



**PLEASE NOTE: PROPOSED BY-LAWS CHANGES**

When I became President, I proposed some changes in the CSCA By-Laws to update and clarify them. I have a few more here that I am presenting to be voted on at the Membership Meeting on August 31. These are mostly just things that should have been done a long time ago. My proposal # 3, I hasten to state, is not directed at any particular officer. Indeed, I have been fortunate to have worked with some very fine people on the CSCA Board during my years as president. Like the other motions, it clarifies existing language and perhaps helps to make a potentially difficult situation a little less painful. To see the context of these proposals, look at the By-Laws on our Website.

**Motion 1: Delete Article VI Section 3 and replace it with the following:**

3) Secretary: The secretary shall (1) keep minutes of all meetings of the membership; (2) maintain records of membership in the Association, and receive and process new and renewing memberships; and (3) carry out duties prescribed by these By-Laws and such other duties as the President may assign. He shall preside at meetings of the membership if the President and Vice-President are unable to attend.

4) Treasurer: The treasurer shall (1) keep records of all funds collected and disbursed by the Association; (2) make financial reports at the Membership Meeting and at other appropriate times; and (3) carry out other duties prescribed by the By-Laws or assigned by the President.

**Motion 2: Add the following as Article VI, Section 5 (or section 4 if Motion 1 does not pass):** Appointees: Other Association officials such as the Editor, Manager of the Web page, and co-ordinators of Scholastics chess, Prison chess, and the Colorado Chess Tour shall be volunteers appointed by the Board. These people may or may not also be members of the Board.

**Motion #3: Delete the first sentence of Article VII, Section 2, and replace it with the following:**

Any officer elected or appointed may be removed from office for cause. This can be done by election at a special membership meeting, or by a vote of the Board under the following conditions:

- 1) The officer under impeachment shall be notified of the meeting at which the vote will be taken. Every reasonable effort should be made to have this meeting at a time and place such that this officer can attend.
- 2) A motion to remove an officer must pass by a majority of at least 80% of those voting, excluding the vote of the officer under impeachment.

Dear Readers,

This year's annual Scholastic **Colorado State Scholastic Chess Tournament** was a great tournament with very a very strong field in all sections. The Swiss System pairing used in this 6-round tournament. For the eighth consecutive year it was held at the Arapahoe Community College in Littleton. The divisions were K-3, 4-6, 7-9 and 10-12. David Twerskoi, Sam Galler, Kevin Seidler, and Ryan Propper went into the tournament as "board ones" and most were favorites to win their divisions.

On day one David Twerskoi breezed through his first 3 games. In the fourth round, David pulled off the win against Robbie Herbst. It appeared that Sam Galler also had an easy first three games. He beat Zachary Bekkedahl, who placed third in the Fifth Grade Division at Nationals in December. In 7-9, Kevin Seidler had losing positions in the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> round games, but ended up winning both games! In the 10-12 division, Ryan Propper surprised the crowd and drew his 3<sup>rd</sup> game to a very strong Boris Davis. On the first board, Jesse Cohen, narrowly beat an extremely strong Joe Ford. Back in the 7-9 section, Kevin then beat another Davis, only this time Anthony. Now, everyone went home to prepare for the two hardest rounds.

The next day, Davis Twerskoi beat Charlie Schneiders in round five which was a bit of an upset. David Twerskoi was down a full rook (!) against Matt McGlynn in round 6, but amazingly pulled off a victory. David was easily the champion with a full 6 points. Sam Galler won a good game against Richard Herbst in the first round Sunday. Then he met up with Tyler Hughes, an 11 year old boy from Wheatridge. Tyler is an incredibly smart player whose rating has sky-rocketed this year. They got into a tough battle when Sam offered a draw. In that position, Tyler had a rook for a big mess of pawns and declined the draw. Tyler finally accepted Sam's third draw offer. They both ended up with a top score of 5.5/ 6. In other final rounds, Kevin Seidler drew Sam Treggilus, and Jesse Cohen beat Ryan Propper.

Your champions: David Twerskoi, K-3 champion; Tyler Hughes, 4-6 champion with Sam Galler as co-champ; Kevin Seidler the 7-9 champion; and Jesse Cohen the 10-12 champion. Jesse Cohen will represent our state in the Denker Tournament of Champions in New Jersey.


**SECURING d5**

 Learning how play against a backward pawn is one of chess's most important techniques. One of the most common themes occurs when black has to suffer with a backward d6 pawn.

The player with the backward pawn often strives to push the pawn, to trade it off for a health enemy pawn. The square in front of a backward pawn is also weak, since it can't be supported by a friendly pawn. Often this square is actually weaker than the square the backward pawn is on and should be secured first. Once this is accomplished, your forces can either come to bear on the backward or attack elsewhere while your opponent is tied up defending the backward pawn. Here are two positions that demonstrate how to punish black's backward pawn.

I. Boleslavsky-G. Lissitzin  
 (Moscow 1956)



By eliminating the f6 knight, white owns the d5 square) **18...Qe6 19.Bf6 Qf6 20.Nd5 Qh4** (White may be down in material, but he has a huge advantage with the good knight vs. the bad bishop. With the players castled on opposite sides, white's plan is to storm the black king with pawns in order to open up lines for his heavy pieces. 20. Qh4 is an attempt by black to block this plan. If 21.g3, then black intends 21...Qh3 and white must find a way to chase the black queen in order to continue to advance his pawns successfully. If white offers a queen trade, black will happily accept as the white queen is critical to any white mating attack plans.)


**21.Qe2 Bf8 22.Qf1!** (Excellent! This retreat



maneuver is the point of the pawn sacrifice. Now with the white queen hitting h3, g3 can be played and white's kingside pawns will be marching forward.) **22...Rac8** (Black has two plans; trade pieces to slow white's kingside attack or try counterplay on the queenside vs. the white king. Note that this is closest black ever gets to the white king.) **23.g3 Qg5 24.h4 Qh6** (24... Qg3 loses the queen to 25.Rh3. Note that Qh5 can't be played now or later, due to the knight fork on f6.) **25.g4 g5** (Praying for white to

play 26.h5 locking up the kingside. There isn't much choice for black at this point. White threatens g5, Nf6+, and h5 with a winning attack. Note once again the power of the knight on the square in front of the backward pawn if black tries Bg7 at some point, an unwelcome visitor hops to e7!) **26.hg5 Qg5 27.Rh5 Qg6 28.g5!** (28...Qh5, 29. Nf6+) **28...h6 29.Rh6!** (29..Bh6, 30.Ne7+) **29..Qg5** (29...Qg7, 30. Nf6+) **30.Rh5!** Wow! Of course, again if 30.Qh5, then 31.Nf6+. White has opened both the g and h files for his heavy pieces. If black tries 30.Qg3, white finishes him nicely with 31.Qh1!, threatening 32.Rh8+ and 32.Rg1, so... **Black Resigns**

Once again black has a backward pawn on d6, but he threatens to give white a backward pawn on b3. White's plan; lock up the queenside and attack the backward d-pawn. Black wants the queenside open so he can counterattack there. The critical square? **d5!** (the square in front of the backward pawn). Knowing this, what should white do? White played **21.Bf6!** (gets out


of the pawn fork, and gains more control of d5 by eliminating the knight that attacks it! Black's bishop has total control of the a1-h8 diagonal, but it's all dressed up with nowhere to go. The bishop would be strong if the a or b file were open so that the bishop could support a rook invasion. In this case, however, the knight is stronger than the bishop. Black is positionally lost at this point! the d5 square belongs to white forever and black will always be tied down to defending the d6 pawn.) **21..Bf6 22.Nd5 Qd7**

(This only encourages white's next move. The black queen would help put up stiffer resistance by heading for the kingside.) 23.a4 (Now black's queenside counter play is stopped forever.) **23...Rbe8 24.e3 Ne7 25.Kg1 Nd5 26.Rd5** (White wants the d-file open, not blocked with his own pawn.) **26...Rd8 27.Rfd1 Kf7** (Yuval played this move quickly and seemed pretty happy. He

must have thought that he could batten down the hatches and that I wouldn't be able to make any progress and be forced to settle for a draw. Now lets stop and evaluate the position again. Black really can't do anything but shuffle his pieces back and forth; there is no queenside counter play, his defenses are tied to the d-pawn, and he definitely wants to keep the kingside closed. White's rooks are well placed on the open file and the queen can join them in a move. The only white piece whose position can be improved is the knight. White eventually wants to open the kingside and expose the black king. But what is the hurry? Black can't do anything to improve his position, so lets put the pieces on the optimum squares before opening the position. Hence: **28.Ne1 Qc7 29.Nd3**

(Note how white has improved the position from the original diagram above. The white pieces head toward their optimum squares before they break through.) **29Be5?** (This loses quickly tactically. Without the blunder, White will win soon with some sequence of Nf4, Qd3 tying black's major pieces to the d-pawn then comes the pawn break on the kingside with some combination of h4-h5, e4 and/

or g4 depending on where the black pieces

are placed at the time. Black will feel like he is playing defense against the St. Louis Ram offense as he is outmaneuvered on the kingside by white's quick striking pieces.)

**29...Be5?? 30.Nc5 Ree8 31.Nd3 Ke7 32.Nb4 Resigns \_end**


**Durango-Farmington Match**

There are a few gaps (especially in the late 1980's and early 1990's in the Scholastic Section) below and possibly a few inaccuracies (but hopefully, not many!)? I welcome any corrections, additions, or omissions that you may find. Also, please let me know if there is some category that you would like to see included on the list below.—Todd Bardwick, Rocky Mountain News Chess Columnist

This list includes players that have achieved master ratings in the state of Colorado. To be included on the list, a player must have been a resident of Colorado and played in at least one rated tournament while living in the state. Some players on the list have not held the rating of the level of master that they are listed as, but they did achieve the minimum rating at some time and qualified to get that master certificate from USCF. Also, some of the players listed below achieved their highest master level before moving to Colorado or after leaving Colorado. Some of the top players from the 1950's era may have been of master strength, but in the absence of the Elo rating system this is not possible to judge today.
