5 Ref8+?? Much better is 25...gh 26.gh Nf6! with an initiative. Now White is better, as Black's minor pieces will never come into play. 26.Ke1 gxh4 27.gxh4 Only here did I realize that ...Nf6 was not possible. However, now White is better. All he has to do is exchange his rooks. 27...Rhg8 28.Kd2 Rg2 To save time, Black makes an active move. Better is 28...Qd8. 29.Nf3 Qd8 30.Rf1 Now, White only has one more move to make before Black is in deep trouble. 30...h5 31.Rbb1 Now, Black is losing. However, the mutual time trouble gives him some hope. 31...Rg3 32.Rg1 Rh3 Trying to complicate things a little bit. 33.Rh1 Rxh1 34.Rxh1 Qe7 When you're losing, the best policy is to make as many threats as possible, even if those threats are not dangerous. Here Black "threatens" Qa3. 35.Rg1 Bc6 Activating the bishop, which is headed for a4. 36.Qh6 Dubious, as it allows Black to get some real counterplay. Better is the simple 36.Ng5. Now, there was a glimmer of hope-I might be able to confuse my

opponent before the time control. 36...Qf7 37.Rg7 Qf5 Black's position has improved dramatically. All of his pieces are in play. Even the knight is useful, as it protects the king. 38.Re7 Ba4 First real threat. 39.Ne1 Qe4 * 40.Qxh5? Surprisingly, this not only loses the advantage, but manages to give it to black. However, the mistake is easy to explain. On move 40, it is hard not to grab a pawn while defending against a threat, here ...Rf2. [40.Rxd7! Rf2 41.Qe3 Qxe3+ 42.Kxe3 Rxe2+ 43.Kxe2 Kxd7 44.Ke3» Here, White has significant winning chances.] 40...Qf4+ 41.Kd1 Qe3 Now, Black has the advantage, while White's minor pieces look like invalids. Black's strong pawn on c4 is especially dangerous. 42.Re8+ Probably best. The Post-Mortem

The Blockade: Weak Pawns and Active Pieces

The battle between active pieces and weak pawns is always an interesting one. During the 1950s and 1960s, a popular line of the Queen's Gambit Accepted was 1.d4 d5 2.c4 dc4 3.Nf3 Nf6 4.e3 Bg4 5.Bc4 e6 6.Qb3!? Bf3 7.gf3. White players reckoned that the central pawn mass, combined with two active Bishops, the extra b-pawn, and the g-file, would be adequate compensation for the weak pawns. However, nowadays we know that after 7...Nbd7 8.Qb7 c5! Black gets enough activity and central counterplay to balance White's extra pawn. Quinteros-Miles, Amsterdam 1977, for example, continued 9.dc5 Bc5 10.f4 Rb8 11.Qg2 Bb4+ 12.Ke2 O-O 13.b3 Nb6 14.Bd3 Nbd5 with an unclear game.

In doubled pawn formations, the square in *front* of the pawn duo becomes critical. The player with the doubled pawns would like to push the forward pawn, eliminating his weakness and opening a file, very often exposing an opponent's piece(s) in the process. Thus, in the Saemisch Variation of the Nimzo-Indian, the c5-square is very important; similarly, in this game, the f5-square achieves paramount importance as a blockade square. Here, Karnisky opts for doubled f-pawns, trying to attack Black's King. What follows is an interesting battle between Black's struggle to win some of these weak pawns and White's piece activity.

I regret to announce that after the January 1994 issue, I will no longer write this column. I am a graduate student, scheduled to graduate this May, and after January will need to devote as much time as possible to writing my dissertation. Once I get my Ph.D., I have no idea where I might end up; most likely my post-doctoral work will take me to another state. If I find a position in Colorado, I would happily return to this slot; however, this is unlikely. I have enjoyed writing this column immensely, and would like it to continue. Masters or Experts who might be interested in writing it, either temporarily or permanently, are urged to talk to either me or Buck Buchanan, our perennial editor. (*Perennial for three more issues, folks! - RB*)

As is my usual practice, I asked both players to comment on the game. Mark Scheidies and I discussed the game, and his comments are included. Robert Karnisky declined to make comments on the game itself, but during the Colorado Open he asked me to relate the following. First of all, he does not believe that this game represents his best play; to him, its main feature was a botched opening. Also, he resents the fact that so many of his games appear in each Colorado Chess Informant. Many players' games don't even appear in the Informant, and he believes that it is unfair that so many of his games appear. Finally, about half of his games which appear in the Informant are losses, while his real percentage is more like 75%, so that he believes that what is selected for the Informant is not representative of his play and also just gives his opponents ammunition against him. He would like to see fewer of his games in the Informant, and more games from other players whose games are not currently given instead.

I believe there is much more in this game than a botched opening, as I have indicated, but the reader is left to make his or her own judgments. I will not comment on the rest of Karnisky's statement; I have nothing to do with the selection of games for the Informant with the exception of those used for this column. I have merely related his message as a service to the readers. (*Editor's note: In selecting games no attempt is made to balance a player's successful and unsuccessful games. It is often the case that a strong player's failures are more interesting games than his triumphs. Each game is selected on its own merits. It takes a good game to beat a good player. - RB*)

Boulder Summer Open 1993

NIMZO-LARSEN ATTACK

1. Nf3 d5 2. c4 c6

Mark has never been one to give up a central strong-point. Alternatives include 2...dc4, 2...d4, and 2...e6. I will give an example of each. Readers should see Schiller's and Osnos's books on the Reti for more information.

I. 2...dc4 3.Na3 c5 4.Nc4 Nc6 5.b3 f6 6.Bb2 e5 7.g3 Nge7 8.Bg2 Nd5 9.O-O Be7 10.Nh4 O-O 11.Qb1 (idea: 12.Be4) Rf7 12.Nf5 Be6 13.f4 with a double-edged game, Botvinnik-Fine, Nottingham 1936.

II. 2...d4 3.b4! (White uses the extra tempo to go into a Benko reversed without a pawn sacrifice). 3...g6 4.g3 Bg7 5.d3 Nf6 6.Bg2 (reached via a different move order in Reti-Rubenstein, Carlsbad 1923, which we now follow) 6...O-O 7.Nbd2 c5 8.Nb3! cb4 9.Bb2 Nc6 10.Nbd4 Nd4 11.Bd4 b6 12.a3 Bb7 13.Bb2 ba3 14.Ra3 Qc7 15.Qa1! with a large edge for White.

III. 2...e6 3.g3 (The main line for the Reti; however, knowing Karnisky's liking for the Nimzo-Larsen, we might instead have seen 3.b3 and then e3 from him) 3...Nf6 4.Bg2 Be7 5.O-O O-O 6.b3. Black now has the choice between either 6...b6, treating the game like a Queen's Indian, or 6...c5, noting possible transpositions into the Tarrasch QGD. Complex positions arise, e.g. 6...c5 7.Bb2 Nc6 8.e3 b6 9.Qe2 Bb7 10.Rd1 Qc7 11.Nc3 Rad8 12.cd5 ed5, Anikayev-Lputian, Frunze 1979.

3. e3

Immediately electing to go into the Nimzo-Larsen, instead of putting off the transposition (as he could have done with 3.b3). The Reti, of course, usually continues with a K-side fianchetto.

3...Nf6 4. b3 Bg4

The pin is an appropriate reaction, for in the Larsen-Nimzovich White seeks to control e5. By pinning the Nf3 Black makes this task more difficult.

5. Bb2 Nbd7 6. d4

Attacking e5 and also avoiding transpositional possibilities. Alternatively, 6.Be2 e6 7.O-O Bd6 8.d3 (8.cd5 ed5 9.Nd4 Be2 10.Qe2 O-O 11.f4 Rc8 12.Nc3 a6 = Petrosian-Mecking, Las Palmas 1975; also possible is 8.d4 which will be covered by transposition in the note to White's 7th) 8...O-O 9.Nbd2 Qe7 10.Nd4 Be2 11.Qe2 Andersson-Hort, Goteborg 1971, given by Kasparov in BCO I as +=/=, but frankly I don't see more than = here for White.

6...e6 7. a3

I'm not sure this move is necessary; however, it is a logical step in controlling e5, as it prevents a check on b4 with subsequent pins on the diagonal leading to the King (which would prevent a Knight recapturing on f3). Note that via 7.Be2 White would transpose into Stein-Vaganian, USSR Championships 1971, after 7...Bd6 8.O-O O-O 9.h3 Bh5 10.Nbd2 Qe7 with about = according to BCO I.


7...Bd6 8. Bd3

Very ambitious. The alternative 8.Be2 gives positions similar to Stein-Vaganian (previous note), but the utility of 7.a3 is not certain there, for example 8...O-O 9.O-O a5 10.Nbd2 (or 10.h3 Bh5 11.Nbd2 Re8 possibly intending ...e5) 10...Re8 11.Qc2 (breaking the pin) Qc7, when the battle will revolve around ...e5 and the possible ensuing weakness on d5.

8...O-O 9. h3

Continuing in an ambitious manner. 9.O-O leads to equality.

9...Bf3 10. gf3?! (Diagram)



White deliberately mangles his pawn structure in search of an attack. The decision is double-edged, but not without possible benefits for White (Note that the alternative 10.Qf3 leads to equality in my opinion, though Karnisky prefers White). I have not been able to find any games with this continuation specifically, but a game with similar themes illustrating the dangers for Black was Portisch-Korchnoi, Bad Kissingen 1983: 1.d4 Nf6 2.c4 e6 3.Nf3 b6 4.a3 Ba6 5.Qc2 Bb7 6.Nc3 c5 7.e3 Be7 8.Bd3 cd4 9.ed4 Qc8 10.O-O Bf3! 11.gf3 Nc6 12.Be3 O-O 13.Kh1 g6 14.Rg1 Nh5 15.f4 f5 16.Be2 Nf6 17.d5 (According to Konikowski 17.Bf3 is also very strong) 17...Na5 18.b3 ed5 (or 18...b5 19.de6 Qc6+ 20.Rg2 bc4 21.b4 Nb3 22.Rd1 de6 23.Nb5! Qb5 23.Bc4! White is better - Korchnoi) 19...cd5 Kf7 (19...Kh8 20.Bd4) 20.Rgc1 Nb7 21.Bf3 Nd6 22.Qe2 Qd8 23.Bd4! despite his weak pawns White has clearly the better game. 10...c5

The appropriate reaction. This move accentuates White's weaknesses.

11. Nd2 cd4 12. Bd4 Be5

An interesting alternative would be 12...e5!? 13.Bb2 Nc5 14.Bc2; however, after 14...a5 15.b4 ab4 16.ab4 Ra1 17.Qa1 Ncd7 18.c5 the game is very unclear, the advance looks tempting, but the question is whether it really gives White anything. Another possibility, pointed out by Mark and M Chess, is 12...Ne5; however, after 13.Be2 this doesn't seem to do very much. 13. f4


Willingly creating a larger weakness by isolating the doubled f-pawns. However, White really has little choice here. If 13.Be5 Ne5 14.Be2 d4! the center opens up and Black's pieces flood in.

13...Bd4 14. ed4 dc4 15. Nc4

Controlling the e5-square. If White captures with the pawn, he has problems after 15.bc4 Nb6 16.Rg1 Qd4! and the d-file pieces are loose.

15...Nb6 16. Rg1 g6 17. Be2

Now that the threats along the d3-h7 diagonal are reduced, the Bishop must retreat. 17...Nc4 18. bc4 Qd6 19. Qd2 Rfd8



Zarkov seems to prefer to put the other rook on d8. Each choice has its ups and downs: 19...Rfd8 does leave f7 unprotected; however, it leaves open options like ...Rac8 and also a quick advance of the a-pawn after ...Qxa3. On balance, I think I prefer Mark's choice, though after 19...Rad8 20.Rb1 Qa3 21.Rg3 (note 21.Rb7 Ne4!) 21...Qe7 Black is also doing very well. 20. Rd1 (Diagram)

One of the two pawns has to go. Will White get compensation enough? Probably not, though his play will be dangerous. Black will have to watch his dark squares and the g file

for a long time to come. Here, 20.Rb1 might be a slight improvement, as after 20...Rab8 (20...b6 would force lines like those in the game) the a-pawn could not advance as it does so effectively in some of the notes to come.

20...Qa3 21. Rg3 Qe7 22. Rb3

Two other attacking moves come to mind:

I. 22.Re3 (attempting to force f5) 22...Qc7 23.Re5 a5! (the rook turns out to be well placed, and the a-pawn will wreak havoc) 24.Rb5 a4 25.Qa2 (25.Qb2 a3! 26.Qa2 -- 26.Rb7 ab2! 27.Rc7 Ra1 and wins -- 26...Ra5 forcing the trade of Rooks wins easily for Black.) 25...a3 winning.

II. 22.Qe3 (same idea, but more dangerous. Now the Queen can go to e5 on demand and d5 also can be a threat) 22...a5 and now: A. 23.f5!? White goes directly for the throat, but it's too early: 23...Qb4+ 24.Kf1 e5 25.Qe5 Ne4! and the threats of Nc3 and Nd2+ cannot be met. B. 23.h4! The threat of h5 is dangerous. The path divides: 1. 23...Qb4+? Now this is not as good... 24.Kf1 a4 25.h5 a3 26.Qe5! Qe7 (26...a2 leads to Black's defeat in spectacular fashion: 27.Qf6 a1Q 28.hg6 hg6 29.Rh3! and mate cannot be avoided. In this line 28...fg6 allows survival, but White's position after 29.Qe6+ Kf8 30.Qf6+ Ke8 31.Re3+ is quite good even though he will be down the exchange for a pawn) 27.hg6 hg6 28.f5! White's attack is dangerous, but Black can hold without too much difficulty after 28...a2. 2. 23...Rd7! The Queen must be protected! The a-pawn is quite dangerous by itself. 24.h5 a4 25.hg6 hg6 26.c5 (to limit the Q's activity and ability to protect the a-pawn) 26...a3 (If 26...Nd5 27.Qe5) 27.Rh3 a2 and Black wins.

It therefore appears that Karnisky's choice, which threatens the b7-pawn, is probably best.

22...b6

Better may be 22...a5; the critical line then looks to be 23.Bf3 Rd7 24.Rdb1 Ra7 25.Qb2 Qd6! when the b-pawn will be sacrificed to snag the d and f pawns. However, there should be nothing wrong with Mark's choice as long as he does not play the blunder on move 23.

23. Qe3 Ne8?

Poor. Why allow the undoubling of the f-pawns and the following tactical threats? The Queen had to be protected; 23...Rd7! was the move. Now White has real chances.

24. f5 Ng7

Making the best of a bad bargain. If 24...gf5 25.Qg3+ Kh8 26.d5! threatening 27.Qe5+ is extremely dangerous for Black.

25. fe6 Qe6

Black might have kept the Queens on with 25...fe6; after 26.Qe5 Nf5 27.Bg4 Ng7 he should be able to wriggle out without too much difficulty. In the endgame Black still has problems despite the extra pawn.

26. Bf3

If White exchanges immediately, he is lost: 26.Qe6 Ne6 27.Bf3 (27.d5 Nc5) Rac8 28.Bd5 Nf4 winning at least another pawn or two.

26...Rac8 27. Bd5 Qf6

Similarly, Black does not exchange because fxe3 would strengthen the White center.

28. Qf3

It's slightly surprising that Karnisky is also willing to exchange Queens here, given that he is a pawn down. However, the Queen had to vacate the e-file, and even then, threats like ...Nf5 and ...Re8+ are highly bothersome.

28...Qf3

The alternative 27...Re8+ 28.Kf1 Nf5, turning down the exchange of Queens but lowering the pressure on f7, might be better.


29. Rf3 Rc7 30. Kd2!?

If White tries to prevent ...b5 his center falls apart: 30.Rb1 Nf5 31.Rd3 Ne7! etc. He probably is also losing after 30 Kd2, but Scheidies' technique does not prove equal to the task.

30...b5 31. Rb1 bc4 32. Kc3!


A little bit of tactics. Black can take the Bishop, but after 32...Rd5 33.Rb8+ Ne8 34.Re8+ Kg7 35.Rfe3 and 36.Ra8 the ending may be harder to win than in the text.

32...Nf5 33. Rb5 (Diagram) Kf8?



In slight time trouble, Black misses the win. Black could have forced White to his needs by playing the simple 33...Rcd7! The Bishop is attacked again. If 34.Bc4 Nd4 wins the house for Black, and if 34.Bc6 Rd4 White also is running out of options and is three pawns down with no compensation. Finally the exchange sacrifice is also inadequate, though 34.Rf5 gf5 35.Kc4 Kg7 does offer slight drawing hopes because of Black's bad pawn structure.

34. Rf4 Nd6 35. Rc5



Suddenly the d-pawn becomes dangerous. Both players are in time trouble, and Black must now play exactly to keep his winning chances alive.

35...Rc5?!


Considerably better is the simple 35...Rdc8!

36. dc5 Nf5 37. Kc4 Ke7 38. Re4 Kf6 (Diagram) 39. Re2

During the postmortem, Todd Bardwick proposed 39.c6!? which almost wins. The idea is to sac the exchange, but promote the c-pawn. The problem is that after 39...Nd6+ 40.Kc5 Ne4+ 41.Be4

Ke5! Black will use his King activity to save the day. This move was Michael Ginat's idea.: 42.f3 (On either 42Bc2 or 42.Bg2 Black simply plays 42...Rc8 and has at least a draw) 42...f5 43.Bc2 Kf4 43.c7 Rc8 45.Kc6 Kf3 46.Kd7 Rc7+ 47.Kc7 Kg3 and Black is probably winning, as the White King looks to be too far away to hold the three King-side Pawns. Instead, Karnisky opts for the draw:

39...Rd7 40.Ra2 Ke7 41.Re2+ DRAW.



CHESS AT LOWRY AFB FADES AWAY

In 1968 John A. Harris, the President of the Colorado State Chess Association, founded the Lowry Air Force Base Chess Championship by contacting Mr. Joseph F. Sparling who was directing very informal chess activity at the base in Denver. Together they set up a tournament which involved 16 players, the top two continuing on to the Air Training Command (ATC) Tournament. John has been the tournament director just about every year since then.

During the course of time some significant personalities have emerged from these tournaments. Lt. Gil Humphrey (1973 runner-up) was CSCA Secretary in 1976 and President in 1977-78 and was very active in promoting chess. Sgt. Don Sutherland, Lowry's winner in 1972-75, was individual US Armed Forces Champion in 1973 and also the Colorado State Champion in that year. Sgt. Sutherland, a chess master, went into the Air Force to learn photography.

Sgt. Richard A. Spitzer, Lowry's 1977 tournament winner, became the 1977 ATC Chess Champion with a score of 4.5-0.5. He was awarded a watch for his victory. Also by winning the ATC Championship Sgt. Spitzer qualified for the six-man Air Force team that won the Armed Forces Chess Championship. In a tie for second place in that 1977 ATC tournament was Lowry's other representative, S/Sgt. Steve Hendrickson. In achieving this result, Steve scored an upset win over Don Sutherland.

A1C Leroy Hill became Lowry's 1983 Base Champion with a score of 2.5-0.5 and AMN Brian Combs was runner-up with 2-1. Later at the 1983 ATC tournament which Lowry hosted, A1C Hill garnered first place with a 5-0 score. The combination of Hill and Combs representing Lowry as a team captured first place (8.5 points) over the Lackland AFB team of S/Sgt. Bobby Moore and A1C David Gomes (6.5).

During the period from 1985 until the phasing out on June 13, 1993, one outstanding player dominated Base chess activities. T/Sgt. Brian Lankey was Lowry's Chess Champion during the years 1985-87 and 1991-93. He was also the ATC Champion in 1990 (Lowry hosted the 1990 tournament.) and teamed up with A1C Timothy Williams to make Lowry the victor in the team tournament (8 points) over the Sheppard AFB team of T/Sgt. Joe Questionati and T/Sgt. Terry Cox with 7 points. In 1986 Lankey defeated Alex Fishbein in a last-round game to win the Colorado State Championship.

HOW TO BEAT AN EXPERT

Well, due to business opportunities in California, what was intended to be a series of articles turns out to be my swan song in Colorado chess. I had intended to showcase games by Experts (mostly my own) in which they lost (to anyone) or drew with lower rated players. My intention was to show both the strengths and weaknesses of Expert class players, with the hope that the lower rated reader could, after mastering these strengths and weaknesses, move up to Expert and even beyond. I hope you enjoy this article and maybe, if some other "Experts" take up the slack, the series might continue.


I intended to start this series with my first defeat in Colorado against a Master. Masters are usually better suited to showcase the weaknesses of Experts than other mere mortals.

Long's Peak Open, 11/9/91: Michael Mulyar (2215) - Mark Pifer (2028),

KING'S INDIAN DEFENSE

1.d4 Nf6 2.c4 g6 3.Nc3 Bg7 4.e4 d6 5.Be2 O-O 6.Nf3 e5 (Now here's the first place to get an edge on an Expert: have them play an opening for the first time without having studied it.

This was the case here. I had never been satisfied with my openings as Black against 1 d4. I believe most Experts have a few glitches in their opening armor, so don't be afraid of your knowledge; you might know more than they do. So, after listening to a friend of mine who advocates this system, I decided to try it - with catastrophic results.) **7.O-O Na6** (A move that Kasparov popularized (So I was told.), but that was all I knew at the time about it. If only Kasparov had finished the game for me!) **8.Be3 Ng4** (I still don't know if this is correct. So, boys and girls, another glaring weakness in many Experts: they don't always know what they're doing, no matter how cocky they appear on the other side of the board.) **9.Bg5 f6 10.Bh4 g5 11.Bg3 h5 12.h3 Nh6 13.Qd2 Qe8 14.Rab1 Qg6 15.b4 ed4** (This is not a good move. I think (Bear with me, it was a long time ago) I played it because the board was getting too complicated for me to calculate in this unknown position. As the game will show, this exchange only helped White.) **16.Nd4 h4 17.Bh2 g4 18.hg4 Ng4** (If you'll notice, the only thing my paranoia on move 15 accomplished was to expose *my* king to attack! Another weakness in some Experts: They don't always assess positions correctly. *Don't trust them!* Trust yourself. If you



lose, you'll have learned something. Had I left the center alone, d4 could not have been used so well by his pieces.) **19.Nd5** (Here he comes; a Master will not let this nuance slip. Notice how both his knights now occupy the center, and because of my exchange on d4, I can only kick one of them at a time and then only at the expense of my pawn's protection on d6.) **Kf7 * 20.Nf5! Nh2 21.Kh2 Bf5** (This bishop would have been wonderfully helpful in a correctly executed kingside attack. Now he's used to kill a knight (which should not have been allowed in) and weaken my light squares. Michael soon
