

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Buckspeak

This year's Colorado Open was a great tournament, with 126 players in the three sections. We drew many of Colorado's top masters, including IMs Michael Mulyar and Michael Valvo. For much of the tournament, it looked like the winner would be Philipp Ponomarev, as he drew Mulyar and beat McCarty and Valvo. But in the last round Brian Wall scored against him to tie for first place with Mulyar, who won the state champion title on tie-breaks. In the reserve section, J. C. MacNeil was alone in first place, leading the 70-player section with 5.5 points. Steve Towbin won the one-day Membership Meeting Open, outscoring several other high-rated players.

At the membership meeting, the usual suspects were re-elected as Board members. The only change was that Michael Munafo is now our Junior Representative, replacing Katie Roberts-Hoffman, who is now attending the University of Texas at Dallas. For those of you who are worried about this Board domination by the same old folks, fear not: I announced that this is the last year that I would run for President, and I believe a few other Board members are also planning to retire after one more season. So the times they will be a-changin'.

One most pleasant announcement made at the meeting was that the Collectors Edge Minerals, Inc. corporation, at the urging of a CSCA member who does business with them, has made us a contribution of \$1000!!! This money is designated to be used for next year's Tour fund. Partly because of this good fortune, I made the motion at the membership meeting that the Tour fee paid by tournaments should be reduced from \$1.50 per player to \$1.00. This motion passed with little debate. **Tournament directors take note: the Tour fee is now \$1 per player, not \$1.50.**

This summer marked the first time in many years that I chose not to attend the USCF Delegates meeting held in connection with the US Open. Our state was well represented, though, as Doris Thackrey and Joe Bihlmeyer attended. Doris gave a report at the membership meeting. (Joe has apparently left us for the wilds of Connecticut - a loss to Colorado chess.) The biggest news of the meeting was that the One Member One Vote issue finally passed, after many, many years of failures. As you may know, I have had mixed feelings about this over the years. Now that it is a done deal, it is very important that we make it work right. Beginning in 2003, all adult USCF members will have the opportunity to vote directly for members of the Executive Board. What we all need to do is to vote, and vote knowledgeably. Over the next year, I will be discussing this in more detail.

USCF had another tumultuous election this summer. (Somehow, this always seems to be the case.) Most of the candidates fell into two camps, one challenging the actions of Executive Director George DeFeis and the majority faction of the Ex-

ecutive Board, and the other supporting them. The hot issues included the increase in fees for advertising tournaments in Chess Life, the cutbacks in books and merchandise sold by USCF, a perceived threat to correspondence chess, and a possibly ill-advised expensive contract to the producers of USCF's internet site. There were also problems with the divisions on the existing Board and the heavy-handed way that some of these controversial decisions were made and announced. Anyway, the "reform" candidates won. The new USCF president is John McCrary of South Carolina. Others elected were Steve Shutt, Frank Camaratta, and Frank Brady. This group has been called the "Goichberg ticket," because chess promoter Bill Goichberg campaigned actively for them. I generally supported this group. I endorsed and voted for all except Camaratta; my fourth vote (and heavy endorsement) went to Bruce Draney of Nebraska. (In the beginning of the campaign I supported George John, but then changed my mind and went for Brady.)

It looks like a great upcoming season for Colorado chess. The Denver Chess Club, under the new leadership of Andy Rea, will be holding more tournaments. Most Colorado Springs weekend tournaments this year will be held in the Manitou Springs City Hall, a fine site that we are getting for a very good price. The Colorado Quick Chess Championship will be held there Nov. 17-18. And then there's that nice green Tour, starting out the season with 1000 big ones already in the bank! It's lookin' good, folks!

Colorado Membership Meeting Secretary's Report

This year's meeting convened at 3:50 pm and ended on time, much to the relief of all concerned. Before I go into the blow by blow of the meeting, it is very important to note that this will be the last year that Richard Buchanan will serve as President of the CSCA, the last year that Chris Hendrickson will serve as chairperson of the prison chess committee, and the last year Bruce Galler will carry on as the Scholastics Coordinator. It is very important (urgent even) that people give some serious thought to filling these mighty big shoes!!

The first order of business was Buck's report on the state of the USCF. The major points of this are covered in this issue's Buckspeak. Doris Thackrey, who attended the meetings and many of the workshops, was kind enough to fill us in on anything that Buck left out. Of the most interest or pertinence to us, she noted that TLA's charges would be coming back down, the 2001-02 budget was approved with a \$17,000 surplus, and the USCF will maintain a position of no drug testing and support full length time controls for high-level matches. Major changes in the ratings systems will now require approval by the delegates, while minor changes may still be approved by the Executive Board and

the Ratings committee. With the passing of One Member One Vote, the USCF will publish an election supplement prior to the elections.

With that, the CSCA Board also suggested providing support and information relating to the election to the Colorado chess community through the use of this magazine and the website.

Since Dean Brown was out of town, Buck presented his Treasurer's report. Our balance was \$4754.04, \$800 of which was committed to the Denker fund (money to send the Scholastic Champion to the Denker Tournament). The Tour fund was \$969, and the Prison Fund was \$100.

I reported on the Tour winners, which can be found on page 21. This year's Tour saw 328 players play a total of 2872 Tour games. Then we got the good news from David Helt that we once again have a Tour sponsor. Collector's Edge Minerals, Inc. has pledged \$1000 towards the Tour fund this year!! Thanks Dave and Collector's Edge! And the Denver Chess Club's rejuvenation has added at least one more tournament to the Tour mix this year.

General discussion interrupted the flow at this point with the question of the ratings of Thomas Stocks' tournaments. No one had a sure answer, but Buck and Paul Grimm have been working to see that the problem gets resolved. Then we got the good news that Brian Wall now has his own updated website to peruse. Todd Bardwick mentioned that he is working on compiling a comprehensive and interesting look at the history of Colorado chess.

Back to business, Buck moved to decrease Tour fees for organizers from \$1.50 per player to \$1.00 per player. This motion was seconded and approved without opposition.

Attention Organizers: Tour fees are now \$1 per player for each Tour Event.

Bruce Galler then gave his Scholastics report:

Chess for kids in Colorado is growing year over year. Each year we have more participation in our sponsored event, the Colorado State Chess Tournament. We are sending students to nationwide tournaments and they are performing well. There are more chess camps than ever before in Colorado. At the State chess tournament, we increased the involvement of parents and children by using technology to display the top four boards outside the playing room. We had some of Colorado's best chess minds comment on the games as they were being played.

Bruce then gave us a brief overview of the Scholastics calendar, which included Scholastic tournaments in Denver, Boulder, Louisville, Colorado Springs and Fort Collins. 244 kids participated in this year's State tournament. This year's Junior vs. Senior Closed saw the Junior team come out on top. Chess For Juniors is still going strong with bi-monthly chess camps. And Todd Bardwick's Rocky Mountain Chess Camp had the second largest attendance of any camp in the country!

Financially, the Scholastics account grew from \$1800 to \$3862.04 this year! A big part of this was the influx of contribu-

tions from Bruce's employers – \$500 from Lucent and \$1000 from Cisco! If anyone would like to personally contribute or has a company that would like to contribute, we are a 501-3C corporation, which means that the contribution is tax-deductible

Next up, Brad Lundstrom spoke to the Membership about a hugely successful effort he'd made in Greeley to build chess and benefit a good cause. Brad got together with his local United Way and his employer, and raised \$1000 his first year, \$2000 his second year, and \$4000 his 3rd year! The caveat was that Brad got major press, and the Greeley chess club grew from 15 to 62 players in the 3 years! Brad suggested that local clubs and organizers try to put together similar, and offered to help. Later in a Board meeting we talked about this further, and hopefully we will see some similar events in Denver and the Springs soon.

Another idea tossed to the Board was to offer incentive coupons to Scholastic players good towards entry fee discounts to adult tournaments. It was generally agreed that this would be a good idea, and the only questions would be the format and implementation. After this a straw poll was taken on the question of including Brian Walker Sr.'s Friday-Saturday tournaments in the Colorado Tour. This would require a vote of the membership, as it would require a change to the Tour rules, and after a brief discussion, the straw poll did not warrant a motion, and the issue was dropped for another year.

Next up, we had our second to last ever prison chess report from Chris Hendrickson, reprinted here:

Naturally, 99% of my wild schemes fail, and '01 was no exception. But I do persist. One of my insidious plans is compiling a list of those who would be willing to play postal chess with shut-ins. While none of you has ever been confined to a maximum security facility, if you had, you would know the incredible value of postal chess. So if you could help, please contact me. You can use a PO Box, but then I have to have your street address to give to the administrators. The Prison Chess Committee would like to thank that bold individual, Mr. D. C. Cocela for being the first to sign up for this heroic adventure. Seriously, the names on the list will be given to the corrections officers who coordinate the minimum security Federal Prison Camp's Chess League, not Ted Kaczynski, the Unabomber.

Some of my plans were dashed when George W. snagged John Suthers, Colorado Director of Corrections, and tagged him to be the new State Attorney General. Now I'll have to deal with all new administrators in Colorado Springs. High turnover does plague the industry.

The Committee would like to thank Life Master Brian Wall who has agreed to come to the Federal Correctional Facility in Englewood for the gala Correctional Recreation Day. The Committee would also like to thank Corrections Officer James Meeks of FCI who invited us. Life Master Wall has also generously agreed to be on my postal chess list, provided he doesn't get any moves from Ted Kaczynski, the Unabomber.

The final order of business was the election of officers. The outgoing Board had already elected Bruce Galler as a returning member-at-large, and Richard Buchanan, David Helt, Dean Brown, Michael Fuchs, and Andy Rea all retained their positions unopposed. That left replacing the departed Katie Roberts-Hoffman. Michael Munafo beat out Nathan Kidd 21 to 11 to take the seat.

Some thoughts on the Be3 system against the Pirc/Modern defense, by Bela Geczy

The system 1.e4 d6 2.d4 Nf6 3.Nc3 g6 4.Be3 or 1.e4 g6 2.d4 Bg7 3.Nc3 d6 4.Be3 is one of the most aggressive ways to meet the Pirc or Modern defense. The idea is to launch a massive kingside assault on Black's king with the straightforward plan of Qd2, f3, Bh6, OOO, g4, h4, etc. Easy to play and devastating to the unwary. One Black response to this is to delay playing either Nf6 (Modern) or Bg7 (Pirc). In the Modern, this will make it harder for White to get in Bh6 (White wants to exchange these bishops so that the Black kingside will be weakened). Also, the tempo saved by delaying Nf6, allows Black to start a counter-offensive on the queenside. Nothing comes for free however. Black's king may get stuck in the center which can prove to be embarrassing. In this case, White will look to play e5 in order to open central lines. I like to play the White side, though I don't get many chances. (Example: B. Geczy – D. Landers, CCI April 1999 page 12). In this recent game, I take the Black side and live to talk about it.




What's this? No Bg7? Actually, it's a move order trick designed to meet 4...d5 reaching a Gurgendidze system and saving one tempo for Black(!) even

though Black's d pawn has moved twice. A "normal" Gurgendidze goes 1.e4 g6 2.d4 Bg7 3.Nc3 c6 4.f4 d5 5.e5 h5 6.Nf3 Bg4 7.Be2 Nh6 8.Be3 e6 etc. There, Black usually plays Bf8 to Bg7 to Bf8 then out somewhere on the queenside. Three bishop moves and one for the d pawn. With my move order, the Bishop makes only one queenside move and the d pawn takes two moves, therefore saving one tempo overall. 4.Be3 Rats! 4...Nd7 5.Qd2 b5 6.O-O-O




This is a bit early for my tastes (even though it is sometimes played by strong players). Since Black has not deployed any kingside pieces yet, and his queenside intentions are already clear, why announce the White king position so early? It's like waving a red flag at a bull! How about 6.f4 (idea 7.e5!), 6.f3, 6.Nf3 or 6.Bd3? Then, if things get too hot on the queenside, White still retains the option of castling kingside. 6...b4 7.Nce2 a5 8.Kb1 Bg7 9.Nc1 Qc7 10.f3




Black has delayed playing Nf6 thereby not


giving White a kingside target. This puts the White Bh6 idea on hold for the time being. Yet, even though 10.f3 is part of the program, why play it? Usually, White needs to play this to secure the e pawn, to prevent Nf6 to Ng4 attacking White's killer Bishop, and to support the pawn thrust g4. In the game position, Black has none of these factors available. No attack on e4, no knight to g4 maneuver, and White can just play h4 at will. It gives me another tempo to attack the queenside monarch. 10...Rb8 11.g4 c5?! 12.dxc5! Open the center when your opponent is in the middle! 12...Nxc5 13.Bd4 Ngf6? 14.e5!




Bang! Black is busted! Too much dilly-dallying. 14...dxe5? 15.Bxe5! Qxe5?? 16.Qd8 mate. 14...dxe5? 15.Bxe5! Nfe4 16.Bxc7 Nxd2+ 17.Rxd2 Rb7?? 18.Rd8 mate. Ouch. How about 14...OO 15.exf6 Bxf6 16.Bxf6 exf6? Yuk! You get the picture. I was almost ready to resign when I found... 14...Nfe4 15.fxe4 Nxe4 16.Qe2 16.Qd3! (or Qe3 is also good) 16...dxe5 17.Ba7 Ra8 when White is much better. 16...dxe5 17.Bg2 (17.Be3! with a plus for White) Nc3+! 18.Bxc3



If 18.bxc3 bxc3+ and 19...exd4 looks worse for White than the game continuation. 18...bxc3 19.b3



Well, at least I got a couple of pawns for the piece and have created some weaknesses around his king. 19...a4 (better is 19...O-O) 20.Bd5 O-O 21.Nh3 Qa5 22.Nf2 Ba6 23.Qf3?!



As a general rule (applicable here), when one side is missing one of the bishops, and if the queen needs/wants to move, the first place to look is for a square of the color of the missing bishop. This is so that both color complexes get adequate coverage. Dark squares in this game. 23.Qe3 looks better, since Black is looking for a mate either on b2 or on a1 (dark squares). 23...e6 24.Be4 axb3 25.cxb3 f5 26.gxf5 exf5 27.Bd5+ Kh8 28.Qe3 e4 29.Kc2 Qa3 0-1 Heavy losses are unavoidable. Lucky escape for me.




