NEW BUSINESS

-2024 Colorado State Scholastic championship. Todd put out an email with all the TD's included. Todd stated same crew as last year, should not have any problems.

By request: Earlier in the year, last year there was an issue. Bye policy. ½ point for a bye and must be requested 1 hour prior to the matches. Todd states he doesn't want people requesting later byes during a tournament because it could impact pairings in the final two matches. He states it could allow participants to manipulate the system. It is almost like people requesting byes to allow people to buy their way into a prize position. We should not give out byes in rounds 4,5,6, per Todd. Earle, post it in an advertisement and we are covered. Earle states Todd is the Tournament Director, and he can make any changes. Rule in the book: 21c2 and 22c2 and only take ½ point buy from rounds 1 through 4 and not allow ½ point buys in rounds 5 and 6. Then send out an email to reflect the change in an email to those who have already registered. Voting to recommend ½ byes for rounds 1-3. 0-point byes are allowed. The vote passed unanimously.

Volunteers that we have working being discussed to ensure we have enough. Tom organized this all, but Tom is not here. Dean is doing the pairings. Earle can do the pairings and Andy can do the pairings as well. Everyone has to have their USCF memberships up to date prior to the pairings being posted for those players.

Food Trucks: Jesse was spearheading this facet. Paradise tavern. Food truck usually pays to be there. We have cost associated with the venue; comes with two kitchens, warming kitchens, but not to cook in. Just cooling and warming. One entity is in the building, "Paradise tavern" \$200 is their option that they chose per day. Three other food trucks: Romo's Mexican food truck (Tacos). Q's Cuisine (Barbecue), What Would Cheesus Do (cheese sandwich's). We must get a permit from Firefighters if they are going to cook to have it inspected for concerns. If the second kitchen is not accessible, we may have to not have Cheesus involved. Jesse spoke with Jessica Heights stated we have two kitchens. But one of the kitchens will be utilized by the Chess administrators because it is too close to the chess players and would disturb the actual tournament.



Set up for the tournament. Earle will be there the night before to set up the DGT boards. Todd will set up the board numbers and the boards. Todd is requesting another person to help with setting up the venue. Starting on Friday for set up. There will be three divisions: K-3 K-5, K-12. Three DGT boards for each section. Benjamin Beaver, Zach hired to take over his operations. Benjamin offered his services and other coaches. Setting up the chess sets is the most time-consuming issue. Todd would like for him and Jesse Cohen to set up the chess sets alone and not utilize the volunteers.

Tom has the sets. Tom will be arriving at 3 p.m. on Friday. Tom will be bringing the trophies and booklets, as well as the score sheets, pencils or pens.

Earle at the end will go up on stage with a microphone and present the trophies. Earle spoke with someone working for the tournament and wanted they wanted their child to be given a free tournament and have their fees waived. The issue is giving out free things, the money is actually used for travel for the kids to other venues if they win. It isn't fair to everyone that someone got a free tournament for whatever reason.

ACTIONS

Voting to recommend ½ byes for rounds 1-3. 0-point byes are allowed. The vote passed unanimously.

OLD BUSINESS

Website project: Dean is not here. Neil is promoting a proposal to work on the website project, he has been involved in the college application process. He is recommending a possible professional option. Jesse Cohen is stating that there are no energy moving forward, motivation, is not there. Jesse would like to hire professional services to get it accomplished. The project has stalled, and Jesse wants to get this project moving forward. Dean is not assisting actively enough to get this project done. Jesse suggest we hire someone for \$200-\$300 to transfer our website. We use WordPress and then have someone build our website up. Then have the board take over. Security is a concern during the conversation related to Jesse Cohen having his website hacked. Someone recommended we not tie our bank accounts to the online site. The recommendation is that we discuss with Dean and see what his thoughts about using Stripe for payments. To see if Dean is going to assist with moving forward and be interactive in this project

Earle: Would like Jesse to send Earle the website link to see what their rates are. Jesse is suggesting, "FIVER" is a list of people that will work with you for a price and you can choose and decide which entrepreneur to choose versus price.

Motion to close the meeting by Earle, seconded by Jesse Cohen.

Each lesson builds off of the previous one, so new members need to take the three lessons in sequence to get the most out of my instruction. Please arrive promptly so we can get started on time. In addition to beginners' lessons, we feature open play at these Saturday meetups, where more experienced players can play friendly games while I am teaching the newer players. Members play both blitz and untimed games here, though we do not offer USCF-rated games.

The South Metro Denver Chess Club, that's quite a mouthful for a chess club name. But it's no more difficult than saying *Zugzwang* or *Zwischenzug*, or even *Check Mate!*, but it describes the general area where we meet. This Chess club is made up of CEO's and retired folk and scientists and construction workers and from 7 year olds and the "over 60" year olds.

The SMDCC was started as there wasn't any OTB play in the local area in the Spring of 2021. The Covid-19 pandemic had shut pretty much everything down and a few of us felt playing chess online was getting to be a bit tedious. So we stumbled upon a novel idea – why not play chess in person! Imagine that! And so we did!

The level of play is as varied as we are – from beginners to over 2200. The games are timed or not depending on what the checkered-board combatants agree on. Players play what is often referred to as *competitive-social games* and in other cases *socially-competitive games*.

Presently we meet at **The Half-Penny Brewery** on **Thursdays** from **6pm until close**. Chess players come when it is convenient for them and leave when they need to. No attendance is taken nor are membership dues collected (there are none). This unique venue is at 5150 East Arapahoe Road, Unit d1-b, in the King Sooper Shopping Center in Centennial 80122.

It's a "bring your own food" place and they have amazingly fresh Root Beer and Ginger Beer along with the usual Cokes and soft drinks.



I started Gambit Coffee in the 4th quarter of last year as a way to both promote chess and provide specialty coffee for anyone who wants to enjoy a nice cup. I love being able to see the reaction on someone's face when they first experience a truly delicious cup of coffee. The current standard for coffee is a low grade and mass produced product that is generally not sustainable long term for either the environment nor the laborers who do most of the work in coffee production. Gambit Coffee purchases and produces only high quality and sustainably sourced coffee so that people can not only have a wonderful experience, but also be able to continue to do so many years down the road.

The company's dream would be to one day open a chess cafe in the Denver metro region. There are few chess cafe's in the world and none (that I'm aware of) in Colorado. One issue the chess players I've met almost all have in common is that of not having a dedicated place to play. Most rely on various businesses such as Half Penny, IHOP, or Starbucks in order to play. This can present an issue when the business decides it is no longer in their interest to have chess players present. A dedicated chess cafe (ideally with a tournament hall) would be a wonderful place where people can gather, make friends, and enjoy the game together. My hope is that Gambit Coffee can one day be successful enough to be able to afford to make such a dream come true. For now orders are either done online at <https://gambit.coffee/> or in person at markets.

Gambit Coffee started out of a desire to raise the bar of coffee quality in Colorado, specifically in the Denver metro region. While there are some shops that do provide specialty coffee in Denver, there are far more that provide coffee of a much lower quality. If you're not familiar with specialty coffee, you might think of it as being akin to a fine scotch in the world of alcohol. Many specialty coffee drinkers prefer to drink it straight/black, without additives such as cream and sugar, in order to enjoy and explore the distinct flavors of the coffee's terroir. Of course, it also makes a fantastic base for espresso-based drinks. Gambit Coffee also started from a desire to spread the love of chess. One way I've found to do this is to promote the game directly by including chess puzzles on each coffee bag, making it not just a bag of coffee but also a mix of brain exercise/entertainment. I find packaging/products that give back in this way to be much more valuable on a personal level. I also set up a chess board at each market that Gambit Coffee participates in and invite people to play for free to discuss chess, coffee, and life. This provides an opportunity to teach the game to beginners as well as promote our chess meetups, such as the one hosted Saturday nights at IHOP in Greenwood Village. Overall, the goal is to spread the love of chess and build up the chess community in the Denver region while also providing a high quality product that has also been shown to help improve mental function. I've already shared with you the dream of eventually opening up a chess cafe, but only time, money, and interest will reveal whether this dream becomes reality.



Grand Master's Chess

Creator and Developer: Stanley Allen

Greetings next generation of chess players.

You can be one of the first to own only one of 100 boards in existence signed and numbered.

Chess came out of India around 1400 A.D.. It has been used by kings to strategize for war, as well as statesmen to increase intelligence and cognitive abilities. From children to philosophers to politicians and everyone in between, chess has been enjoyed by all races and nationalities. Chess has no boundaries!

Over the centuries the world has become a more complicated place. There are more kings and world leaders and without saying, more politicians. There are a lot more people on the international stage these days, hence the expansion of the chess board.

Grand Master's Chess

How To Play:
For those up to the challenge, this is a game for 2 opponents on opposite sides of the board. Each player has 30 pieces, one player with black pieces and one with white pieces. At the opening of the game, the pieces are set up as pictured (see figure Opening).

Remember:

1. The board should be set up with white square in each corner for white
2. Opposing King and Queen are opposite each other on the board.
3. The white Queen starts out on a white square, the black queen on a black square.

How the pieces move:
The player with the white pieces always moves first, play continues taking turns. Only one place may be moved during each turn (except for castling special moves see further below). The Horseman is the only piece that can jump over the pieces. All other pieces move only along unblocked lines. You may not move a piece to a square that is already occupied by one of your own pieces. But you capture an opponent's piece that stands on a square where one of your pieces moves. Once captured, remove the opponent's piece from the board and put your own piece in its place.

The **GrandMaster** has the power of the Queen as weak as a Knight. The only time the Grand Master can jump over another piece is when it uses the move of a Knight.

The **King** is the most important chess piece on the board. The capture of the King is the object of the game. The King can move only one square in any direction (left, right, forward, backward, and diagonally). An exception is Castling - explained later. The King may never move into check by an opponent's piece.

The **Queen** is the second most powerful chess piece, as it can either move diagonally or in a straight line, which makes it like a Bishop and a Rook combined.

Rooks can move any number of squares vertically or horizontally if its path is not blocked. (See figure Rook) Unusually, players opt not to use the Rook until later in the game as it will be harassed by Pawns and other pieces wasting moves to make it safe. (see figure Rooks).

Bishop can move any number of squares diagonally if its path is not blocked. Note that a Bishop which starts on a red square can reach only other red squares and the same for a Bishop which starts on a black square can only reach other black squares. (See figure Bishop).

Knights moves in an L-shaped pattern, it moves two squares horizontally or vertically and then makes a right angle turn one more square, landing moves one square on a color opposite from its original position. The Knight can jump over the other pieces between its old and new square (see figure Knight).

Pawns move only one square at a time but on its first move it has the option of moving forward one to 4 squares. Promotion of the Pawn happens when the pawn reaches the other side of the board. The pawn immediately promoted to another piece- into any piece that the player wants except the King. The pawn can only redeem a captured piece. The player cannot have more than the original pieces, i.e. one Queen.

En Passant:
The **En Passant** rule is a special pawn capturing move in chess. You move your pawn diagonally to an adjacent square, one rank further from where it had been on the same file where the enemy's pawn is and remove the opponent's pawn from the board. This is how a pawn captures an En Passant.

Check and Checkmate: the main goal is to checkmate your opponent's King. The King is actually captured and removed from the board like other pieces. Checkmate ends the game. If the King is attacked "checked" and threatened with capture, it must get out of Check immediately. If there is no way out of check are below. You may not make a move that does not remove you from check:

- Capturing the attacking piece
- Placing one of your own pieces between attackers and your King.
- Moving the King away from the attack. You may not castle out of check.

If a checked player can make none of these moves, with no escape, the player is in checkmate and loses the game. If a King is not in check but that player can make no legal move, this is called a stalemate and the game is scored as a draw, or tie. In the event of a perpetual check, a technical win goes to the aggressor.

Stalemate example:
If black loses all of his pieces except the King, white has 35 moves to capture the black King.

Rules for Castling:
Castling is only possible if neither the king or rook have moved
There must not be any pieces between king and the rook
The King may not be in Check or Castle across Check
A Rook may still Castle if under attack.
The King moves 3 spaces to the left or right only if 1 Rook is used. The Rook is placed opposite the King's movements if 2 Rooks are used and one Rook is placed on either side of the King (Rook King Rook).

Normal game etiquette applies.

History of Chess in Denver through the early 1970s

September 1859, a chess club was formed in the Auraria-Denver area by William Byers, first owner of the Rocky Mountain News, which carried news of its meetings. The club had about 20 members and had regular meetings.

The next record of an organized Chess Club in Denver was at the old Denver Athletic Club, which ran back to the turn of the century. It was frequented in the 1930's by a minister, "Doctor" William Scott, whom Arthur K. Underwood (a partner in a prominent Denver law firm and 1950 Denver City Champion and 1952 Colorado State Champion) characterized as "the best player in the state for a number of years." The Denver Athletic Club had a fine, luxurious atmosphere with a nice room to play in and quality sets and tables. The room was ideal for exhibitions (George Koltanowski once gave a blindfold simultaneous exhibition there).

Some of the more prominent players at the Denver Athletic Club were Donald Pick, Burt Gobble, Pier Fuller, and Henry Tull (a prominent Denver lawyer).

Frank Fetzer (a one-time Justice of the Colorado Supreme Court) took on most of the organizational aspects of the Denver Athletic Club Chess Club up until the end of World War II. Fetzer brought Al Horowitz, George Koltanowski, and other chess luminaries to Denver.

Denver Chess Club

The Denver Chess Club was formed in the mid-1940s and was sponsored through the YMCA on an informal level. The club was run by Merle Reese (and his brother) until his death. Reese ran "Reese's Hamburgers" chain, a chain that today takes the form of Reese's Coffee Shops.

The YMCA club had a number of strong players: John H. Meyers (who was born in the same town and on the same day as Winston Churchill), Mr. Harrison, Roy Ruby, Donald L. Crooks, Walt Neill (who was still a member into the mid 1990s), Bernie Dornbods, and Mr. Anema.

Walter de Havilland (who was one of the first Westerners to play the game of Go at a high level), father of Academy Award winning actress Oliva de Havilland (who played Melanie Hamilton in *Gone with the Wind* for which she received an Oscar nomination for Best Supporting Actress), attended the YMCA club.



In the 1960's one of the strongest players was George Tufts from Boston, who according to John Harris, "dropped in for a visit and stayed the rest of his life".

In those early days, the YMCA Chess Club had a few matches with the Denver Athletic Chess Club and occasionally with an out-of-town club.

Prior to 1950, tournaments were informally organized, by a notice on the YMCA bulletin board. The Denver City Championship was a great deal stronger than the Colorado State Championship back in those days due to the format since the Denver Championship could be stretched out over a number of weeks, allowing players to arrange their schedules to their own convenience.

The Denver Chess League formed in April of 1958. Alfred W. Hulmes, Jr. (Colorado State Champion in 1955 and 1957) was the first vice-president of the league, which by 1959 had upwards of 150 members on its 6-man teams. The League met biweekly during the winter and played a round robin tournament; its membership consisted of college students, engineers, bankers, and geologists. Companies participating were Gates Rubber Co., Schwayder Brothers, Inc., Denver Martin Co. plant, Central Bank of Denver, Stearns-Roger Mfg. Co., Denver Equipment Co., U.S. Geological Survey teams, Colorado University, Colorado Highway, Denver Chess Club, Cavaliers' Chess Club, and Sundance Oil Company.

Dr. George N. Pipiringos was CSCA President from 1961-1963. Pipiringos was a geologist who played on the U.S. Geological Survey Chess Team.



Pipiringos was Denver Chess Club President (1961-62) and one of the organizers of the Denver Chess League, which developed out of the Denver Industrial Chess League). In 1962, Pipiringos helped launch the Denver Chess League Bulletin, the predecessor of the CSCA Bulletin.

He was Colorado State Director of the USCF for three terms and initiated and played in three annual Colorado/New Mexico interstate tournaments. He was instrumental in obtaining the first Chess Week Proclamation (January 20-26, 1963) for the City and County of Denver, in celebration of Larry Evans' 1962 victory in the U.S. Invitational. Pipiringos was also an arbitrator with the USCF during the 69th U.S. Open at Snowmass in Aspen. In 1975 he was awarded the second annual Appreciation Award. Pipiringos was also Colorado State Champion in 1958 and 1961.

Grandmasters who stayed at Pipiringos' home while they were in Denver include Sammy Reshevsky, Larry Evans, Bobby Fischer, William Lombardy, Robert Byrne, Svetozar Gligoric, and Lajos Portisch.

Central Bank Chess Club

Al Wallace (a founder of CSCA and Vice-President at the Central Bank and Trust) founded the Central Bank Chess Club in 1958 (15th and Arapahoe St.). Wallace worked at the Central Bank. The club was widely recognized and attended in Colorado, even by visiting GMs. The Central Bank Chess Club met on Friday nights.

Wallace was the first president of the Denver Chess League (formed in 1959). Others on the board were Alfred Hulmes, Charles Schupp, and Claude Wood). Wallace was President of the Denver Chess League for two years and thereafter served as treasurer until his death in 1965. Wallace was also treasurer of CSCA until 1965 and was presented with an Appreciation Plaque by CSCA in recognition of his work in and promotion of chess in Colorado. Wallace much loved and widely respected; his cigar and the greeting, "Hiya Tiger! Come on in, I'll set up the board.", became his trademarks. In 1966, the CSCA instituted the Al Wallace Memorial Tournament.

Al Wallace died December 31, 1965.

The 1st Al Wallace Memorial tournament was March 25-27, 1966 in the Gates Rubber Company cafeteria.

Gates Rubber Company Chess Club

After Al Wallace passed, the Central Bank Chess Club moved to Gates Rubber Company and continued on Friday nights in 1966. The Gates Rubber Company Chess Club's last year was 1972.

Clarence "Cap" McCuistion worked at Gates and ran the club.

2024 Colorado State Scholastic Championships

The Colorado State Scholastic Championship was held at the Arapahoe County Fairgrounds the weekend of Feb. 3 & 4, and despite the snow there was a total of 251 scholastic players surpassing last year's total. The tournament was well run by National Tournament Director Todd Bardwick along with an amazing amount of help from all the hard working volunteers, Dean Clow, Tom Nelson, Jesse Cohen, Dwayne Langseth, Benjamin Beavers, Karthika Sakthisaravanan, Peter Canacci, and myself. Breaking down the 251 players in each section totals, (56) in K-12, (50) in K-8, (77) in K-5, (45) in K-3, and (23) in K-1. With only 6 rounds of play to determine the champion for each section, it made for a very competitive tournament to determine the champions for the top sections as to who will represent Colorado for their section at the National tournament in July. The Swiss style tournament had four games on Saturday at game in 60 min. with a 5 second delay, and two games Sunday for the championship rounds at game in 90 min. with a 5 second delay.

In the K-12 section, National Master and Current Colorado State Champion Sullivan McConnell along with National Master and 2023 Scholastic Champion Neil Bhavikatti each scored 4 wins on Saturday putting both in the lead with 4 points. In round 5 they met and played a long fought 53 move draw. In the last round both McConnell and Bhavikatti won their final game creating a tie for first and second place with a score of (5.5). McConnell finished first on tie-breaks, Bhavikatti second, and Davin Yin third. Tanya Prahbu finished as top female in State. Rocco Degeest led the K-8 section finishing first with 5.5, and Henry Kovacs and Derek Yin tied for second and third with 5 points. In the K-5 section, Arie Feigin and Shaurya Misra both scored 5.5, but Arie won against stronger competition and won first on tie-breakers along with gaining 206 rating points. In the K-3 section, Avyukth Shrikanth dominated the section finishing with a perfect 6-0. In the K-1, Anish Panda finished with a perfect 5-0 placing first.






DCC 2024 Tribute to Martin Luther King Tournament

The DCC named this tournament a Tribute to Martin Luther King because if anyone is worthy of tributes, it is Mr. King. Understanding that racism is abhorrent, Reverend King devoted his life, and ultimately gave his life to have people judged by the "content of their character" rather than the "color of their skin." This great man could also be addressed as Doctor King, having earned a Systematic Theology doctorate from Boston University. He was indeed an accomplished individual. Well deserving of the National Holiday named in his honor.

As a white person from a small town in Pennsylvania, I first became aware of racism as a young teenager when visiting relatives in northern Alabama. There I saw two water fountains in a small town country store. One was clean and labeled "Whites Only". The other was set at a lower level, unclean, and labeled "Coloreds". In that same area, I heard racism pretty much any time a white person was talking about a black person. But being white, I've never felt, experienced, or lived with racism. Like when a black man with his family would go to a restaurant and be told, we don't serve "your kind" in here. Blatant disrespect. I doubt if there is a black person in America who hasn't experienced subtle or worse, in your face racism at one time or another, if not daily.

Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat on a Montgomery, Alabama bus, and it might be said that was the beginning of Dr. King's civil rights crusade that is ongoing still because, sad to say, it can not be denied that racism still exists in American society. A guy I worked with

in a welding shop, who was of Mexican heritage, would say "People are people". Meaning regardless of skin color or nationality. It's a shame that Caucasians still use derogatory words for anyone not white or born in the USA. With all that said, I'll get off my high horse, and get on with the summary of this excellent DCC tournament.

From an organizer's point of view, what makes a chess tournament successful? In my opinion, it's the registration. If the regular players keep coming back and the tournament attracts new players, then the DCC is doing something right. Also, when players peruse the TLA and see a huge prize fund with our multitude of sections and Under prizes, everyone - regardless of their rating - realizes that they can win not only USCF rating points but also significant prize money. The 2024 MLK had a record registration of 134 players and an outstanding 5000 dollar prize fund.

Therefore, I can say without question that the DCC is giving chess players what they want. They perhaps think: Hey, unlike online chess, this is the real thing. My opponent, who has a real name, is directly across the board from me and wants what I want. Competition, prize money, and USCF rating points.

We play tournament chess for the competition, and the opportunity to take rating points and prize money from whoever is sitting on the other side of the table. But maybe more so, just for the thrill and satisfaction of finding a game winning tactical shot. Or in my case, some way to draw the game instead of losing :-). Another good thing about chess and chess players is how they usually engage in post game analysis. Where woulda, coulda, shoulda, moves are analyzed, or demonstrated. Raising the game of one player raises the game of all players.

Incredibly in the Championship section, where the big dogs run, there was a 5-way tie for 1st place. Sullivan McConnell, Daniel Herman, Brian Wall, Rhett Langseth, and Luis Jimenez, all scored 4 points. I bet Mr. Jimenez, who is rated "only" 1812 is especially pleased to be sharing the 2000 dollar combined prize payout with three Masters and Rhett, a strong Expert, and who is sure to be a USCF Master soon. And no doubt Luis will soon be a USCF Expert. Luis started

out by holding NM Wall (2207) to a draw, won against Sandeep Mathew (1657), upset Patrick Wright (1921), held Daniel Herman (2233) to a draw, and beat Suhaas Narayanan (2053) in the last round. His rating point difference totals up to 758 points!! Mr. Jimenez was only higher rated in his game against Mr. Mathew. Also in this section, the young Rocco Degeest had two big upset wins. He won against NM Richard Shtivelband in round 1, and against much higher rated Laurence Wutt in round 2.

In the U1800 section, Kristopher Zelkin and Emmett Lignell each ended up with 4.5 points. Mr Zelkin had a 3rd round bye. Mr. Lignell started off with a draw, before winning all his other games. Each player won 350 dollars. The 3rd place prize of 200 dollars and 1 cent was shared by Jon Sealander, William Wolf, and Jeff Baffo. If we had Upset prizes in our weekend tournaments - as we do in the DCC Tuesday and Thursday night tournaments - long time Colorado chess tournament player, Robert Carlson would have won it for his 189 point rating difference win against Ken Doykos, an equally long time Colorado player.

Krish Mathimaran ruled the U1600 section finishing with a perfect 5-0 score to win 350 dollars. Greg Wheeler lost his round 1 game but bounced back to win his next four and take the 2nd place prize of 225 dollars. The third place prize was shared by Felix McMillan and Sumanth Kaja. They each had multiple upset wins and each player won 62 dollars and 50 cents. In

addition, Nathaniel Lasaga-Ivey's 3 points were all upset wins, and Sofiia Gainullina also scored 3 points by upsetting her opponents. The best upset in this section was a game from a DCC Tuesday night regular. Youngster James Corbett had a big 242 point rating difference win in the last round against long time Colorado player, Dean Brown.

In the U1400 section, Sankar Parasuram ended up with 4 points, which included a nice 100 point rating difference win over Karthika Sakthisaravanan in round 3. Sankar took home the 1st place prize of 325 dollars. The combined 2nd and 3rd place prize of 324 dollars and 99 cents was shared by Thwayne Johnson, Pranav Male, and Zephyr Zink. Ashwin Mathimaran ruled the U1200 section. As did Krish Mathimaran in the U1600 section. I'm assuming these players are related. They both finished in 1st place and they both did so with perfect 5-0 scores. Ashwin adds 300 dollars to the family coffers. If they are related, I imagine they are having a big family celebration :-)

Only a half point behind, Brendan Wells took the 2nd place prize of 200 dollars. After a round 1 draw Mr. Wells won four in a row. Mark Kingsly, Demetri Jones, and John Bloemker all ended up with 4 points and they share the combined 3rd place and U1000 prize, with each Player winning 83 dollars and 33 cents. Demetri and John both had huge upset wins to make up most of their final score. The best upset in this section was Benjamin Smith's 645 point rating difference win against Frank Atwood in round 2. I'll freely admit I don't know or would not recognize a lot of the prize winners mentioned in this report. In a way, I'm glad about that because it means they are likely new to Colorado chess. The problem is any more I don't recognize half the players I do know :-)

I do hope everyone who plays in DCC tournaments is pleased with the DCC and the prize structure of our tournaments. With multiple sections and Under prizes,

how could we be any more fair? I know. Add upset prizes for each section :-)

2024 Colorado Closed Championships

This year's Colorado Closed Championship was held from March 8-10 at the Sheraton Hotel Denver Tech Center in Greenwood Village. The rented space size for the tournament met for comfortable playing conditions with every player having their own table with a DGT board to play on. In addition to the 8 DGT boards the CSCA had prior to last August, the CSCA purchased 3 more used boards in August, and my personal DGT board, that made for 12 DGT boards. The closed championship is meant to be a special tournament of Colorado's best available players to play chess, and this year's event felt like the tournament had returned to the time of pre-COVID.

In the Championship section, all players, except Eamon Montgomery, were or had been a chess master at one time. Just like last year's event when Matthew Wofford made master for the first time, this year's closed championship produced Colorado's newest chess master Eamon Montgomery. Eamon scored a fantastic 4 win with only 1 loss to place clear first and the title of chess master, Congratulation Eamon! Second and third place was a tie with 2.5 points between NM Sullivan McConnell and the returning NM Zach Bekkedahl.

The Challenger section, consisted of a field of all experts. With their ratings being within 100 rating points of each other by the February rating list, it made for some good competition. Suhaas Narayanan scored 3 wins and 2 draw to take first places, and Vedanth Sampath score 2 wins and 3 draws for second. Both players did not lose a game. Robert Bucholtz placed third with 2.5 points. Rob has mainly played Arm Forces tournaments and hiding out in Colorado Springs. As it turns out, I work in the same building as Rob on Schriever SFB and help persuade him to play in the tournament.

In the Scholastic Championship section, Grayson Manual went undefeated scoring 2 wins and 3 draws to tie for first and win on tie-breaker over talented State K-8 Scholastic champion Rocco Degeest. Rocco lost to Grayson in round one and came back to tie. Amitai Sebba placed third with 3 points.

The Scholastic Challenger section was dominated by Kaavya Sakthisaravavan who scored a perfect 5-0, Congratulations Kaavya! This catapulted Kaavya to gain 210 rating points, and now that Sara Herman moved out of State, that makes Kaavya the second highest rated female player in the state of Colorado. Second place was won by Krish Mathimaran, who scored 2 wins, 1 loss, and 2 draws.

Thank you to all that played and happy to see everyone have a good time. I look forward to next year and may consider an open tournament to be held in conjunction with the closed.

Tata Steel Chess Tournament 2024

For 86 years now, the new year has started off with "the Wimbledon of chess" tournament in Wijk Aan Zee. A long and storied tradition that began back in 1938 and continues today, attracting the best players and fans from around the world. This has become an annual "chess-vacation" for me, and I was fortunate to receive access to the stage once again to photograph this incredible event. My brother and his wife joined me this year on a flight to Amsterdam and then a short drive to Wijk Aan Zee. The experience of the organizers and staff excels as this tournament is professionally and well run. And once again the beautiful and large De Moorian playing hall hosted the event.

Tata Steel is divided into three groups of players: The masters, challengers, and amateurs. Fourteen top players are invited to the masters each year and this year was special for having world champion Ding Liren and women's world champion Ju Wenjun participate. The fourteen challengers are also by special invitation and the winner of this group receives an automatic entry into next year's masters. The large amateur section also has the unique opportunity for the winner to get invited into next year's challenger group. The amateur section registrations fill up fast and always have more applicants than openings, a testament to the quality of the tournament and popularity of chess in the Netherlands. I learned of a particular amateur player on his 56th time playing in this prestigious event in what must be a record! Imagine his stories.

The tournament is long as thirteen classical games are played over several weeks while the amateurs face off for a still grueling nine rounds. I have to be selective and chose to attend the final three rounds which tend to be the most exciting, especially this year. Wijk Aan Zee is a quiet and quaint village about 30 minutes from Amsterdam on the coast of the north sea. Despite being near the sea, the weather and

temperatures can be rather comfortable for winter and fortunately was for my stay. The mornings were great for exploring and walking the beach as the games started in the afternoon. Everywhere around the village and every cafe visited, you were reminded that chess had taken over, a chess player's dream.

Not only were both world chess champions playing but also five of the eight candidates qualifiers: Ian Nepomniachtchi, Alireza Firouzja, Praggnanandhaa R, Vidit Gujrathi, and Gukesh D. Absent this year was Magnus Carlsen, a perennial favorite who has won Tata more than any other player. The only US player represented this year was the highest rated in the challenger group, Hans Niemann. Of note in the challengers group was the young 16 year old French player Marc'Andria Maurizzi. The youngest ever French player to receive the grandmaster title at 14 years old which I had the fortune to photograph back in 2018 during the Paris GCT when he was only eleven. It was during a special event where he was paired with Garry Kasparov in a team tournament and later made headlines as a partner in Kasparov's first ever bughouse game. I enjoyed sharing some photos and stories of the event with the young Maurizzi.

Going into the eleventh round, Gukesh and Abdusattorov were tied for first with 6.5 points while six other players were within a point. Firouzja faced off with Gukesh trying to catch up to the leaders at just a point behind while Ju Wenjun faced off against Nodirbek Abdusattorov. Gukesh failed to capitalize against the resilient Firouzja and drew their game. Eyes then turned to Nodirbek and Ju Wenjun to determine the leader. With a big time advantage and attacking position, Nodirbek took the full point and sole tournament lead. Vidit and Wei Yi both won their games to stay just behind the leaders while the remaining games drew.

In the challengers group two players were on top, Leon Luke Mendonca trailed a point behind the young Frenchman Marc'Andria Maurizzi. Round eleven was a battle royal with only one draw in this section between the Ukrainian Anton Korobov and Jaime Santos. The American Hans Niemann won a beautiful game against Stefan Beukema but remained two points behind the leaders. Both Mendonca and Maurizzi won their games with the white pieces and the Frenchman remained in the lead after his fourth consecutive win.

It was enjoyable watching the post game interviews in the back room where Fiona Steil-Antoni did a fantastic job getting the players to open up a bit after their games. Players would also sit down occasionally for some post-game analysis. After round eleven, Saleh Salem and Harika Dronavalli analyzed for some time after his victory. And after a quick draw, Ian Nepomniachtchi and Anish Giri sat down and discussed their game in Russian.

While all this action was happening, there were plenty of amateur games to watch too. I walked the field and captured photos while looking for interesting games and faces. Next to the playing hall was a lounge where anxious parents waited for their kids' game to end. Others followed

games or played with old friends enjoying the chess atmosphere. I spotted Luke McShane in the crowd at one time and Alireza Firouzja's brother playing blitz another time. Next door in Cafe de Zon, live commentary was taking place in a large back room where special guests would take the stage. Many others sat and played chess while sharing stories and a pint.

The final weekend of the tournament and the crowds began to swell. Fans were allowed into the playing hall half an hour before the round and they lined up quickly near the front to see their favorite players. The penultimate round saw a leader shake up in both fields. First in the masters, Ab-

busatorov fell to candidate qualifier Vidit Gujrathi after 77 moves, allowing four other players to catch up to the lead as well. The challenger leader Maurizzi lost his game to Daniel Dardha yet was gracious in sitting down in the back room for quite a lengthy analysis. Mendonca now had his chance to catch the leader. His game against Saleh Salem became a struggle with just minutes each before time control. Salem sacrificed a knight to open his opponent's king but failed to convert and eventually resigned after 55 moves. Both players sat down and analyzed afterwards. Ding Liren won his game against Max Warmerdam and was in good spirits afterwards. On his way out that evening, fans who knew where to wait, had lined up to catch a photo and autograph from the world champion where he kindly obliged.

The final round started earlier at noon on Sunday and first place was wide open in

the masters while two players contended in the challengers. Extra special for the final day was the pairing up of the two current world champions, Ding Liren and Ju Wenjun. The last time this happened was in 2016 between Magnus Carlsen and Hou Yifan. The masters were playing to win and four players did just that to end up in a four-way tie-break. Wei Yi defeated leader Vidit in a heartbreak loss after a fantastic tournament for the Indian GM. He was joined by Giri, Gukesh, and Abdusattorov who would all play a blitz tie-break match after all the other games finished.

Veteran Dutch GM Erwin L'Ami faced off against co-leader Marc'Andria Maurizzi while IM Divya Deshmukh faced her fellow Indian compatriot co-leader Leon Luke Mendonca. Maurizzi failed to make any headway against L'Ami and their game settled into a draw, whereafter both players analyzed their game in the back room awaiting the other result. Soon afterwards word came through that Divya resigned and Mendonca became champion and qualified for a spot in next year's masters group. After his victory interview with Fiona, many congratulated him including second place finisher Maurizzi.

After the last game to finish, a long marathon struggle between Gukesh and Praggnanandhaa that ended in a draw, two boards were set for the tie-breaks. Board one had Wei Yi face Nodirbek while last year's winner Anish Giri faced Gukesh. Yi took the second game after drawing the first, earning a seat in the final. Giri took game one with the black pieces and Gukesh came back and did the same in game two setting up armageddon games until there was a win. That came quickly as

Gukesh took the first win after Giri fell low on time and had to resign. Shortly after Wei Yi and Gukesh faced off in the final battle. The first game ended in a 47 move draw. Then in game two, Yi slowly outplayed Gukesh and after a bishop fork on move 59 losing a rook, Gukesh resigned.

A fantastic finish to a great tournament. One player in each group finished without a loss, Praggnanandhaa in the masters and Daniel Dardha who took second place in the challengers. And in the large amateur group, the qualifiers winner was Dutch IM Arthur Pijpers who now gets a seat in next year's challengers field. I look forward to returning once again to this special place where chess is king. A grateful thanks to the organizers and staff who do a remarkable job running such an enormous and prestigious tournament. See you in 2025...



Another Centurini¹ Study

This is arguably his most famous study. It's subtle use of Zugzwang, waiting moves, and intricate strategy are beloved by fans of the endgame, but even more than that, it is rightly considered to be (part of the) required knowledge for the ambitious tournament chess player wishing to perfect his or her endgame strategy.

Black to move. Here is the cross roads. One narrow path leads to Black's salvation and a draw, anything else loses. This study has been published in almost every endgame manual as well as many chess publications where endgames are discussed. My research showed me that, as with most theoretical material in chess, very little verbal explanation is given. Rather it is simply a procession of if-then lines and the result (win or draw) they lead to. I will attempt to codify the ideas contained in this study in not just various lines but also into verbal rules. Here goes;

The high-level view; Black draws, but only if he immediately escapes with the King with 1...Kc8. Anything else and White will win. Truth be told, Black is in danger even if he plays the correct move as anywhere along the way he has many ways to make a fatal error if White stubbornly makes him prove equality. For this article I will not be showing the correct drawing line, rather I will focus on the move that many chess players would intuitively choose and show why and how it loses.

1...Rc1?? Now White wins with best play. The overall idea is that Black is forced to give up his Rook for White's Knight to stave off a direct mating attack. The rules;

1. White's King and Knight are ideally placed. DO NOT MOVE THEM unless...
2. They are attacked/checked by the Black Rook or
3. They move with gain of tempo by check, mate threat, or attacking Black's Rook.
4. Black's King is in a "kill box", the nine squares bounded by the a and c files and 6 thru 8th ranks. HE DOES NOT SAFELY LEAVE THAT BOX, EVER.
5. White's Rook has almost unlimited temporizing moves, USE THEM. Specifically use both vertical and horizontal "tacking"² to reposition your Rook or force the Black Rook to the fourth rank.

¹ Luigi Centurini (Genoa, April 24, 1820 – Genoa, November 10, 1900) was an Italian jurist, chess player, and chess composer. His studies especially address the endgame. The endgame in this article, of rook and knight against rook, was likely *the* study that made him known worldwide.

² Tacking is a sailing maneuver by which a craft, who's next destination is into the wind, turns its bow toward and through the wind so that the direction from which the wind blows changes from one side of the boat to the other, allowing indirect progress in the desired direction which would be impossible if attempted directly. It is a particularly apt term for chess maneuvers that involve the apparent "null" or meaningless move. Alekhine once used it in annotating one of his games.


6. Black's Rook has a "Rook distance" problem, both vertically and laterally; he has too few squares to move to. White's King and Knight limit Black to the 1st thru 4th ranks and due to being "threat pinned" to a back rank mate, (the Rook must be able to shield the Black King on a safe square) he has only four files to operate on, a thru d. This is a high level Zugzwang, the Black Rook will be unable to stay on the second rank and be forced to the 4th where it is "too close" to the White King and Knight.
7. Using rule 6, the Black Rook can be induced to the c4 square. This is valuable to White as it prevents the Black King escaping our kill box by ...Kc8 due to the fork on d6
8. Highly useful Knight moves for White are Nd4 or Nd6. When it can be safely played to those squares, especially when it threatens the Black Rook, it has the unanswerable threats of Nc6 or Nb5, in both cases closing the mating net on Black's King.
9. Once Black has missed the opportunity of 1...Kc8 there is no turning back! If 2...Kc8 White has a forced mate in three starting with 3.Na7+

7 Opening Principles

1. King Safety! If you get checkmated, this will blow the heck out of your plans. In general, get your King to a secure location (via castling) ASAP! Don't move pawns that are protecting that castled position. Sometimes you don't need to castle or castling would even be very dangerous so don't castle on "blind faith". Look at the position and make your best choice.
2. Material! Even the beginning of the war has casualties! But don't send your soldiers to their death lightly. Make their loss have meaning! Direct and equivalent trades is one way to do that. You take mine; I take yours! Be alert, like stepping out onto a roadway. Once you're on the road, it's too late to look for cars!
3. Get a "map". Thousands of openings have already been mapped out, expertly analyzed and evaluated. Get a good opening book (or computer database) and look at them! Learn from what other people have already discovered!
4. Get tactical! Pins, forks, skewers, mating attacks etc. The opening of each chess game is rife with these. It's hard enough to see the ones you do know about or have studied, to see new and unique ones that can come out in any game's starting phase is even harder. If you have tactical strength and alertness (the chess equivalent of a healthy and fit body) you have the best chance at having a successful start to your game. Tactics will happen in every chess opening, make sure you see them. Develop your chess fitness by studying "millions" of chess puzzles.
5. Pick a chess repertoire. This will be some work and memorization here, but it must be done. One method is to find a strong player and adapt his or her openings.
6. Respect the center. Central control gives you options and denies options to your opponent. Whether it's occupying with pawns or controlling with pieces (or some combination of the two) you simply must have at least a share of the center.
7. Development! As the legendary Soviet Chess champion and elite coach Alexei Suetin put it "strive for the quickest and most active development..."

I have been attending the club since 1997. After a couple of years, I was nominated to become an officer of the club. The club was run by a triumvirate, and I was the 4th nominee. I kind of got the feeling that I was only nominated so that the members who liked club politics could have something on which to motion, second, and vote at the annual meeting. The top three vote-getters would become the officers for the upcoming year. I came in 4th.

While I was flattered to be nominated, I did not want to win. I did not want to get sucked into any club politics. I did not want any responsibility for running the club. I just wanted to play chess. I don't know if I received any votes, but I didn't even get my own vote; I voted for the other three nominees. Fortunately, I was spared any club responsibility other than trying to push my rating over 1800 before Paul Grimm did the same.

Paul Grimm was the editor of the Colorado Chess Informant at the time and announced his plan to break 1800. Having played Paul several times (+2-0=1), I could not allow him to beat me in any fashion. Although, he did draw me once.

In 2004, I crossed over 1800 in the Winter Springs Open well ahead of Paul Grimm, whose plan had backfired. So, I had to pick someone new to beat to 1900. Since Larry Wutt had peaked at 1867 in 2003 and was #5 on my Most Wanted Chess Enemies list, he seemed like the ideal opponent to surpass.

In 2008, I crossed over 1900 in the 3rd Al Ufer Memorial well behind Larry Wutt, who broke 1900 in 2007 on LM Brian Wall's watch. The only satisfaction I was able to take from coming in second was that I did pass Larry's rating in that event.

I even wrote about it in an article for the Informant sixteen years ago, in which I challenged Larry in a race to 2000:

In 2009, I crossed over 2000 in the Pikes Peak Open well ahead of Larry Wutt, who finally broke 2000 in 2015.

In 2012, the triumvirs broke up, and I was enlisted to be the third officer of the Colorado Springs Chess Club. The ratings gains were to be a thing of the past, and my chess life was to become a world of club politics and responsibilities.

This time, I was more agreeable, seeing as nobody else wanted to do it, and I had more seniority than most members of the club. One of my first responsibilities was to take over the management and operation of the club library.



I was given the Green Book. This was a notebook with the names of members who checked out a book and the title they checked out. The original bookkeeper had a system where each title had its own page and the names were added below and crossed off as the book was returned. However, the next bookkeeper abandoned this idea and started a new record keeping system where dates, names, and titles were recorded on a line to get more entries per page. I guess his fear was that, with the increasing number of books the club was collecting, the Green Book would run out of pages to record them all. This did not happen, as I moved away from using the Green Book to more modern technology.

In 2018, I started a database for the library and have logged 161 books to date as members have donated, checked-out, or checked-in books. The Green Book has served its purpose, and it has highlighted a problem: Some books don't get returned for years. The past club officers may have been responsible for the lack of returns by not requiring due dates or limiting the number of check-outs. So, to remedy this problem the current officers have implemented some new policies for 2024.

Any member can view books on site.

Only Supporting Members can check out books (limit 3 at a time)

Book are due on the Supporting Member's expiration date

Currently, the club has 37 books on record as checked-out. There could be more out as I have not audited the Green Book yet to see which books might have been returned and not crossed-off. We are asking everyone, who is not a current Supporting Member and has a club book, to please return it as soon as possible. The list of 37 known books is included at the end of this article.

Larry Wutt (right) is donating some of his library of chess media to the club. However, before we add them to the club's collection, he has offered them to anyone free of charge. In July, I will begin to move whatever is leftover to the club's collection. So, please stop by the club on Tuesday night if you are interested in adding some books, DVDs, or software to your chess library.

In addition to the club database, I have decided to check books in and out by taking a photo of them. One, it helps remind me to log the information into the database, and two, it provides an image for people to browse the library online. You can view the images with this link:

THE CHESS DETECTIVE: The Hazards of Grabbing Pawns


Most beginners place an overemphasis on material gains. The chess master must weigh material considerations with the other types of advantages: king safety, piece activity, pawn structure, and space.

Grabbing pawns may give the player a material advantage, but he loses time while his opponent gains tempi that can be used to increase piece activity and maybe even trap the piece that grabbed the pawn.

Irving Chernev once said, "Pawn-grabbing with the queen, at the expense of development, is always perilous."

Consider this position from the famous game between Mikhail Botvinnik and Rudolf Spielmann from Moscow in 1935.



7...Qxb2? Black decides to grab the "poisoned" b-pawn. The queen is now in grave danger, behind enemy lines. **8.Rc1 Nb4 9.Na4 Qxa2** The queen has only two choices. **9...Qa3 10.Rc3 Qxa2 11.Bc4** also traps the lady. **10.Bc4 Bg4 11.Nf3 Bxf3 12.gxf3 Resigns** After **12...Qa3 13.Rc3** Black can save the queen by sacrificing his knight on c2 or d3 with check, but this leaves him a piece down with a lost game.

The next position occurred in Round 4 of the 2000 New York Open.










First lets pick up the clues and make observations about the position. White has a lead in development and a little more space. Since his king and queen are lined up on the same diagonal, he must be wary of being pinned by Black's bishop. White would like to play Nc7+, forking the king and rook. The b2 pawn is hanging; dare Black take it with the bishop?

Zlotnikov decides to go after the "poisoned" b-pawn with 7...**Bxb2?**

The game continued, 8.Rb1 Qa3 8...Bg7 runs into 9.Be3 Qa3 (9...Qc6 10.Bb5) 10.Rb3 (protecting against the pin threat of ...Bc3) 10...Qxa2 11.Nc7+. 9...c3 Trapping the bishop and attacking it a second time. 9...h6 10.Be3 e6 11.Nc7+ Kd7 12.Nb5! 12.Nxa8? allows 12...Bxc3. 12...Resigns

Always beware that grabbing extra material costs time and can result in getting the attacking piece trapped.






